All hotel staff are aware of and trained in the four licensing objectives detailed in boxes b), c), d) and e) below.

We have a dedicated disabled car parking space adjacent to the hotel entrance.

The Hotel Manager is an Associate Member of the British Institute of Innkeeping and complies with its Code of Professional Conduct.

b) The prevention of crime and disorder

It is the hotels policy not to serve alcohol to intoxicated or under aged persons, and staff training ensures all staff are aware of and implement this.

Regular liason with local police officer (PC Sarah Tate) and direct telephone contact.

The external hotel doors are locked at 2330 hours each night, and requests for entry after that time are via a night service bell manned at reception.

CCTV in car park and camera at reception desk.

Crime Prevention Notices in car park.

We advise guests not to leave valuables and other personal possessions in their car overnight.

c) Public safety

We have undertaken a fire and accident risk assessment of premises and this is reviewed and updated annually (last updated 9th July 2005).

Illuminated emergency exit signs (maintained units) over all exit doors.

Non-maintained emergency lighting provided throuhout the premises, and a different proportion are checked weekly and recorded in the Emergency Lighting System Log Book (copy enclosed - last undertaken 13th July 2005)

Fire alarms tested weekly (a different manual call point each week) and recorded in th Fire Log Book (copy enclosed - last undertaken 13th July 2005).

Fire evacuation drills undertaken every 6 months and recorded in Fire Log Book (copy enclosed - last undertaken 4th June 2005).



License Applications from the Bell Inn, Brook, Lyndhurst.

As a resident living close to the Bell Inn I wish to record with you a number of objections to the above referenced application to renew their existing Hotel Registration Certificate, License to sell Alcohol and to vary their current Premises Certificate.

I would state that I have no objections to the procedures, practices and business hours as apparently operated under their present Hotel Licence and their Licence to sell alcohol. I am however unable to clearly identify exactly how their current licences define the entertainment content of activities permitted.

For their new application I wish to register my objection to the requested increase in hours available to sell alcohol. I also object to the apparent extension of the number of activities and frequency of events being applied for.

Referring to their application, which I have only been able to view at the NFDC offices, I will use the page and section numbers used therein to reference my concerns.

My detailed comments and objections are as follows:

Part A2 – I note that none of the detailed content of the new classifications of “Provision of regulated entertainment” and “Provision of entertainment facilities” are included in their current licences although, as stated earlier, details are not available on the copy licence supplied with their application.

Part B2 - I note the apparent additional activities requested and comment on them in the next references.

Part B2 E - Live Music - it appears that Live Music is requested for both indoors and outdoors (possibly under canvas?). Indoor hours, I believe to be only acceptable until 2300hrs. Outdoor hours, and the proposed number of events, are questioned in the light of the previous provision by the hotel of outdoor music, which was curtailed by the NFDC following complaints from nearby residents. As the events are likely to be in the beer garden or a tent therein the licensing authority should apply its C3 policy on Beer gardens. In any event control of amplification is a prerequisite.

Part B2 F - Recorded music- there are 20 events forecasted to end at 2400hrs with no indication that there will be any automatic control of the volume of any music or DJ etc. Such events, when aggregated to events in sections E, F and G, should not be more than 26 and be licensed to finish at 2330hrs and be required to have a sound level limiting system in operation.

Part B2 G - Performance of dance – It is assumed that the requested frequency of events will be included in the aggregated number of events referenced in Part B2 F above and the hours licensed be compatible to those authorised for the generation of accompanying music. Again control of sound levels is requested.

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Part B2 L - Supply of alcohol – In view of the proposed opening hours to the public of 0700 to 2330hrs the supply of alcohol should be limited to 2230hrs allowing a “drinking up” period of 1hr. For residents it is proposed to accept the licensing authorities opinion.

Extension of hours for entertainment and consumption of alcohol on New Years day to 0130hrs and 0100hrs for the public are considered reasonable, and those for residents of the hotel are left to the discretion of the NFDC.

With regard to the prime areas of concern in the NFDC guidelines I would summarise my concerns as follows:

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The increase in hours for the sale of alcohol coupled with the added variety of entertainment will over time lead to a significant increase in the number of clientele arriving and departing by car/taxi. This will increase the amount of noise emanating from the cattle grid over which all vehicular traffic passes on entering or leaving the premises. At night this additional traffic will lead to an increase in light pollution caused by the headlights flashing on neighbouring properties during night hours. The requested increase in entertainment, for indoors and particularly outdoors, will significantly increase the overall sound levels in what is currently a low noise rural area. This is particularly true during the wintertime when there are no leaves on the trees and sound carries much further distances.

(It should also be noted that a noise abatement notice was served on the Bell Inn, by the NFDC, in the recent past when they were holding events under canvas in their external beer garden. Note the councils policy C3 on the use of a Beer Garden).

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The increase in traffic entering and leaving the premises, coupled with any traffic merging at the entrance from the jointly owned Bramshaw Golf Club will add an unacceptable increase in traffic at the already controversial junction of the B3078/3079. This will further increase the road safety hazard at this point and particularly at night and at peak traffic hours. This hazard is continually under review by both the NFDC and HCC.

(Note. This problem will be further exacerbated by the increase in hours and activities currently applied for by the adjacent Green Dragon Public House and from the Bramshaw Golf Club. I also understand that the Sir Walter Tyrell Inn is applying for increased licence hours and for planning permission to erect additional bedrooms as well as operating a significantly sized campsite. The additional traffic anticipated from this establishment will also add to the noise and safety hazard at this junction). The, what is in effect, joint car parking facility at the site of the Bell Inn and Golf Club has on many occasions reached saturation with no overflow capability other than parking on the roadsides at the B3078/3079 notorious junction. This, coupled with a similar overflow problem from the adjacent Green Dragon Hotel, creates an additional and unacceptable public safety hazard.

CRIME & DISORDER

There have already been a significant number of reported incidents of theft from parked vehicles at the joint parking area of the Golf Club and Bell Inn and in the last few days another "Ram Raid" on the Golf Club shop. Later opening hours, coupled with the increase in entertainment activities, are likely to increase the number and spectrum of clientele attending the establishment. Coming from a wider locality they may increase the risk of crime in the Brook/Bramshaw area particularly with the closeness of junction 1 of the M27 as a "get away" route. The adjacent open and forest areas also provide simple and convenient escape routes for potential perpetrators of crime.


