The FUSION INN located in QUEENS STREET, LYMINGTON have applied for a variation to their premises licence that would allow the premises to supply alcohol 24 hours a day, 7 days a week. My concerns in respect of this application fall under 2 of the 4 licensing objectives as detailed below:

#### The Prevention of Crime & Disorder.

The current closing time for these premises, which benefits from a restaurant licence, is 2400 Monday to Saturday with 20 minutes drinking up time. For the area surrounding QUEEN STREET, the most commonly reported incidents are public order incidents; these represent 39% of all calls to the police. These incidents are concentrated between the hours of 2100 – 0159 on all days of the week, with a slight increase at weekends. It is the reduction of these incidents that would contribute most to tackling anti-social behaviour and associated crime and disorder in the locality of QUEEN STREET. As a direct result of the known anti-social behaviour and associated crime and disorder that occurs in the vicinity of these premises police regularly target this area for increased foot patrols on a Friday and Saturday night between the hours of 2330 and 0015. Once the premises have closed the dispersal of the crowd is generally towards the local kebab shop which is located approximately 15 metres away. I believe that should this application be granted then the incidents of anti-social behaviour and associated crime and disorder could increase dramatically for the following reasons:

The dispersal of the crowd from the area will be much less rapid and could feasibly continue until much later in the night, giving a much higher probability of crime & disorder taking place.

This premises would be the only outlet in the whole area to stay open 24 hours a day and therefore attract many persons from much further a field than Lymington, giving a much higher probability of crime and disorder taking place.

The section of society that will be utilising these premises at this time of night will generally fall into the 18 to 25 year old age group. They will be either in drink or drunk and as such the probability that they will be involved in crime as either an instigator or an aggrieved increases sharply compared to other sections of society. An increase in the opening hours of this premises which will significantly prolong the amount of time these people are on the streets with the associated aggravating factors will have a detrimental effect on the prevention of crime and disorder objective.

#### The Prevention of Public Nuisance.

The police receive regular letters from the various residents of QUEENS STREET that live in close proximity to these premises. The letters list many issues that the writers request the police to deal with including the use of obscene language, shouting and unruly behaviour, urinating and vomiting both in the streets and against residents' windows. The activities of the persons that frequent the premises generally disrupt the residents' peace and quiet in the early hours of the morning. Further to this I have noted that due to the narrow pavement in QUEENS STREET persons often congregate in the road causing danger to both themselves and other road users. I believe that should this application be granted then the incidents of public nuisance and subsequent further erosion of the quality of life for the residents of QUEENS STREET could increase dramatically for the following reasons.

The dispersal of the crowd from the area will be much less rapid and could feasibly continue until much later in the night, giving a much higher probability of crime & disorder taking place.

This premises would be the only outlet in the whole area to stay open 24 hours a day and therefore attract many persons from much further a field than Lymington, giving a much higher probability of crime and disorder taking place.

I have been asked to comment on your application with regards the issue of public nuisance. My concerns relate specifically to noise. I note that you are applying for an individual piano player every night from 2000 to 2300 and for the premises to be open and alcohol to be served 24 hours a day. There is potential for noise nuisance to be caused by the holding of such regulated entertainment unless suitable controls are in place at the venue.

May I refer you to Section C, the prevention of public nuisance, of the Licensing Policy 2003. (7th January 2005). A copy of this document is available at <a href="https://www.nfdc.gov.uk">www.nfdc.gov.uk</a>.

I would like you to consider adding the following controls to your operating schedule. These are designed to minimise the impact of 24 hours drinking/opening on the local community. I would like you to consider adding following conditions to your operating schedule.

- . The licence holder or nominated representative shall receive and respond to complaints at all times that the premises are open to the public.
- . All customers shall be excluded from the external drinking area between the hours of 0900 and 2300.
- . The disposal of refuse into outdoor storage receptacles will not take place between 23:00 07:00.
- . Between the Hours of 2300 and 0800 all door and windows will be kept closed except for access and egress.
- · Arrangements will be put in place to ensure that waste collection contractors do not collect refuse between 19:00 07:00.
- Arrangements will be put in place to ensure that deliveries of consumables will not take place between the hours of 19:00 07:00.
- · So as to minimise disturbance to local residents late at night staff will be given appropriate instructions and training to encourage customers to leave the premises quietly and not to loiter in the vicinity of the premises.
- At each exit point a prominent and clear notice will be displayed to the effect that customers should be considerate to local residents by leaving the premises and the area quietly
  - · Prior to 2300, music noise emanating from the premises whilst audible, is so low that distinct tunes, lyrics, musical instruments and any base beat cannot be recognised at the boundary of all noise sensitive premises.

(Noise sensitive premises includes premises use for residential purposes, hospitals or similar institutions, educational establishments (when in use), or places of worship (during recognised times and days of worship) or any premises used for any other purpose likely to be affected by the music noise.)

Moreover, I would like you to consider revising the proposed alcohol sale hours at this premises. This is a residential area and I have concerns that even with strict controls in place at the venue there is potential for nuisance to be caused to your neighbours.

As the application stands at the moment I would consider putting in a formal objection as the application does not comply with our licensing policy.

#### Re. Licensed and Eating Places in the Queen Street Area

I understand that the Kebab House and Chicken & Fish Bar in Queen Street have applied for an extension to their licensed hours to 5am each morning. I wish to object to this change on the following issues:

#### Public nuisance, disorder and crime

It is already a regular feature of Friday, Saturday and Sunday nights (and during this particularly warm dy summer, other nights) for there to be a disorderly crowd of drunken people congregating in Queen Street around d the two food establishments from 11pm onwards and often through to 2am. These are customers of the two pubs in Quuen Street and, judging by the number of cars illegally parked along Queen Street, they are also late night revellers from other licensed premises in Lymington. Their disorderly conduct results in:

- excessive a noise (shouting and swearing);
- fighting (and, I believe recently bodily harm through stabbing);
- breaking windows and other criminal damage to property
- vomiting, urinating and throwing food around (it is not unusual to find on an early morning that the entrace to Queens Mews around the gate area is strewn with food, vomit and pools of urine.

These occurrences are not only unpleasant but often serious enough to prevent sleep. As I have to rise early to go to work, lack of sleep can interfere with my work performance and lead to health problems.

#### Public Safety

The congregation of large numbers in the street outside the two food establishments is a threat to innocent passers by who may get caught up in any affray that regularly breaks out. As a single woman I am already intimidated by the thought of having to get through these crowds when returning home late at night. The fact that the people spill into the road itself also constitutes a danger to those in the crowd. On returning home at 11.30pm last night (Friday 28 Oct), my friend, who drove me home, had to break and take avoiding action as he entered Queen Street (from Christchurch direction) to avoid hitting those in the road.

#### Environmental health

The takeaway nature of the food premises means combined with the drunken nature of the stomers results in discarded food lying in the street on a regular basis. Since the Chicken and GFis Bar opened, this problems has increase with a regular supply of discarded chicken bones along the street. This constitutes a danger to my dog, is likely to elad to an infestation of rats in the area and is a public nuisance on the paths.

I might ass here, that in the two years I have lived in Queens Mews, the pavement on the west side has NEVER been cleaned; the greasy stains of ingrained food etc can be clearly seen on the pavement from the Tripp0 to the Taxi office.

#### Traffic offences

Queen street is regularly used as parking bay for customers of the takeaway premises Despite being a double yellow line area. As a partially sighted person this causes difficulty in crossing the road becuase of the obscured view as well as difficulty in friends collecting or delivering me home to avoid walking in the dark and through crowds of drunken people.

I am aware that some of these objections are to the actual existence of takeaway establishments in Queen Street at all, but to extend their opening hours to 5am which significantly increase the issues raised above.

I also believe that the Fusion Inn and the Thomas Tripp may have applied for a 24-hour licence and that they Fusion Inn wishes to have a music licence to play live music through the night. My objections to these applications are as outlined abovel

Queen Street, Roundhouse Court and surrounding areas of Belmore Lane, Priestlands Place etc are becoming more and more residentially biased (Roundhouse Court has just been extended behind the Fusion Inn and the Wellworthy site is likely to be developed as housing in the near future.) This means that any applications that affect residents, their safety, health and quality of life must be taken seriously. The security and viability of other businesses in the area must also be safeguarded and taken into account. It would not be desirable for the balance of types of businesses in the Queen Street area to be pushed into a ghetto of loud music, drunk and disorderly people, unhygienic food dumping and rat infestation.

## EXTENDED OPENING HOURS - QUEEN STREET, LYMINGTON THE KEBAB HOUSE & CHARLIES FISH & CHICKEN BAR

It is understood that applications have been made for extended trading hours for two food takeaway businesses in Queen Street – virtually all-night trading has been rumoured locally. If this is to be combined with extended licensing hours for local public houses e.g. Fusion Inn and Thomas Tripp, then we must anticipate this becoming a 'No-Go' area again as was the case before the closure of the Black Cat public house. There have been many instances of unruly and criminal behaviour in Queen Street over the past years and local residents have learnt to avoid the area after 10.00 pm for our own safety.

At the present time, there are often night time disturbances (1.00 to 2.00 am) presumably as clients are leaving the local hostelries later than normal hours. It is especially loud near to this property when people are recovering their vehicles from Morrisons Car Park due to shouting and revving of car engines. Complaints have been made to the Police in the past and we are encouraged to do so in order that calls may be recorded for use in making representations to yourselves when Licensing Applications are being considered. As there is also CCTV installed in the area, there should be ample visual evidence of the disturbances but without any indication of the accompanying noise levels. It is not uncommon to be woken in the early hours — this in a predominantly retirement area.

We local residents trust that the above factors will be taken into account when reaching any future decisions on licensing hours in this locality.

It is with considerable alarm that we hear of the application to extend the drinking license to 24 hours of the Fusion Inn in Queen Street, Lymington.

It should be a matter of record that over the past 21 years of our owner residency of the above address, that we have had to endure the regular late night disturbances involving violent and vulgar misbehaviour, shouting, vomiting, and repeated vandalism of the plants which front this property.

My wife and I are advanced octogenarians and far beyond any capability of protecting ourselves or our property. To appeal for safety and protection from public nuisance is surely not too much to ask in the evening of life, from one born in the First World War and who fought in the Second.

It is unreasonable to imagine that extending the license of these premises to 5am could lead to anything except increased local disturbances arising from the current cult of binge drinking.

The police have repeatedly made clear that their limited resources simply do not enable them to keep the peace everywhere late at night. The way forward seems thus confined to limiting drinking hours. For all these reasons we emphatically object to the extension of this license.

### Re: Fusion Inn, Queen Street, Lymington.

I understand that an application has been made by the owners of this establishment to extend their licensing hours so that they can stay open and sell alchohol for 24 hours a day, and have live music from 8 to 11 pm. As residents close-by, we are writing to object strongly to these points in this application. These premises are within 30 metres of an area where threats to public safety and crime and disorder are rife. The proposed licence conditions will exacerbate already existing problems of crime, disorder, public safety and public nuisance. Any change to the current licence terms should be minimal - preferable none at all as the problems in the immeduate area are already excessive.

We are objecting on the grounds of:

- 1. Crime & disorder: it is already normal for our sleep in Roundhouse Court to be disturbed by shouting, fights, vomiting, urinating, scattering waste, and loud disorder in the evening. Our residential development is regularly damaged by customers of the nearby establishments and we have a siege plan is in operation to protect our property (electronic gates, infra-red lights, emergency call numbers, etc. etc.). As the Hampshire Police Crime Audit states: "During 2001-2002, there is an even spread of incidents occurring over each day of the week. During 2002 -2003, most incidents occurred on Monday, Friday and Sunday. During 2003-2004, most incidents occurred on Tuesday and Sunday. The majority of incidents occurred mainly after pub closing time and most frequently at premises such as kebab shops and fast food outlets". I.e. th conditions immedaitely adjacent to the Fusion Inn.
- 2. Public safety: we are deeply concerned about personal safety. We never ever now walk in Queen Street in the late evening. We are even afraid to walk from our home onto St. Thomas Street as this end of Lymington is a magnet for rowdy pushy drunken louts. For example, if we want to get a take-away from Ask, 200m away near the church, we drive there rather than risk being pushed off the pavements. We are now having to spend large amounts of money to reinstall, and install additional, gates to protect ourselves. What on earth is the point of living in th area if, as soon as we manage to increase our protective measure at our own cost, the NFDC extends the rights of the source of the threat? Absurd!
- 3. Public nuisance. See above comments

We acknowledge that the owners of the Fusion Inn have improved matters since they took over management and changed the previously disorderly pub to what is now an acceptable local facility. However, this application is clearly a step backwards. Therefore we striongly urge the NFDC Licensin Panel to hold crime and disorder at bay in the particualry nasty area of Lymington by rejecting this application.

Application to extend their licensing hours to 24 hours a day.

On behalf of myself and other elderly residents at this address we strongly object to the extension of opening hours at the referenced address.

I understand the applicant wishes to serve alcohol and allow live music to be performed during these hours.

You may not be aware of the many problems we have to endure in this area, mostly in the evenings up to approximately midnight and sometimes beyond.

Most Saturday and Sunday mornings I myself pick up broken drinking glasses, glass bottles, drink cans, discarded food bought from Kebab House in Queens Street, and last but not least, rinse away urine from one or two of our doors which is not a pleasant task within our archway. I carry out these chores at almost 80 years old because the remainder of the elderly are women. This should not be necessary if the surrounding area was policed at strategic hours.

In addition the drunken vandalism which includes the smashing of our electric gate code box and beam cover at a replacement cost of almost £600 (this is a reported police incident). On another occasion a traffic cone thrown at a first floor glass door luckily without damage but frightening. Houses opposite have had their garden flowers pulled out of boxes and the contents strewn over the road.

Apart from vandalism the loud shouting up to approximately midnight keeps residents awake at weekends so heaven help us if this continued throughout the night.

On more than one occasion we have called the police to deal with drunken fights as they seem to attract passers by who stand and cause more shouting and noise.

Thoughts must be given to the fact that Queen Street is very narrow and this includes very narrow pavements. Drunks coming out of the Fusion Inn say mid afternoon onwards could cause problems with heavy traffic and pedestrians with children. With this in mind an increase in licensing hours might not be in the interest of Public Safety.

It appears that we have limited Police coverage of Lymington at the moment and the carneras that have been installed do not act as a deterrent to better behaviour of these yobs. Having many problems at the moment we residents do not want to increase them and I am sure the police will feel the same.

We appeal to common sense that this application is refused.

Re: The Fusion Inn, Queen Street, Lymington

We are writing concerning the application for the above premises for a 24 hours license with music.

Our property ended up adjoining the Fusion Inn when an extension was granted despite our objections, some years ago. Since then, we have endured on many occasions, loud music which has disrupted our quality of life and sleep. We were forced, when the establishment was called the Black Cat, to call in Environmental Health who monitored the situation.

During the course of their investigation, Environmental Health proved conclusively that the sound installation between the two properties, promised by the builders, was never installed. We can only assume this was a cost cutting exercise by the then current brewery. We now have a situation, proven in the last court case which we won, that there is at best, only a 9" solid wall between the Fusion Inn and our property. The outcome of this is that whenever music is played, we are forced to endure whatever decibels they decide to play and to whatever hours they keep. This is totally unacceptable and a public nuisance and we surely have the right to a quality of life.

Until some months ago, when the then manager left, we had experienced no problems for about a year. He was very understanding and the music was at a level that did not disturb us. However, after that we have been subjected to louder music – indeed on 8 September this year, we contacted Tony Hetherington of the Licensing Department to ask exactly what their license entailed. We also stated that we would, as we always have done, try the personal approach to see if we could resolve the issue amicably.

On Sunday, 6 November, the music was loud coming through the wall and we rang the Fusion Inn and asked to speak to the licensee. We were told he was not there so said to the man there that the music was getting exceptionally loud and particularly this night. This was at 8.50p.m. We were asked where we were, we told him and the man said he would turn the speakers round. We thanked him and he replied 'no worries.' He was very amiable.

By 10.30p.m, the music still was as loud so we spoke to the same man who said he had spoken to the licensee and he had told him not to turn the sound down as 'it would spoil the atmosphere.' We said it was now 10.30 and it was supposed to stop now anyway but he replied 'no it doesn't, it can go on until 11.00.' We told him it was a Sunday and he said 'what difference does that make.' He obviously did not even know the then licensing hours. He also stated that the music wasn't loud anyway, and we said how could he know when he had not even been in our house.

We again said the music was too loud and it was impossible to get to sleep one of us had a very early start in the morning. We were then told we had to accept we lived next to a public house and we replied that we expect a certain level of noise but not this amount and certainly not past licensing hours. Anyway, it does not matter what time it is the music is too loud to be reasonable. The reply was that he did not want to cause any hassle, all he could do was apologise but it will ruin the atmosphere. We told him to either turn it down or off but he said he could not. We informed him that we would contact the Environmental Health and get them to monitor the situation to which he stated that this one would be the last song.

As Lymington born and bred we and the residents of Queen Street are subjected on a regular basis to crime and disorder, and public nuisance - we have had numerous occasions of broken shop windows, drunken brawls which have resulted in broken bottle injuries, attempted grievous bodily harm with a metal bar and many others. The local Police obviously have a record of all the incidents which are too numerous for us to mention here..

We have also witnessed groups of drunken youngsters – sometimes fifty to sixty – who spread-eagle across the street and block pavements and doorways. Many is the time the screech of brakes is heard as vehicles come round the corner to be met by pedestrians blocking the street. This problem will be exacerbated if the premises stay open until 05.00 hours. People will not leave the vicinity until approx. 06.00. The supermarket lorries do a lot of their deliveries at night and will not expect congestion such as this at this time and especially not in a one way street. It is also very intimidating to have to walk to one's front door through gangs of drunken youngsters and even more so when they lean against and block your doorway.

We experience much public nuisance which again will increase with extended openings. We have to contend with urinating in doorways and even worse, defecating, pools of vomit, takeaway food being smeared on the pavements,

doors, windows and even on occasions posted through letterboxes, and broken bottles and cans of alcohol scattered everywhere. The level of shouting and screaming that occurs when fights and arguments break out disturbs our sleep now and should this establishment stay open 24 hours, we will undoubtedly on occasions, get hardly any sleep at all.

We feel quite strongly from our many years of living in Queen Street that there is a moral duty to sometimes protect youngsters from themselves. Allowing 24 hours opening will result in more drunkenness and consequently more fights and brawls with all that that entails.

We love our market town and feel it is all our duty to protect our heritage and way of life.

We therefore object most strongly to this application and hope that the opening hours will stay as they are now.

I am a resident living very close to these premises and this area of the town already suffers from far too much a concentration of unruly, loud, dirty and often violent behaviour late at night. The people behaving in antisocial ways have usually consumed too much alcohol. Granting this unlimited Licence for alcohol and music would attract many more people, who have already been drinking, to this small area of the town after other pubs in the town, and further afield, have closed.

It must be emphasised that this small area at the top of the town has a high concentration of residential properties happily co-existing with most of the local commercial premises. It is when an imbalance in this relationship is allowed by unreasonable and inappropriate Licencing for the given location, that life becomes very distressing for a large number of local people trying to get some hours of peace and quiet in the dead of the night. A 24 hour Licence for the Fusion Inn would mean that local residents would never know when disturbances would stop during the night.

This locality already has a concentration of loud and unacceptable behaviour late at night, much more than its fair share when considering the town as a whole.

#### The Prevention of Crime and Disorder

The Fusion Inn would be the only place to go for late night revellers. These are mostly young people who cannot control their behaviour under the influence of alcohol and cause expensive damage to private property and cars and shop windows. Fights break out

and some individuals have received serious injuries. The Police and Ambulance Service have had to be called on numerous occasions.

#### **Public Safety**

This small locality in the town already has a problem with Public Safety after 11pm when many young people who have drunk too much alcohol and who behave in very antisocial ways are already in the vicinity. They intimidate other people passing on the narrow footpath causing them to step into the road when traffic is passing. It is not unusual for crowds of up to about 60 or 70 to block the road. Traffic is forced to slow down or stop in order to avoid hitting some of these young people who are a danger to themselves and passing motorists.

#### The Prevention of Public Nuisance

Examples of Public Nuisance include:

Shouting and screaming abuse at present until well after 1pm.

Fighting and serious violent behaviour

Urinating and vomiting in the passageway access to my address and close to other residential properties

Standing in the road when traffic is passing and being a danger to themselves and motorists

Vandalism to cars and property in nearby roads

I strongly believe that extending this licence at all will make these problems worse. If people who have already been drinking alcohol elsewhere then go to the Fusion Inn after other pubs have closed, presumably to continue drinking until the early hours, their behaviour will not have improved when they eventually do leave the Fusion Inn and there will be no end time at night to these problems, for local residents. I feel that there will be an increase in noise nuisance and crime to property and cars and local people, many of whom are elderly, will feel more threatened. I have to walk from my car to home at night and as a resident should be allowed to do so in a non-threatening environment. Local residents are entitled to have a part of the night when the town goes quiet and we are allowed to sleep without noise and nuisance. The Fusion Inn has two entrances, the front opens onto Queen Street and the rear onto St. Thomas Park.

Residents of Lymington deserve consideration and are entitled to some hours of peace and quiet during the middle of the night. The character of the town and its reputation is being affected and can be dramatically changed for the worse by allowing certain Licences or extensions and improved by denying or withdrawing others.

Please do not extend this Licence.

I live even nearer to this establishment than to the Kebab Shop, the subject of my previous letter of objection to an extension of hours. The Fusion Inn was formerly the Black Cat, very well-known to you and the Hampshire Constabulary.

To date, the Licencee of this renamed and refurbished public-house has an impeccable record with the local residents; he has catered for a different clientele and provided an interesting catering menu. Should this change of licence be granted there is an obvious risk that it could turn into a night-club with the attendant noise and car-parking problems. The Owners of the premises might change and the present very competent Landlord be replaced by a quite different style of management and customer. We should then be faced with a very different situation.

It is difficult to believe that the Licensing Authority could contemplate introducing 24-hour operation of this nature into a residential area of increasing density. Members will be aware that the NFDC Planners have allowed a new block of high-density mini-flats to be built in St. Thomas' Park, literally over-looking the Fusion Inn. Parking is extremely tight for the new occupants. The Inn has very restricted parking spaces of its own: with this extension granted the traffic situation in St. Thomas' Park could become difficult for all, to say the least.

I will not rehearse again the local problems of the area – inebriation and public biliousness, closing-time noise. You are only too aware of them. I therefore add my strong protest to such an extension of hours and trust that it will turned down.

Re Licence extension for Fusion inn, Queen Street, Lymington to serve alcohol for 24 hours a day and allow live music to be performed during these hours

Dear Sir/ Madam,

I gather that the above named establishment has applied for a licence extension to serve alcohol and allow live music to be performed for 24 hours a day. I wish to register my strong objection to this application.

As a resident of Queen Street, I already have to endure the anti-social behaviour of drunken youths who spill out along Queen Street after pub closing time and create havoc until 1 am or later. Due to the close proximity of several pubs in this small area, in conjunction with the presence of The Kebab House and Charlie's Fish & Chicken Bar, Queen Street appears to act as a magnet for local youths. Extending FUSION INN's hours of opening to 24 hours a day, seven days a week, would surely exacerbate an already intolerable situation as follows:

### 1 Crime and Disorder

Many incidences of Crime and Disorder already occur along Queen Street between the hours of 9 pm and 2 am, as a direct result of excessive alcohol consumption. These include acts of violence (sometimes resulting in serious injury) and vandalism of private property in this conservation area (eg smashed windows and damage to gates, gardens and cars). If FUSION INN remains open for 24 hours a day, drunken customers (who, most likely, will have consumed even more alcohol) will inevitably be present around the locality later into the night, resulting in a higher probability of Crime and Disorder taking place.

As far as I am aware, FUSION INN would be the only establishment in the area selling alcohol throughout the night. This is likely to attract more youths into the area, thus compounding existing problems.

Local police already target this area on Friday and Saturday nights when undertaking foot patrols between 10 pm and midnight, in order to calm down anti-social behaviour. Surely the police have better things to do with their time than monitor this street more closely and for longer periods of time.

## 2 Public Safety

### 4 Protection of Children from Harm

After vacating FUSION INN and other pubs in the area, drunken customers meander over the length of Queen Street, having apparently lost all road sense; indeed they take over the road. This provides a risk not only to their own safety, but also to other pedestrians and to drivers. If increased numbers of young people are drawn to the area due to the all night opening of FUSION INN, this situation can only worsen.

Residents, such as myself, feel threatened if returning home late at night, lest we become entangled in an unfolding brawl (which occur only too frequently).

Later opening hours may result in more beer glasses and bottles being discarded along the street. These often become smashed, which could result in injury to the public, particularly to children walking along pavements the following morning.

### 3 Public Nuisance

The level of noise pollution along Queen Street is already intolerable between 11 pm and 1 am, particularly on Friday and Saturday nights. As a local resident, I am frequently woken up in the early hours of the morning by drunks shouting obscenities on the street outside my window, fighting and by raucous drunken singing. I cannot imagine how this situation could possibly be improved by extending the licence hours of FUSION INN, enabling even more alcohol to be consumed. In addition, the performance of live music at any time during the night is likely to keep residents awake.

Anti-social behaviour of FUSION INN customers and frequenters of other local pubs is not limited to noise pollution; regrettably they also urinate and vomit along the street and inside private gardens, such as my own. Food and faeces have even been posted through letterboxes along Queen Street, surely as a result of excessive alcohol consumption.

The one small consolation of this appalling anti-social behaviour is that it generally stops at 1 am. Should this application be granted, residents can expect to pay additional repair costs for broken or damaged property and to endure disturbance throughout the night, resulting in lack of sleep, as drunken groups of customers make their way home.

Many local residents lead busy professional lives, and need to get up at 6.30 am or earlier for work. If FUSION INN remains open for 24 hours a day, this could mean interrupted sleep throughout the night. I acknowledge that this is an urban area and that some level of noise is to be expected; however, I believe that residents have a right to a period of time during the night of relative quiet in order that rest and sleep are possible.

Until recently, residents and businesses in Lymington have lived alongside one another in a 'althy manner. Indeed, I am sure that a number of local residents support the business of FUSION INN by enjoying a drink or evening meal there on occasions. As a young person myself, I welcome well managed local pubs and bars where I can socialise with friends. There is plenty of opportunity to do this before 11.15 pm. Where is the need to continue drinking throughout the night? I acknowledge that many customers do behave responsibly on leaving the pub and do not make a nuisance of themselves. Unfortunately for FUSION INN, and more particularly for local residents, a considerable percentage of customers behave unacceptably on leaving the pub. Whilst these problems remain, it is my opinion that a licence extension should not even be considered.

The relationship between residents and local businesses can only continue in a harmonious way if both businesses and residents cooperate and act with consideration towards one another. I do not feel that the decision of FUSION INN to apply for a licence extension to serve alcohol and allow live music to be performed for 24 hours a day, seven days a week, shows consideration towards local residents, who are already forced to endure the unpleasant behaviour of too many drunken customers until late into the evening.

I implore you to consider the above points carefully.
