# PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO DISTRICT OF NEW FOREST (OFF-STREET PARKING PLACES) ORDER - REPRESENTATIONS

#### 1. INTRODUCTION

1.1 On 13 September 2005 the Council authorised officers to take steps to advertise amendments to the Council's Off-Street Parking Places Order. This was done and notice of the proposals was published in the local press and in all the car parks. Appendix 1 of this report sets out the main details of the proposals. This report provides an analysis of the representations received and makes recommendations for Cabinet to consider.

#### 2. COMMENTS

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- 2.1 Statutory Consultees.
  - 2.1.1 The Highway Authority

Hampshire County Council, as Highway Authority, must give their consent to the order. Officers and Cabinet Members of the Council have been in discussions with their counterparts in the County. The County will formally consider the proposals at the Executive Members for Spatial Strategy meeting on 11 October 2005. Officers will report the results of the meeting orally.

2.1 2 Emergency Services and Haulage Industry

No representations were received.

2.2 Other representations received.

Town and Parish Councils and Chambers of Commerce were sent full details of the proposals. Their comments and consideration of them are set out in Appendix 2.

2.3 General comments

A summary of all representations received together with comments and suggested action can be found in Appendix 3. In total some 141 representations have been received. Although 141 is a considerable number, this should be considered in the context that some 65,000 clocks have been issued this year (less than 0.216%). A copy of all objection letters received has been placed in the Members' Room.

#### 3. PROPOSED CHANGES TO ADVERTISED PROPOSALS

3.1 As a result of the comments the following amendments are suggested to the draft Order. It is believed that these amendments are not substantial enough to require the order to be re-advertised. (The relevant regulations require readvertisement where a "substantial change" is proposed to the draft Order).

#### 3.2 Hythe Ferry

At its meeting on 13 September 2005 Council approved Cabinet's recommendation "That consultation be undertaken with Hythe Ferry owners and Hythe and Dibden Parish Council with a view to establishing special arrangements for Hythe ferry users ". These consultations have taken place and a scheme devised that could well promote the use of the ferry and be of assistance to existing users.

As a result of the consultations it is recommended that a "Hythe Ferry clock" be made available to those who purchase the following ferry tickets:

10 Journey Ticket Monthly 3 Monthly Annual.

These tickets, together with the clocks, will only be available for purchase from the ticket office at Hythe pier head.

The Ferry clock is to entitle the holder to all the facilities of the Short Stay Clock plus long stay in Hythe. The cost of the clock is to be £8. the same as the standard short stay clock. Printed on the clock itself will be a ferry time table and other promotional material.

#### 3.3 Community Centres

At its meeting on 13 September 2005, Council approved Cabinet's recommendation that "Consultations be undertaken with Community Centres where users are reliant on Council-owned off-street car parks, with a view to establishing special arrangements to assist appropriate Community Centre users".

In order to meet publication deadlines it has not been possible to conclude consultations with Community Centres prior to this report being written. From the discussions that have taken place to date it is envisaged that the arrangements will be as follows:

- Special arrangements will be put in place only for those Community Centres that have no on-site parking
- Lyndhurst and Beaulieu Centres do not have any parking at all attached to the premises
- The centres wish the short stay clock to allow 5 hours parking to overcome the problems they foresee as a result of the change in the clock scheme.

An oral report will be given on progress concerning these consultations and if any amendment to the above proposed changes needs to be considered.

#### 3.4 Use of short stay clocks in long stay car parks

The order will not include any provision that will prevent the pre-purchase of a ticket from a parking meter to use in conjunction with a 3 hour clock in a long stay car park. Motorists must ensure that the period of parking allowed by the short stay clock and that purchased from a ticket machine covers the full period of their stay.

#### 4. ENVIRONMENTAL IMPLICATIONS

4.1 The proposals have been devised to try to maintain the financial viability of Town Centres and encourage commuters to consider using alternatives to individual cars. Special arrangements have been put in place to encourage the use of Hythe ferry as an alterative to commuting to Southampton by car.

#### 5. CRIME AND DISORDER IMPLICATIONS

5.1 None envisaged.

#### 6. FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS

6.1 Given that in excess of 60,000 clocks and 1800 amenity permits will have been sold for year 2005, it is reasonable to assume the following sales under the suggested new scheme.

45,000 short stay clocks £306,400 (incl Ferry Clocks)

5,000 District wide clocks £340,400 2,000 half year District wide £74,900

The above gives a total income of £721,700, which compares to a budgeted income from clocks of £332,200 for year 2005. The introduction of a District wide clock may result in a small reduction in the sale of Amenity Permits in the region of possibly £30,000 pa.

#### 7. PORTFOLIO HOLDER'S COMMENTS

These will be reported to the meeting.

#### 8. RECOMMENDATION

- 8.1 That due consideration be given to the objections and representations received following publication of the draft amendments to the Council's Off-Street Parking Places Order.
- 8.2 That, subject to consent being received from Hampshire County Council and to any further modifications Council may decide to make, officers be authorised to amend the District of New Forest (Off-Street Parking Places) Order to:
  - (a) reflect the proposals set out in Appendix 1 to this report; and
  - (b) include further modifications to reflect the changes now proposed at sections 3.2, 3.3 and 3.4 of this report; and

8.3 That, in the Council's view, the modifications set out at 8.2 (b) above are not substantial changes to the draft Order such as to require further advertisement and a further period for public representation.

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# MAIN DETAILS OF THE PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO DISTRICT OF NEW FOREST (OFF-STREET PARKING PLACES) ORDER

- 1. To replace the current town and village centre parking clock scheme with the following:
  - (a) a shoppers' parking clock, at a cost of £8 for the 2006 calendar year or part thereof which, if properly displayed, enables a vehicle to be parked without further payment for up to 3 hours (subject to the terms of the District of New Forest (Off-Street Parking Places) Order) in any town or village centre (but not amenity) car park
  - (b) a District wide parking clock, at a cost of £80 for the 2006 calendar year or part thereof, or £44 for the 6 month periods commencing 1 January or 1 July 2006 or part thereof, which, if properly displayed, enables a vehicle to be parked without further payment for any period (subject to the terms of the District of New Forest (Off-Street Parking Places) Order) in any town or village centre, or any amenity, car park.

Both types of parking clock will be transferable between vehicles.

- To provide that in the following "short stay" car parking areas, the maximum period for which vehicles may wait between 8.00 am and 6.00 pm will be increased from 2 hours to 3 hours: Hythe Jones Lane, New Road; Lymington Cannon Street East, Cannon Street West, Emsworth Road, Gosport Street, Southampton Road, St Thomas Street; Lyndhurst; Milford-on-Sea Sea Road; New Milton Elm Avenue, Osborne Road, Spencer Road North, Spencer Road South.
- 3. To vary the charges for amenity car park permits as follows:
