Absolutely no discounted pricing or "happy hours" to encourage excessive drinking of alcohol.

c) Public safety

We have undertaken a fire and accident risk assessment of the premises and this is reviewed/updated on an annual basis (last review was 7th january 2005).

Illuminated emergency exit signs.

Regular staff training regarding fire evacuation procedures.

Fire evacuation drills undertaken every six months and recorded in fire log book.

Fire alarm and emergency lighting testing undertaken annually by qualified electrician and recorded in fire log book (copies of the current certificates are attached to this application). The Club operates a self-imposed maximum occupancy limit of 130 instead of the potential

premises maximum of 200. Location and car park layout enables access for emergency vehicles at all times.

We have the requisite number of trained appointed persons to administer first-aid and use of First Responder emergency service, and all staff are aware of the location of the First Aid Box.

d) The prevention of public nuisance

All clubhouse entrances and exits are a minimum of 50 metres from the road, 100 metres from the nearest domestic dwellings and 150 metres from the nearest busness premises.

All clubhouse entrances and exits are on the side of the building furthest away from all of the above.

Signage in Clubhouse asks members and guests to leave the premises quietly. We hold a maximum of 20 evening functions incorporating live or recorded music per year.

e) The protection of children from harm

The Club operates a formal written Junior Welfare Policy and we will immediately adopt the Golf Foundation's Children in Golf Welfare Policy as soon as it is published (expected June 2005). All staff instructed and trained in the principal issues of Children at risk outside the club, Children on their own at the club, children being supervised/escorted/transported by non-family adults, and children not being served or allowed to consume alchohol. We have a designated Junior Welfare Office/organiser on the Club Committee. Children are not allowed to use the low-jackpot gaming machine or cigarette vending machine.



The increase of traffic entering and leaving the premises, using the same access as the Bell Hotel will add an unacceptable amount of traffic at the junction of thge B3078 and B3079. This could lead to a safety risk at this junction. The car park of the golf club, which also serves the Bell Inn is, on occasions, filled to overflowing. Cars are parked on the verges alongside the adjacent roads.

CRIME AND DISORDER:

With an extension of licensing hours there is a strong likelyhood of an increase in the number of vehicles being left overnight in the Bramshaw Golf Club/ Bell Inn car park. I understand there have already been a number of reported thefts from vehicles in this car park.

GENERAL:

The area is one of low background noise. As such vehicle noise and the noise of people enjoying themselves can be heard clearly. This is entirely reasonable provided that the hours to which such noise extends, is limited. Any extension beyond the

current 11pm closing time is , but for celebrations such as New Year, unacceptable and the granting of a licence with such extensive scope would be to disregard the needs and rights of the rate payers living in the area.

As a resident living close to the Bramshaw Golf Club I wish to record with you a number of objections to the above referenced application to convert their existing Club Registration Certificate and the variation of the their current Club Premises Certificate. Having requested and had a meeting with Mr I.Baker, the Manager of the Golf Club, I would state that I have no objections to the procedures, practices and business hours as operated under their present Club Licence and their Licence to sell alcohol as currently applied.

For the new application, referenced above, I wish to register my objection to the requested increase in hours available to sell alcohol. I also object to the extension of the number of activities and frequency of events, which are not necessarily linked to their core business of golf, which has been carried on since 1782. (ie. The oldest course in Hampshire).

My detailed objections are as follows:

PUBLIC NUISANCE

The increase in hours for entertainment and the sale of alcohol will almost certainly over time lead to a significant increase in the number of clientele arriving and departing by car/taxi. This will increase the amount of noise emanating from the cattle grid over which all vehicular traffic passes over on entering or leaving the premises. At night this additional traffic will also lead to an increase in light pollution caused by the headlights flashing on neighbouring properties during night hours. The entertainment/bar area is located on the first floor of the establishment and therefore the sound from this area carries a longer than normal distance. This is particularly true during the wintertime when there are no leaves on the trees.



The increase in traffic entering and leaving the premises, coupled with any traffic merging at the entrance from the jointly owned Bell Inn, will add an unacceptable increase in traffic at the already controversial junction of the B3078/3079. This will further increase the already established road safety hazard at this point and in particularly at night and at peak traffic hours.

(n.b. this problem will be exacerbated by the increase in hours and activities currently applied for by the adjacent Green Dragon and forecast to be applied for by the Bell Inn. I also understand that the Sir Walter Tyrell Inn is applying for increased licence hours and for planning permission to erect additional bedrooms. The additional traffic anticipated from this establishment will also add to the hazard at this junction).

The, what is in effect, joint car parking facility at the site of the Golf Club and Bell Inn has on many occasions reached saturation with no overflow capability except for parking on the roadsides at the notorious junction. Thus creating an additional public safety hazard. (It should be noted that regular overflow parking from the Green Dragon Inn on the verges surrounding the junction contributes to the anticipated public safety issue).

CRIME & DISORDER

There have already been a number of reported incidents of theft from parked vehicles at the common parking area of the Golf Club and Bell Inn. Later opening hours and an increase in entertainment activities is likely to increase the number and spectrum of clientele attending the establishment which may increase the risk of crime in the area particularly with the closeness of the M27 as a 'get away' route. Also the adjacent open and forest areas constitute an escape route for potential perpetrators of crime.

PROTECTION OF CHILDREN

Later hours and the additional activities forecast are likely to increase the number of children attending the establishment.

All of the foregoing objections have an immediate impact upon the outside areas of the premises for the safety of children. It is assumed that the operational procedures cover the safety for children when inside the premises.

I, and other residents living close to the applicant have sought the views and support of our local Bramshaw Parish Council who will be expressing their position on this matter directly to you.
