Market Towns

Ringwood is a Market Town on the edge of The New Forest in South West Hampshire.

The United Kingdom's small towns are not just part of our heritage, their vitality is part of the future for the millions of people who live in and around them. Every town faces different problems and seeks to seize different opportunities.

England's 1,600 market towns have been hard hit by the recession, with unemployment overall rising by a third more than in the nation as a whole. Shop vacancies have increased and empty shops are getting harder to let.

Market towns are in general popular places to live in, given their heritage and links to the surrounding countryside.

A Market Town provides a meeting place, social gathering, goods exchange, entertainment centre – in fact on a small scale a market town provides its community everything it needs on a regular basis.

The local community should only expect to travel farther afield for the larger stores to find the larger venues, Shops, cinema's, Theatres, Concert halls, as a treat for a special occasion, and to access more choice.

Legends

Legends is a proprietary Members Club which operates a life membership in exchange for a fee, at the discretion of the proprietor, and personal information (including photograph) which is stored in the computerised membership database (a sample is included in this pack). The membership system is held on the Paxton software package which is based on Microsoft Access database, and a full extract from that database is available to the hearing. Membership itself is at the discretion of the proprietor, who can also terminate membership.

As the Police correctly point out, Legends had Snooker tables in addition to the Pool Tables at one point in time. Over time the popularity of Snooker has waned and the cost of maintaining them (in the condition a player of the game would expect) outweighed the income they could achieve - consequently they were taken out of the club.

In common with other businesses, Legends has had to evolve and changed with the times.

Legends is still a major venue for the sport of Pool and also for Darts.

The Introduction of the Licensing Act 2003 in 2005 provided an opportunity to vary the licence and provide facilities in accordance with requests from the membership.

- i. Pool and Darts League Games were often running past 11pm – To accommodate this and allow to loser to do the courtesy of buying the winner a drink the licence was varied to permit the sale of alcohol until 11.45pm Sunday to Thursday.
- ii. Most clubs provide entertainment for their members and guests at weekends, and like their members to hold functions on the premises. With the demise of the 'two in a bar' concession The licence was varied to introduce licensed entertainment on the nights that were not utilised on a weekly basis by teams (7pm – 11pm for live music, and 7pm to midnight for recorded on a Thursday extended to 1am on a Friday into Saturday and Saturday into Sunday), and to extend the Sale of Alcohol by Retail for consumption ON and OFF the premises to 1.30am on Friday into Saturday and Saturday into Sunday only.

During the course of an average week Legends has the following activities:

Monday: Matches in the Ringwood Darts League and The Legends Darts Singles League, plus social Pool playing;

Tuesday: Ringwood Pool League plus social pool playing - Legends has four teams in the league, and the league itself is administered from Legends.

Wednesday: Wessex Pool League plus social Pool playing;

Thursday: Social Pool Playing, Karaoke and Quiz;

Friday: Disco or function for members and guests

Saturday: Televised Sports; Super League Darts - Alderholt are based at Legends and tend to have a home game once a month (Occurrence 44080417811 mentions one of these); Disco or function for members and guests

Legends is also home to Ringwood Athletic Football Club who use the club after Saturday afternoon games and during the week after training or five-a-side matches.

Sunday: CLOSED, unless required for Pool or Darts fixtures. For example a County Pool match will be played at Legends this coming Sunday (10th April).

At the time that the law changed no-one knew what was going to happen. The media certainly didn't preach responsibility in their coverage of the change.

As part of the transfer process from the 1964 Licensing Act to the 2003 one, Nicky Binden became a Personal Licence Holder by virtue of being an existing Licensee under the 1964 Act. She also became Designated Premises Supervisor. In common with many Licensees at the time Nicky was not made aware of the fundamental root and branch changes there had been in the course of re-writing licensing law – it didn't merely introduce flexible licensing.

As Nicky's case has been brought to the attention of a British Institute of Innkeeping Regional Council Member (Nigel Jones) this knowledge gap has now been addressed via licensee to licensee consultation and recommendations made as to training requirements and actions to be undertaken.

When Nicky utilised the more flexible hours available to Legends, there was an increase in trade on Friday and Saturday nights, which she put down to the disco allowing people to dance at the end of the night and linking the experience to the fact that people were missing the nightclub that used to be on the other side of the Market Place.

This unexpected increase in trade led to its own issues which Nicky set about addressing, sometimes at great expense, as she was advised of each one. These are not the actions of an irresponsible person.

Nicky has written her own statement, which is included in this package.

Following on from the later opening and increase in trade, the smoking ban then brought about a host of issues for many licensed premises and those living nearby, especially as it was introduced during summer months creating late night group smoking habits. Nicky has been taking actions to address the issues raised with the more recent measures having a positive effect, again at expense to the business.

Most licensed premises operate a 'chameleon' business plan as they adapt their operation to accommodate potential markets according to time of day and day of the week.

The next section of this document is a response to the papers attached to the Premises Licence Review Notice.

Comments on Review Documents

Resume (Page 2)

Throughout the document there appears to be an assumption and assertion from the police that the premises is 'out of the control'. This may well be caused by a lack of communication by the DPS, to the Police as a responsible authority, on occasions when there have been issues, meaning that any other incident is then subjectively linked to Legends without conclusive proof. This does not mean that these issues are caused by Legends or indeed the responsibility of the DPS. Much of the evidence relates to a malaise in society which needs to be addressed at its root with education and action on offenders, rather than the businesses and staff being abused by such individuals when they are told they cannot have what they want.

The Home Office's October 2010 Guidance relating to Section 182 of The Licensing Acts 2003 states:

1.26 "Licensing law is not the primary mechanism for the general control of individuals once they are away from a licensed premises and therefore beyond the direct control of individual licensees or certificate holders."

A Review of CCTV footage shows that there was not a 'glassing' or 'stabbing' in Legends and helps to explain the very different approaches to the same incident by the staff on the premises and the police. In hindsight the DPS realises that the best course of action her staff could have taken on 14th-15th January would have been to close the bar. This was also one of the rare occasions when the DPS was not on the premises.

Over time there do appear to have been issues with Door staff, resulting ultimately in replacement of a security company on 16th October 2010 following advice from the police. The incident on the 14th and 15th resulted in a member of the new team being replaced after it was found he had allowed a 17 year in without any checks and on the next shift was 'rough' with a customer. The DPS issues instructions to door staff and expected them to be carried out.

There have undoubtedly been noise issues, especially since the smoking ban and numerous measures have been taken to Prevent Public Nuisance which have resulted in a massive improvement over the last few months.

The premises no longer has a Snooker Table, however there are multiple Pool tables and dart boards and these 'pub sports' account for the bulk of activity during the week. Legends also sponsors a football team which plays 11-a-side football on a Saturday afternoons and five-a-side during the week.

Legends has become 'last bar open' but that is not a direct result of the premises licence. A study of the Premises Licence Register reveals the following licences at nearby establishments:

Finn M'Couls: Alcohol to Midnight Sunday, 0100 Mon-Wed, and 0200 Thursday to Saturday; Premises to close 30 minutes later than these times.

Ringwood Social Club: Alcohol to 0200 seven days a week

Star Inn: Alcohol to 0130 seven days a week, with unlimited drinking up time (24 hour opening as per 1964 Act).

These premises are actually closing earlier than Legends with no regard to the Public Nuisance issues that may be caused by causing a volume of people to depart their premises at the same time. There does not appear to be a process whereby a premises creating a mass movement warns other premises that they may have a sudden influx.

Keskins, immediately underneath Legends has a licence to sell alcohol until Midnight.

Documents relating to DPS (page 4)

The DPS contacted Hampshire Police during the consultation period and was told there was no point in meeting as case was going to hearing.

Nigel Jones had a meeting with Hampshire Police on 14th March 2011.

Nigel Jones had a meeting with Environmental Health on 14th March 2011.

Nigel Jones and Nicky Binden met with Paul Weston at NFDC, during the consultation period, on 7th March 2011.

Observations from Licensing Services (Page 5)

The Premises Licence variation went through due process and conditions were added at the request of Environmental Health.

Not sure why a variation to a premises licence was requested with no drinking up time.

Annex A (pages 28 & 29)

As Ringwood is a Market Town and the DPS has been operating the business since 2002 she knows the majority of people, meaning that 'unknown' people would be signed in by members who would then be responsible for them.

Legends is **not** the only place to have a late licence in Ringwood and the surrounding areas – it has become 'the last bar open' in Ringwood due to the premises

which could stay open later closing earlier rather than allowing their numbers to reduce naturally.

This statement attempts to: link a stabbing nowhere near the premises with Legends; and link a man, who broke a window in the Market Place with a premises he had not been in prior to the incident.

The Home Office's October 2010 Guidance relating to Section 182 of The Licensing Acts 2003 states:

1.26 "Licensing law is not the primary mechanism for the general control of individuals once they are away from a licensed premises and therefore beyond the direct control of individual licensees or certificate holders."

Annex B (Pages 30 to 39)

There is no doubt that there has been disturbance to local residents from customers of Legends, and the DPS accepts that in hindsight she should have been more proactive with the residents of neighbouring properties.

The Witness statement dated 2nd February states that the Thursday night 'was fine', however following a disturbance on the Friday night their grandson has not been able to stay with them since. The DPS hopes that measures taken since will mean that this couple can now have their grandson to stay, and feel that they can invite family and friends to stay for the weekend. With regard to the banging on the window of neighbours the conclusion reached is an assumption. Now the smoking area closes at Midnight and last admission is midnight there should be no going up and down alley for a cigarette.

Keskin's (below Legends) close at Midnight after which there is 'coming and going' by their staff as they clean up inside and go to the bins, and about 45 minutes later get in their cars in George Mews and drive out to the Market Place.

The witness statement dated 9th February references the building of the Fire Escape which was done, with planning consent in 2006, to meet the Public Safety Licensing Objective and to increase the capacity of the club. On the one hand, this meant that Legends could now be considered as a venue for major Pool and Darts

competitions, such as the County Pool this coming weekend. On the other, as this person correctly observed it meant that more people could be admitted as there were now two exit stairways.

Within this Annex there are references to incidents that don't relate to the club but more to the fact that an alleyway in any town becomes an appealing toilet area late at night – this is a culture problem that many licensees are painfully aware of and find very frustrating as they get the blame for the inconsiderate actions of others who in many cases have not been on the premises. There is also a reference to Kebab Boxes, which would have come from Keskins and not Legends. Another consideration is that once the club is closed at night and everyone has left there is no-one who can monitor and attempt to stop this sort of behaviour.

Also, The Daily Echo printed a story saying that someone had been 'stabbed' in Legends this was not true, but how did they get such a story? The resident here refers to a 'stabbing' – There was **not** a stabbing in Legends or connected with Legends.

Street Scene and Enforcement Manager (Annex C)

It is worth stressing at this point that Legends generally closes at 11pm on a Thursday evening and has relatively few customers, therefore it seems unlikely that they are contributing to the unpleasant street scene encountered by street cleaners at 6.30am on a Friday morning, and by definition makes it difficult to attribute blame to specific premises for the street scene on other mornings.

How can idiotic behaviour by individuals in toilets in the Furlong be blamed on premises in The Market Place?

The 'night time culture' referred to here relates to a cultural issue whereby there's a generation of people, a significant minority of whom, seem to use alcohol as a drug (for a 'hit') and some of them appear to find it very easy to get illegal substances. Many of them will start and end their weekend evenings in the uncontrolled environment of residential premises.

With regard to broken bottles and glasses they could have come from anywhere – it is Legends policy not to allow glasses or bottles to be taken away from the premises.

PS Amanda Barry (Annex D)

The logs referenced in this statement are available for inspection at this hearing.

Toilets are notoriously difficult due to the privacy people are naturally given in such areas.

There is no mention in this report as to whether the lontrack was used in all premises that night or a note of any recommendations made to the DPS.

The police used to run superb Drugs Awareness sessions for pubwatches, but these may well be victims of cutbacks.

Nigel Jones has recommended that the DPS attends the full Door Supervisors Course which includes Drugs awareness training, and other invaluable skills.

Also the Licensing Visit 44080417811 (12/02/11) shows that 2 males were evicted for multi-occupancy of a toilet cubicle during regular checks.

PC Waller (Annex E)

Here we have a police officer who knows people that use drugs and yet appears to make no effort to inform the DPS – working in partnership to reduce crime and disorder means that information needs to be passed both ways and the licensed trade and police should combine to eradicate the problem.

In most market towns people will visit multiple licensed premises during the course of a night out – that is also true of 'drugs users'.

Again the CCTV footage does not point towards a 'glassing', and the DPS was told by a member of door staff that the police had been called (as per Occurrence 44110019918 15/01/11).

Occurrence Summary (Annex F)

Occurrence Number 44080417811 (23/01/11) – A 17 year old can legally go into licensed premises unaccompanied 24 hours a day, though the instructions from the DPS to door staff is not to let them in late at night. On this particular occasion a review of CCTV footage has found that a member of doorstaff (Andy) let the 17 year old in unchallenged at 11.30pm. He went straight upstairs but did not go to the bar. Instead he went to the other end of the room and is seen picking up a drink from a table by the disco. The door supervisor in question performed an over-zealous refusal the next day and has not worked at Legends since.

Occurrence Numbers 44100365405 (28/08/10), 44100377704 (05/09/10), 44100376964 (05/09/10), 44100377007 (05/09/10), 44100388179 (12/09/10), 44110041053 (28/01/11), 441100441428 (28/01/11) – Whilst composing this response, Nigel Jones has informed the DPS that in the same way as other premises should inform her if they thought 'issues' were likely to come her way, she should be reporting people who had been a problem in her premises as there is a increased possibility of them causing problems elsewhere and causing an issue for Responsible Authorities and/or Interested Parties and/or other licensed premises. The door staff also need to be proactive in these matters. Occurrence 44110064483 (12/02/11) shows a call from the DPS to

the police as 2 males had been refused service and were refusing to leave.

Occurrence 44100412168 (11/10/10) – The DPS felt that the revoked SIA licence should be the responsibility of the agency supplying the doorstaff - logically it should, but as it is a condition on the license it is down to the DPS. There is nothing here to indicate whether or not the police took any action against the company supplying the unlicensed door supervisor

Occurrence 44100412168 (11/12/10) – Reading through the previous occurrences, there were very low numbers of people in the club anyway. The content of this occurrence also begs the question as to why the drugs dogs were not used to check people as they exited Finn M'Couls

Occurrence 44080417811 (09/12/10) – A 'tongue in cheek' comment by the owner of a security firm appears to have been interpreted as a 'long term business plan' for the premises – this is also reflected in PC Willson's statement (Appendix I). In summary progress had been made but the EHO still had concerns.

Occurrence 44100412168 (10/12/10) – Please see DPS statement.

Occurrences 44110001545 (01/01/11), 44110001646 (01/01/11), 44110002101 (01/01/11) are not related to an offender being in Legends – The section containing FACEBOOK printouts confirms this.

Occurrences 44110019918 (15/01/11) and 44110020176 (15/01/11) – A review of CCTV footage does not show a glassing nor of snooker balls in a sock. It does show two occurrences of disorder however, and Nigel Jones has advised the DPS that the bar should have been closed until the nature of the incidents had been ascertained and a decision on whether to resume service could be made.

The DPS was not present at the time of the incident, but arrived to be told by a member of door staff that there had been an incident.

Appendix H

These graphic pictures are the result of the rather bizarre behaviour of an individual who must be held responsible for his own actions.

Alexander Willson (Appendix I)

The DPS had been out to a member of staff's 21st Birthday Party and returned to the club with her. The birthday girl was only allowed soft drinks and had cola in her glass.

A review of CCTV has shown that a male did indeed stand on a pool table but was immediately got down. PC Willson is correct in his assumption that more pool tables would normally be available, however some had got wet during the earlier incident and had since been covered up so people wouldn't play on them.

The Door Supervisors are now wearing fluorescent tops both inside and outside the premises.

The Christmas and New Year was very quiet.

PC Skinner (Annex J)

It is understandable that the DPS was emotional given that she was making great efforts to improve the situation, goes out for a member of staff's 21st birthday and comes back to find problems and subsequently discovers that her ex-doorstaff (who were replaced at the request of the police) had returned and caused trouble.

Letter to DPS (Annex K)

There is a reference to sustainable working hours – just an observation here – many licensees work in excess of 100 hours per week.

Letter to DPS (Annex L)

The reference to the Operating Schedule in the letter isn't reflected on the Premises Licence. Paul Weston (Licensing Officer) advised that this was removed by the automatic cleaning up of Premises Licences when they are re-issued following a transfer of Premises Licence Holder.

Edward Van Dyck (Appendix 2)

Although the club has taken significant steps, customers and staff can still cause a disturbance on departure from premises.

Interested Parties (Appendix 3)

There has been increased police presence at weekends because of the compliance checks over the last few months which could be misconstrued as calls relating to disorder.

Ringwood Town Council are acting as a representative of interested parties in this matter. Councillor Woodfield owns Lets Accommodate which rents out properties neighbouring Legends, meaning there is a potential for conflict of interest.

Door Supervisors have helped to alleviate the situation, but more work needs to be done.

It is a great shame that people have to be told not to urinate in an alley, but they do.

With regard to Witness statement dated 15th February – Please see the DPS's Statement contained within this package.

Research

Nigel Jones spent two weekend evenings in Ringwood to assess the general situation. On the first occasion he spent the early evening in Ringwood and then travelled back to Bournemouth on the bus in the evening.

On the second occasion he spent the whole evening in Ringwood and stayed overnight at The Original White Hart in The Market Place.

Both experiences were interesting:

Early evening is not busy in Ringwood however there were people in a few establishments who looked to be 'in-drink'.

On the first visit (Saturday 26th February) Legends had a Super League Darts Match being played (as per Occurrence Number 44070549243) and a pleasant atmosphere to go with it.

The experience on the 21:25 X3 to Bournemouth was not all pleasant though. Throughout the journey a group of Fordingbridge males late teens to early twenties demonstrated very anti-social, loud and crude behaviour all the way to Bournemouth, including a stop to urinate in a hedge at Bournemouth Hospital. They were drinking cans and bottles of alcohol throughout the journey. Fellow travellers indicated that it was not unusual to see this sort of behaviour.

Following that experience the bus was used again on Saturday 5th March, this time it was the 17:05 from Bournemouth with a group of 15 & 16 year olds

PLANNING THEIR NIGHT OUT in Ringwood, not in pubs or clubs, but in parks and house parties. They were planning to crash a party and leave beer cans scattered everywhere.

An initial look at the town at 17:45 showed it to be quiet with only a minimal number of people watching football on Sky Italia in The Inn on Furlong, a couple of people in The Crown Tap, and a reasonable crowd of locals in The Star. After checking in to the Original White Hart and being disturbed by shouting from their smoking area another stroll around the town at 19:35 showed it to be very quiet and Legends to be empty. By 21:00 there were 4 people in Legends, approximately 30 in Finn M'Couls and a rowdy group of people (approximately 20) getting into mini-buses outside The Original White Hart – it became clear from the shouting that they were going to Bournemouth to 'celebrate' someone's birthday.

By 21:40 The Inn on the Furlong was busy (around 90 people in their thirties to sixties) as the band (Phoenix) got under way, while the Crown Tap had 10 customers, including two very much 'in-drink', with Karaoke as the entertainment. An hour later The Original White Hart had about 50 customers (including some rather loud young males), and Finn's had a 'pre-club' type atmosphere with about 70 people inside and more in the smoking area – Music videos were playing through the tv screens and the sound system and some people were singing and dancing to the music. There were two people on the front door and one in the back bar near

the smoking area – if they had SIA badges they were not obviously visible.

Around 23:00 the police arrived in the Market Place and went into Legends to do a check – At that point there were around 25 customers people in Legends plus staff.

By 23:30 The two drunk people from The Crown Tap were staggering around with a take-away from Keskins, and The Inn on The Furlong had a 'Pub Full' sign up. By 23:40 Finn's was emptying out.

At 00:16 Legends had approximately 50 customers and 'last orders' was called. The conversations were then about where to go next – some people booked taxis to Bournemouth and others arranged to go to each other's houses. A couple of people wandered in the direction of The Fish looking for food – probably heading for the petrol station.

The Police remained in The Market Place until The Door Supervisors left Legends (approximately 00:40). Another stroll round the town found three, underage-looking and very drunk, youth's carrying what looked to be alcohol, including cider, through a shopping centre at 00:50. They were stopped by the Police.

There wasn't much evidence of litter, but it was a quiet night. Litter accumulates at all times of day or night as people just abandon containers at the point they stop consuming them, they also urinate and vomit where they think they cannot be seen. It is very difficult to

stop someone once they start, so the best a premises try to stop them and to clear up after them regardless.

The next day it was very quiet in the town of Ringwood – this may be due to the cost of going to and from Bournemouth.

Working in Partnership

1) Actions for Legends

- a. Continue the practice of controlling entrance to the Driveway
- b. Provide the above Door Supervisor with club member photographs in alphabetical order in an effort to identify non-members at an earlier stage in the process.
- c. Introduce Late Night Hot Snacks to help absorb alcohol and reduce number of 'hungry' people walking through town to 24 hour garage.
- d. When introducing a policy ensure it applies to all (without exception).
- e. Organise regular meetings with neighbours and Environmental Health
- f. Maintain regular contact with the Police and advise them immediately of any issues.
- g. Write to all members asking if they wish to remain members.
- h. Carry out a regular surveys of members with regard to their expectations from the club.
- i. Training for DPS
 - i. Responsible Alcohol Retailing
 - ii. NCPLH & NCDPS
 - iii. Door Supervisor's Course
 - iv. BII Mentor
- j. Training for Staff
 - i. NCPLH
 - ii. Conflict Management

iii. Responsible Alcohol Retailing

iv. Drugs Awareness

k. Ensure the Outside Areas and immediate vicinity of Market Place is clean before going home.

2) Suggestions for Ringwood Pubwatch

a. Notify other premises if there are a significant number of people on your premises at the point when your plan to close your premises.

b. Introduce a 'Ring Around' scheme and ensure it is adhered to.

c. Notify other premises at the time someone is asked to leave your premises in order to meet the licensing objectives.

d. Utilise meetings to keep all licensed premises aware of law and best practice

e. Ensure Licensing Authority are present at meetings and invite responsible authorities.

3) Recommendation for Hampshire & Isle of Wight Constabulary

a. Nominate persistent offenders at Pubwatch meetings

4) Recommendation to New Forest District Council

a. In addition to points in DPS's Statement add a licensing condition relating to the Smoking Area

5) Actions for Interested Parties:

a. Reports any issues to DPS immediately for her to take action.

b. Monitor noise

Summary

The use of the Review process in this way is the proverbial 'sledgehammer to crack a nut', which has caused strain, worry, and distress for the Designated Premises Supervisor of Legends Club and her staff.

We all have a human reaction when we believe we are being unfairly treated which can result in a 'blinkered outlook' with the end result being two parties which believe the other understands exactly what they are saying, when in fact they are only listening to part.

In this case there appears to have been an unfortunate gap between the evidence and the interpretation.

This has however forced the business to fully consider its impact on others.

There are undoubtedly issues around noise, and knowledge of licensing objectives and their implications, which are in the process of being addressed.

Legend's certainly doesn't have the latest licence in: the Ringwood area; in Ringwood itself; nor indeed in the Market Place.

RELATED LEGISLATION AND STRATEGIES

- 1.23 The Licensing Act is part of a wider Government strategy to tackle crime, disorder and anti-social behaviour and reduce alcohol harm. Licensing authorities should develop effective strategies with the police, and the other enforcement agencies as appropriate, for the management of the night-time economy. Central to this would be the enforcement of the law relating to the sales of alcohol to drunk and underage people and drunkenness or disorder on, or in the immediate vicinity of licensed premises. Targeted enforcement of this kind, in line with the recommendations in the 'Hampton' report¹ should have a positive impact on the immediate vicinity of the licensed premises concerned.
- 1.24 Local authorities are also empowered under section 13 of the Criminal Justice and Police Act 2001 to make 'designated public place orders' (DPPOs) to control the consumption of alcohol in a public place outside of licensed premises.
- 1.25 In addition there is nothing to prevent the police, licensing authorities and the hospitality industry reaching agreement about best practice in areas where problems are likely to arise.
- 1.26 Licensing law is not the primary mechanism for the general control of individuals once they are away from a licensed premises and therefore beyond the direct control of individual licensees or certificate holders. However, licensees and certificate holders should take reasonable steps to prevent the occurrence of crime and disorder and public nuisance immediately outside their premises,

for example on the pavement, in a beer garden, or (once the smoking ban comes into force) in a smoking shelter, where and to the extent that these matters are within their control.

- 1.27 In addition, when considering a new premises licence or following reviews that have identified problems with a particular premises, licensing authorities may consider imposing conditions as appropriate, such as preventing customers from taking open containers outside the premises or installing CCTV. However, any conditions imposed must not be aspirational and must be within the control of the licensee. For example, a condition may require a premises to adopt a particular dispersal policy, but a licensee cannot force customers to abide by it.

Crime and Disorder Act 1998

- 1.28 All local authorities must fulfil their obligations under section 17 of the Crime and Disorder Act 1998 when carrying out their functions as licensing authorities under the 2003 Act.
- 1.29 Section 17 is aimed at giving the vital work of crime and disorder reduction a focus across the wide range of local services and putting it at the heart of local decision-making. It places a duty on certain key authorities, including local authorities and police and fire and rescue authorities to do all they reasonably can to prevent crime and disorder in their area.
- 1.30 The Government believes that licensing authorities should, as a matter of good practice, involve Crime and Disorder Reduction Partnerships (CDRPs) in decision-making in order to ensure that statements of licensing policy include effective strategies that take full account of crime and disorder implications.

LEGENDS CUE & SPORTS CLUB

My name is Nicky Binden and I have played pool and snooker as a hobby and have played at tournament level for the past 20 years. I always wanted to own my own pool/snooker club/sports bar and I have been the owner of Legends Cue & Sports Club since July 2002.

When I purchased the club it was know as the Phoenix Cue Club and there were 3 snooker tables, 4/5 pool tables, 1 9-Ball table, tv's, a Jukebox and a Bar!!! I did not purchase a Snooker Club I purchased a Members Sports Bar. Members came up to use the facilities of the club but they also came up socially too and sat at my bar all night and purchased drinks!!!

Back in 2002 there was a nightclub across the road called "The Red Rooms". Everyone would come into town early and leave the pubs including Legends at 11.30ish to continue drinking at the Nightclub till 2am. Early in 2003 I was asked by my members if I could provide entertainment in the club, so licence permitting at that time I had live entertainment at the club, solo and duo singers and I started having disco music whilst customers were playing pool and snooker.

The nightclub then shut around 2004/2005. The club shutting had an adverse effect on my business, people were not coming into town as they felt there was nothing to attract them into town. As a business I have to compete with all the other licensed premises in the town so with the new licensing act coming into force in 2005 and to move my club with the times, I applied like all the other licensed premises in Ringwood to open up later and have entertainment on my licence. I applied to have live music, karaoke and discos and have operated as a cue club/sports bar during the week and entertainments venue at weekends ever since. I sold the 2 snooker tables as they were hardly used. The last table was sold in 2007. I replaced them with pool tables and I now have 7 pool tables, of which 4 are moved on a Friday and Saturday night for the entertainment, the remaining 3 are played on.

Back in 2006, the club also only had 1 fire exit at the time which restricted the numbers to 60 people. With some of the pool and darts competitions and entertainment provided by the club attracting more than 60 people, for safety reasons I obtained planning permission and applied to have an external fire exit erected on the back of the premises which now potentially allows 180 people in the club.

So I have been at the club for nearly 9 years and I help organise the following:-
Ringwood Pool League, Wessex Pool League, Dorset County Pool Association.
At one time I also helped the Ringwood Dart League.

I also sponsor the Ringwood Pool League, The Alderholt Superleague Darts Team, The Ringwood Athletic Football Team and Dorset County Pool Association.

I also Run a Singles League for Pool Players and I have the Stables (Special Needs) in on Thursday Nights for the Free Pool and Karaoke/Quiz.

I also have around 30 Junior Members (14-17yrs old) who come up to play darts and take advantage of my pool deals and come into the club from 4.30pm till 8pm. Two of the lads have also been organising my open mic nights on a Friday night from 7.30pm till 9pm.

In my opinion if the club was not there it would have a huge impact on the community, not only for the pool players that travel to Ringwood to play pool on a weekly basis, but also the Ringwood people that use the facilities of the club during the week and for the entertainment I provide at weekends.

At weekends people who cannot afford to go out of town would in my opinion hang around in the town after closing especially outside Keskins, which is where a majority of people congregate anyway. They would cause more work for the police. I provide somewhere for people to go, something for people to do, they come to relax after their busy week. They are fully supervised in the premises and if they think about misbehaving, the doorstaff are on hand and the pubwatch scheme, hopefully deters them.

I have enclosed a petition signed by members of the club. As you can see there are all age groups that use the facilities of the club. I have also enclosed comments made on my facebook group Save Legends!

ABOUT THE REVIEW

In the review the club is being described as a nightclub. I consider myself to be a members sports bar offering entertainment at weekends. I have enclosed 3 pages from my website which details the opening hours and facilities of the club. Even though it states that the club closes at 11pm during the week, pool and dart matches often go over that time so during the week I leave around 11.45pm/12 midnight. On Friday and Saturday nights I had been providing entertainment from 9.30pm till 1.00am (7 hours per week), with the bar shutting at 12.50am, music off at 1am and everybody out by 1.15am at the latest. Since 25th February 2011 I have been closing at 12.30am on a Friday and Saturday night (bar shuts 12.20am/music off 12.30am) and everybody out by 12.45am at the latest.

I have read the review and I do not agree with the allegations made against the club, it appears that the club is getting the blame as it is the last place open. Incidents do happen in other premises. In my opinion all the licensed premises and the takeaways contribute in one way or another to the problems in the town. And incidents are not always drink related. It's a town and a majority of people living in and around the town have grown up here and they have disputes with other people living in the town, it could be family disputes or boyfriend/girlfriend disputes or just friends disputes. Some disputes are minor and other disputes are major where they feel the need to take matters into their own hands and what better place than if they see the person(s) they have a grievance with out in the town.

I have looked at the Occurrence sheets which the police have collated since January 2010. I am only aware of incidents that happened in and around my premises. I have never been made aware of some of the incidents the police have linked to my premises after I have closed.

On reflection I have to agree that before I changed the door company on 16th October 2010 there were problems at the club. The club was opening till 1.30am in the morning and there were a lot of outsiders mainly from the Trickets Cross area visiting the pubs in the town and even though I had barred some of them, they were hanging around in the town as the pub next to me was opening till 1am. They would come down the Alley into my smoking shelter and hang around, we would ask them to leave and after verbal altercations they would leave and go back into the Market Place. Sometimes they would hang around for their friends to come out of Legends at closing time and then they would deliberately cause trouble. Thankfully most of them no longer visit the town and the worst offenders/ringleaders are on Pubwatch.

Now I may be the DPS but I cannot run the premises single-handedly. I have to employ staff and train them on my requirements and rely on them. I do not have a door badge so at that time I employed a Door Company called Guardforce to manage the door for me. I gave them instructions on how I wanted them to operate the door, car park and alley. I first realised there was a problem when Amanda Barry from Police Licensing came to see me in May 2010. She highlighted her concerns over the Door Company. We went through my procedures and as you can see in her letter to me she made recommendations.

The first step I took was to go through those recommendations with the Head Doorman. I had worked with the Head Doorman for the past 3 years so I wanted to give him the opportunity to put in place the recommendations made to me. Unfortunately despite repeated requests from myself my guest book was not kept correctly and a couple of incidents occurred at the premises in a short space of time. It did not matter how many times I requested what was needed it just did not get done.

Then I also found out through one of the police checks that one of the doorman, who had his badge on him at all times, had actually had his badge revoked. I was shocked as I thought if a doorman showed me his badge, he was licensed. It did not occur to me a badge could be revoked and yet this person could still have the badge in his possession. As soon as I was made aware of the unlicensed doorman he did not work on my door again and I immediately started looking to replace the door company.

There were two further incidents inside the club in September 2010 and Amanda Barry from Licensing came to see me again on 21st September 2010 along with Pat Curran from Licensing and Inspector Douglas from the Police. Further actions were recommended, the main one being to replace the Door Team.

After meetings with Bryan Maddern from BKS Security Services they took over the door a month later on Saturday Evening 16th October 2010. I can confirm all the actions recommended by Amanda Barry have been put in place:-

1. The staff have regular refresher training.
2. The guest log is kept in a proper manner and log books are in place (part copies enclosed – original brought to hearing)
3. I have put a member of staff through the licensing course (copy of certificate enclosed)
4. A New Door Team have been recruited
5. No glasses off the premises, (they were never ever allowed off the premises anyway)
6. Condition of entry I made 12 midnight and not 12.30 as suggested. (Now 11.45pm)

I had also been having meetings since May 2010 with Mr Van Dyke from Environmental Health and on 30th September 2010 after reviewing my clubs procedures and after the meeting with Amanda Barry I put in further procedures to run the club which were as follows:-

1. Smoking Shelter closes at 12 Midnight. (Previously asked to shut at 12.30am)
2. Club closes at 1am. (Previously shutting at 1.30am) As from 25th February 2011 closing at 12.30am.
3. 2 Doorstaff on duty, one doorman goes up with a barrier at the very top of Alley from Midnight, now 11.00pm.

4. No Admission/Re-admission after 12 Midnight. (Now 11.45pm). So i have informed the smokers once you go outside you are escorted down the alley and you cannot come back in. CCTV kept from 10 till close. This should control the noise nuisance from rear of property and any alleged noise or disorderly behaviour at front of property will not be from Legends as in theory no legends customers will be outside from 12 Midnight until they leave at closing.
5. At approx 1.00am - 1.20am Customers will leave premises. They will be told to be quiet and escorted down the alley and asked to disperse and not congregate outside keskins. As from 25th February 2011 club shutting at 12.30am which means no one in the market place after 12.45am.

Then there was another meeting held on 9th December 2010. At the meeting I was informed that Partner Authorities agreed that there had been improvement, Amanda Barry in her statements says "a modest improvement" in the running of the club. At the meeting we spoke about the membership of the club as obviously customers congregate outside making a noise while being checked in, in my opinion it protects myself and the club as it is easy for me to refuse entry by saying "Sorry it's a members club" without having altercations with people. With regards to the noise complaint after the new procedures had been put in place Mr VanDyke informed me the complainants had refused for him to do further monitoring.

Bryan Maddern from BKS then made a tongue in cheek remark saying if there were no further incidents whatsoever over the next 6 months what about a 3am licence. We all made comments about this, and at the end of the discussions I made it clear that I did not plan to extend my licence. I was then informed the club was off the RED list as they were pleased with the progress made, however, compliance checks would still continue over the Christmas period until the end of December as they were doing licensing initiatives in the area.

Now if we look through the compliance checks listed since the new door company BKS took over from 16th October 2010 in my opinion they are in order, however in the review papers it is stated that over the last few months there has been a succession of serious incidents including a glassing. There has been one incident in the club on 14th/15th January 2011 and the police gave a press release to the local paper stating alleged stabbing in Ringwood Club (Article enclosed). The police actually watched the CCTV with me on the night and it showed NO stabbing, it has been stated it was a glassing but it appears a pint glass was smashed in the tussle and one of the males fell over onto the broken glass on the floor, and this cut his arm.

Now about the incident on 14th / 15th January 2011 I arrived back at the club at approximately 23.50pm after attending a 21st Birthday party to be informed a fight was taking place in the club. I went on the door and left the door staff in charge to deal with the situation. The incident involved two males and then subsequently a third male. Two of the males were ejected off the premises, the other male received treatment for a wound to his arm. The police were called by one of the doormen. The police arrived and asked me to close the club at 00.15am as it was believed at that time a stabbing had taken place. They taped off the club and took peoples names and addresses.

The police went and reviewed the CCTV footage of the incident with myself. The CCTV shows two males fighting then the males were broken up but then they started fighting again on the dance floor but it was broken up again. There is accusations of pool balls in a sock. There is no evidence of this on the CCTV. A male got up onto the pool table and within 5 seconds the doorstaff got him down. Again CCTV shows this. The 2 offenders were not local, one had been signed in by a member at 11.30pm and had been in the club 20 minutes.. The other had been in the club since around 9.30pm. It transpired he was not a member even though staff thought he was.

There is also a statement made about me asking a member of public to lie for me. (Annex P - Statement from member of the Public) I would like to make the following comments on the statement:

I can tell that the statement is written by my old doormans girlfriend Nichole. Nichole is angry with me because I have barred her partner Danny Stainer from the premises for being involved in the incident that took place in the club on 14th /15th January 2011. She has stated that Danny is not a member (I enclose a copy of his original membership form).

Danny is from Ringwood. Before employing the new door company BKS Danny had been a doorman at my premises on and off over the past 9 months. As Danny worked for me and Nichole was his partner she automatically had membership rights to the club even though she rightly says she never filled in a form.

At the incident on 14th /15th January 2011 I was furious that Danny, who is a SIA registered doorman and who I have known personally for 4 years decided to help his so called mate (Ian) who had caused a problem in my club instead of acting professional and correctly for the best interests of my club.

We were standing in the kitchen and Donna the door person from BKS was giving first aid to Ian's arm. Ian stated to me that he had previously been in trouble and this could cause further problems for him. I stated that the police had been called and he needed to stay to give a statement. The next thing I know is Danny, Nichole and Ian had all disappeared from the kitchen and left the venue before the police arrived. The police did however catch up with them as stated in Nicholes statement.

It was only on reviewing the CCTV I watched T-Shirts being swapped and them leaving the premises after I had asked them to stay. So two weeks later Nichole and Danny came back to the club and I spoke with Nichole and said Danny was barred and exactly what Nichole says in her statement "for trying to cover up what happened by changing t-shirts with Ian"

and I informed Nichole I was not happy with Dannys actions. I then said "I have to do the right thing for the club and make the right decisions". I then went on to talk to Nichole about who had signed Ian in on the night as I thought it was Danny, it was not Danny it was another member that had signed him in, but nevertheless I was still disappointed and angry that Danny's actions could jeopardise my licence and livelihood.

I have never asked anyone to lie for me. As previously stated I was just arriving at the premises at the time the incident occurred. I have CCTV so I would look pretty stupid if it did not match. I have always got on with Nichole and am disappointed with the contents of her statement towards me, but like I said it is because Danny has been barred.

Also it is alleged a 17 year old had been served alcohol in the club and was arrested on suspicion of wounding. The 17 year old was not involved in any fight in the club. Disappointingly, the CCTV showed the 17 year old gaining entry into the club at 11.30pm. There was a queue at the door and the 17 year old spoke to the head doorman and when the doorman turned his back he sneaked past him up the stairs. CCTV shows the 17 year old does not buy a drink at the bar all night, he is however seen on the CCTV picking a drink up from a table and drinking it, but we do not know the contents of the drink. I have been informed all charges have been dropped against the 17 year old.

On watching this incident on 14th/15th January 2011 on CCTV I was not happy with the way the head doorman dealt with the incident in the club, nor was I impressed that a 17 year old got past him on the door. He was also the person the police felt was over-zealous with a couple of people the following night. He has subsequently been replaced. I have also introduced a further policy which is people wishing to become members must be local to the area or are personally know to me or my staff, or they will not be gaining entry into the club. And when members bring in guests I am asking them for ID to verify the name and address given to me and make sure they are over 18. I am also encouraging guests that are local to join. We are also only letting small groups through at a time from the barrier to the front door.

Now I have read the statement made by PC Skinner regarding the incident that took place on 14th / 15th January 2011 and also other observations he has made about the running of the club and would like to make the following comments:

PC Skinner mentions a staff member Hannah Street. I had been to 2 of my staffs 21st Birthday party at the Elm Tree in Ringwood. I had made a slide show for them on my screens so I agreed with them they could come into the club for the remainder of the disco to see their personal slide show. One of the girls mentioned (Hannah Street) was not drunk, she was merry. Hannah had not been in the club all evening, she arrived at the club at approximately Midnight. Hannah had coke in her glass. (Statement from Hannah Street enclosed)

PC Skinner mentions my members list. The list is updated once a month. A full membership database exists on the computer in my office (Called Paxton Access) with the members full details and photo so if I or the doorstaff do not recognise a member we check on the database. Members also have membership cards. I know a lot of peoples names and faces as I have had the club over 8 years! (Membership List/Photos to be brought to Review)

PC Skinner mentions lack of refusals during the festive period. The reason there was limited refusals for Christmas Eve and New Years Eve was because we were not that busy over the festive period. PC Skinner states that the refusals register implies that intoxicated persons were allowed entry into the club on a regular basis. If people are turned away at the top of the alley or on the door "word" soon gets round and so people are then less likely to try and gain entry into the club because they know they will be refused entry.

PC Skinner mentioned to me that he had heard I had put in a review to extend my licence to 3am. I informed PC Skinner that this was a comment made by Bryan Maddern of BKS at the meeting held on 9th December 2010. I was however happy with the licence I already had so if a representation had or was being made to extend the licence it was without my knowledge. To my knowledge no review has been submitted. PC Willson asked me the same question too.

PC Skinner states that I demonstrated poor leadership skills and problem solving. In my opinion, every single thing that has ever been asked of me from Licensing, the Police, Environmental Health I have done to the best of my ability and within the Licensing objectives. With my permission Bryan Maddern from BKS even deployed a drugs dog to my premises in December 2010. He liased directly with the Police and I would have thought the Police would have taken full advantage of this as it was not costing them any money and arranged for a visit in all licensed premises in the area, not just mine and the White Hart. After all a majority of customers that end up at Legends have been in the other licensed premises first.

So when PC Skinner and PC Willson came in regarding the assault on 14th/15th January 2011 and criticized me and the running of my business and mentioned to me the reputation they said the club had I was shocked and I said to them "What do you recommend then". They did however inform me that I was not the only late night premises in the area that they felt caused problems, there was one in Fordingbridge and one in Lynton.

I am also surprised that the police are prepared to take witness statements from so called "drunk" or "intoxicated" people and accept what they say without checking the facts. As I have already said my CCTV footage is my evidence. And I have also mentioned to the police on numerous occasions that if they have an incident with a customer and it is proved they were at Legends, if they let me know about it I am happy to bar them from my premises and if the incident is serious to nominate that person to go on Pubwatch.

There are also further logs made by the police and am going to address these. The first one was on 19th December 2010. It was nothing to do with an incident inside the club but to do with a young lady that was found collapsed in the street up the road at approximately 2.00am. My understanding was she hit her head. Yes she had been drinking in the club and was ok when she left. One of the door staff (Donna Phillips Allen) drove past on the way home and saw her collapsed in the street. She had a coat in the car which she put over the girl to keep her warm and stayed with the girl until the ambulance arrived. I drove past too but did not stay to assist as I saw Donna dealing with the situation.

The next incident recorded is on 1st January 2011 at 2am in the morning, and again it is not an incident in the club. It was New Years Eve. A group of 5 came into the club well known to myself as they use the club on a regular basis. They entered the club at approx 11.15pm and they left at approx 1.20am. CCTV shows they are not drunk leaving. A couple came in the club, their ID showed the lady was from Ringwood. I spent 5 minutes chatting to them and as it was new year they signed in. They came in at approx 11.25pm and left at approx 1am. CCTV shows they are laughing with a member at the top of the stairs before leaving and walk off together down the High Street. They are not drunk. Then a stabbing takes place in Cloughs Road at approx 2am which is over a mile away from the club. It involved the couple and one of the people in the group of 5 named Roy Clark. My understanding is the couple had a domestic just round the corner from their home. Anyway Mr Clark got involved along with another lad who was at a house party a couple of doors down. The guy in the couple was not happy with the interference so he went back to his house got a knife and stabbed the 2 people that got involved in the neck. To suggest this could be linked in anyway to my premises is ridiculous. (I have enclosed a statement from T Clark who is the wife of one of the victims stabbed)

The next incident recorded is on 28/01/11 at 23.56pm. Again it is not an incident in the club but damage to a window then damage in the public toilets by someone who had been in the club earlier that evening but who had been asked to leave as he had a disagreement with his friends and we considered him to be drunk. He was escorted off the premises on his own by the Doorman at approx 23.15pm. He left no problem. Again, to suggest this could be linked in anyway to my premises is ridiculous especially as other licensed premises were still open at that time. (I enclosed a statement from him regarding the incident)

I am also aware of another incident on 18/12/10 in which the antiques window got smashed which is reported in Inspector Douglas's report and that £16,000 worth of damage was done. One of the offenders who is also responsible for the incident on 28/01/11 had not been drinking in Legends at all that night. His friends informed me that they drank at home, came into town for drinks, then they were heading to the pub next door to Legends for a drink. The offender was greeted by someone standing outside the antiques shop, a tussle took place and they both went through the shop window. One of the offenders who is a member of the club left the scene and came up to legends. He had been in the club 10 minutes, he had not consumed alcohol on the premises. The police came and arrested him. On his next visit to the club I was going to bar him but he informed me all the charges had been dropped against him. (I enclosed a statement from him regarding the incident)

Now I will comment on the statements and letters from the George Mews residents. Firstly I had a meeting with the George Mews residents back in July 2007. At that meeting they made the same allegations they have written in their letters of urinating, littering, vomiting, broken glass from customers using the club. After the meeting they accepted it was not all to do with the club. I agreed to put signs up down the alley and I purchased barriers to put around the cars to protect them too and I said I would police the Alley as best possible considering it is a public right of way. A meeting was then scheduled again in January 2008. I enclosed a copy of the minutes I personally took from 31st July 2007, a copy of the letter sent to me of the meeting of 29th January 2008 and also a copy of the phonecall note the Licensing Officer received (Tony Hetherington) from Nina Ironsides who used to live in Flat 1 George Mews as she could not make the meeting. That phonecall note was given to us and read out at the meeting on 29th January 2008. That was the last meeting I have had with the Residents.

Now I understand the George Mews is situated between the middle of two licensed premises and we are neighbours and consideration must be given to them, so I invited them to visit the club, I gave them my mobile number and said if they have any problems whatsoever from customers etc if they inform me I will investigate it, check it on the CCTV and if turns out to be a customer I will take the appropriate action. They have never once contacted me but yet the accusations still continue.

Some of the George Mews Residents are painting a terrible picture of the club and yet if it is a bad as they are suggesting why aren't more residents complaining about the so called urinating, littering, vomiting, broken glass especially No 1 and No 12 who are actually situated in the alley and my car park.

In fact the resident in No 1 has been in the club on a couple of occasions and I spoke with him directly on 31/03/11 about the situation. He informed me he did not want to take sides, nor did he want to see me out of business. He said things had improved dramatically in the past few months, the main issue was always noise, especially when couples have arguments and shout. He did say to me that he could not confirm that the shouting was linked to the club, he was in the town centre so noise was to be expected, but it was the shouting that would disturb him.

Also with regard to the Residents that live in Wardour House, the Bickerely. Unfortunately there is an Alley which leads to a short cut to people going home to the Bickerely. You cannot attribute every person using the short cut as a customer of Legends.

With regards to the Residents feeling a prisoner in their own home, whether I am there or not people will still come into town and use the pubs, restaurants and Keskins Takeaway and they would still go down the alley. Without the alley being monitored people would be free to roam up and down it unchallenged. I therefore feel the alley has never been safer, I personally police the alley 7 days a week, I light up the alley, provide CCTV down the alley and provide a doorman from 9.30pm till close on a Friday and Saturday night all at a cost to myself.

With regards to the alleged urinating, Keskins Takeaway shop is directly below me. They open 7 days a week until 12 Midnight, they do not have toilet facilities. What happens is people come out of the pubs, go into Keskins for something to eat, realise they need a wee and cant be bothered to walk to the furlong toilets so they nip down the alley and urinate mainly at the top of it, some walk down to not be seen and urinate. Since I have been monitoring the alley I would say you get one incident of urinating a week down there as opposed to 10/15 a week before.

With regards to littering down the Alley, I do not sell beer cans, Keskins have a licence to sell alcohol off the premises. And with regards to littering in the Market Place there are numerous licensed premises in the town and a majority of them do not have door staff on Friday and Saturday nights which allows customers to smoke at the front entrances of their establishments and take their drinks and bottles with them. I am not saying none of my customers have ever urinated or taken bottles or glasses away from the premises, but I can assure you it is a very small minority as I have door staff to control them. Also we have the Underage Kids milling around the town too some with bottles and cans of Alcohol in their hands which they have brought into the town with them.

I have also had Police compliance checks most weekends since October 2010. The officers would come to the Market place and walk up and down the alley to the clubs entrance. I am sure that if they had seen litter, any signs of urinating or any vomit in the alley or car park leading to the clubs entrance they would comment on it to me. Also I do not open on Sundays, only for pool every other month during the day and have not opened on the Sunday Night Bank Holidays for well over 18 months!!

Also during the evening and into the early hours of the morning after all the premises have shut in the town people visit the 24 hour Texaco petrol station, people come back from having a night out in other areas such as Salisbury, Fordingbridge, Christchurch, New Milton, Bournemouth, some walk, some get a taxi or get the bus and also people walk home after being round friends houses so to suggest my premises is the major cause of littering and nuisance is ridiculous.

Now allegations are being made that customers are drunk in my premises or drunk leaving the premises. I would like someone to define to me what a "Drunk" person is? We look for slurred speech, glazed eyes, unable to get their money out of their pocket and they stagger around. They can however act very sober when challenged!!

In my opinion my customers are fine in the club, but when they hit the fresh air and hang around outside Keskins or walk home it is obvious the alcohol content they have drunk during the evening will take effect. I have enclosed various pictures of the clubs car park, alley and in the market place. The pictures are at 12 midnight when the smoking shelter closes and at closing time to show how many customers are outside in the Market Place. They normally hang around in the market place for 10 minutes then disperse.

I know I have to work with the neighbours so I hand delivered them the following letter attached on 31st March 2011.

I take my licensing objectives very seriously. I am a woman on her own in business. The club is not brewery run it belongs to me personally and if I was to lose the licence I would also lose my livelihood and my 8 part-time staff would lose their jobs. Listed below is the clubs procedures and how I enforce the licensing objectives:-

- 1) The club operates mainly as a sports bar from Sunday to Thursday (43 hours per week), there is some form of entertainment licence permitting on a Thursday ie Karaoke/Quiz. The club then operates as an entertainments venue providing Karaoke, Live Music, Open Mic Night and Discos on a Friday/Saturday Night (6 hours per week).
- 2) During the week the club shuts at 11.45pm/12 Midnight. On a Friday and Saturday Night the club shuts at 12.30am (it used to be 1.30am, but was reduced to 1am on 30/09/10 and is now 12.30am from 25/02/11) – Staggered times for premises closing stops the congregation of people outside in the street at the same time thus reducing the risk if incidents outside.
- 3) Every Friday and Saturday Night I employ BKS Security services who currently provide 2 SIA Doorstaff from 9.30pm till 12.45am.
- 4) The Doorstaff fill in a Log Sheet every Friday and Saturday Night which details half hourly fire exit checks, half hourly capacity log checks, half hourly floor and toilet checks. It also details Refusals at the door for either Being Drunk, having no ID, being underage and for Non members. It also details any incidents we may have during the evening. A random search policy is operated as well and I also keep a separate diary as well. We have radios and Doorstaff are in contact with me at all times.
- 5) There is also CCTV on the premises (16 cameras) which covers the Market Place, The Public Alley, The Car Park, The Entrance to the club and inside the club. The CCTV is kept on a Friday and Saturday Night from 9.30pm till 2am as evidence to back up any paperwork/allegations made against the club.
- 6) I am a member of the Ringwood Pubwatch Scheme and attend meetings once a month.
- 7) At the entrance to the premises, in and around the premises and in the toilets are posters. These posters are about Pubwatch, Challenge 21 scheme, Zero Tolerance Drugs Policy, Being Quiet when leaving the premises, Your Life Your Future Drugs Poster and No urinating Posters. Also down the Alley are signs asking patrons to be quiet while using the club and no urinating.

- 8) I operate the Challenge 21 Policy, all guests coming into the club have to produce ID, either photo driving licence or passport. For older clientelle who do not have ID, if I know the member I use my discretion.
- 9) I am a members club so guests must be signed in by a member, guests must produce ID and their details are written in the signing in book and the member signs them in. I am however encouraging guests to join. New Members fill in the membership form, they must produce ID and a photo is taken of them. I am vetting all customers wanting to become members. They must be local to the area, or be known by a member who I know very well or staff, or I must know them personally.
- 10) Members are then issued with a membership card to present on the door. Even if a member has a membership card, if we don't recognise the member they are still asked to produce their ID to verify it is their card to gain entry to the club.
- 11) Each completed membership form is entered onto the membership database where all names and addresses are stored and membership lists are printed out on a regular basis. This is on hand at all times and down on the door on a Friday and Saturday Night along with the barred list and Pubwatch Barred List. Any queries concerning membership are looked up on the database on the night.
- 12) To determine whether someone is drunk before entering the premises we speak to them when they are at the door. They are asked whether they are a member or not and they are asked for ID. This gives us time to access the individuals state before allowing them into the premises.
- 13) Behind the bar is a refusals register. If staff believe members/guests have had too much to drink they write their name on the sheet and inform either myself or a member of doorstaff. That person is accessed whether they can remain in the club, if not they are asked to leave and are escorted off the premises down the alley by the doorstaff.
- 14) During the evening the doorstaff and I monitor the customers and if anyone is considered to be in a drunken state they are asked to leave. The staff also glass collect and once again if they see anyone who is considered to be in a drunken state they inform myself or doorstaff.
- 15) From 11pm onwards a doorman polices the alley and will stand at the top of the alley and assess peoples state before letting them down the alley to gain entry into the club.
- 16) When customers leave we get them to leave in small groups and they are asked to be quiet and escorted down to the end of the alley. If for any reason they do stand around outside keskins, I go down outside along with some of my staff and ask them to move on and they normally disperse no problem.

Even though Amanda Barry advised me that she did not think I should do the Door course as I am the DPS and she sees it as a conflict of interest. In my opinion that bit of advice has actually gone against me as I am being told that as DPS I am personally held responsible for all situations that arise at the premises, including the actions of the Door Staff. I am therefore going on the SIA door course within the next month as I need to know that the Door Staff are doing their jobs correctly.

I will also be bringing my computer to the hearing with my CCTV footage and my diaries.

RECOMMENDATIONS

As with any business in the current climate a business does not survive just with the weeks trade. It takes a majority of its money at weekends mainly on a Friday and Saturday Night. In the current climate people are not currently coming out until 10pm at night (they use to come out at 8pm), they are buying cheap drink from the Supermarket first, drinking at home and then coming out into town.

As the licence is for review I would like to make the following recommendations:-

1. Still keep the membership. I have enclosed revised membership rules. (copy enclosed)
2. Still keep the entertainment for the club (I have never had a complaint about music from the premises)
3. Club to close by 12.30am (Bar shuts 12.20am /Music off at 12.30am) on Friday and Saturday Nights, with the exception of Christmas Eve and New Years Eve, club closes by 1.00am.(Bar shuts 12.50am /music off at 1.00am). So far I have been closing at 12.30am and have not had any problems. If I am unable to keep noise down to a minimum or I have problems over the next few months then I will personally take the step to close on a Friday and Saturday night at 12 Midnight.
4. On my licence I only require 1 SIA registered doorman after 12 Midnight, but I will continue to have a doorman police the top of the alley on Friday and Saturday nights from 11pm, or if it gets busy earlier I will send him up there earlier to keep noise down to a minimum.

Finally, I would like to say that everyone who has been involved with this review has a very difficult job to do, especially the police who have to deal with the aftermath of many problems. As previously stated I do not feel all the problems stem from Legends. I will always continue to meet my licensing objectives and will always continue to co-operate in full with the Authorities.

THREE men were arrested and released on police bail after an alleged stabbing in Legends nightclub in Ringwood at about midnight on Friday.

Police say a man suffered a cut to his upper arm in the incident.

A 23-year-old from Bournemouth was arrested on suspicion of assault and possession of an offensive weapon, a 17-year-old from Ringwood was arrested on suspicion of wounding with intent and a 24-year-old from Fordingbridge was arrested on suspicion of causing grievous bodily harm with intent.

All will have to surrender to bail on March 6.

1. Introduction

The Chairman explained the reason of the informal meeting.

The 2003 Licensing Act changed the law to allow premises to stay open 24 hours a day. There were issues resulting from this but also it allowed establishments to determine what hours they would like to open with the consent of the Police, Fire, local residents etc. This was to allow people to conduct their businesses in such a way that would permit the community to have the benefit of these services.

The New Forest District Council (NFDC) had no power to change the licenses of establishments, this power was held solely by the Licensing Panel, which granted the licenses initially. The only people who could ask for a review were the people affected by the premises. The law allowed for meetings, and this was an informal meeting before events progressed.

Issues had been brought to his attention at a police meeting about some of the behaviour emanating from the premises, although it may not actually come from the place in question. The reports were that the public were urinating and vomiting in the alleyway. The Chair reported that he had a meeting with Nicky a couple of months ago.

2. Discussions

The Chair asked the Residents whether they had a nominated representative to speak. They had not. He asked them if they wished to speak.

NINA Leena from Number 1 George Mews spoke first. She had a big problem with people urinating and sickness. It had changed recently with people from Legends moving the public on, although the urinating was still happening, as was the vomiting. The noise level she appreciated was from the town where she lived.

The Chair asked where the people came from. *MARC NINA* Leena replied that most people came out about 12.30am / 1.00am, from the premises that were open at that time - Legends. She could hear them urinating and being sick while she was in bed and she had a 5-year old child. She had only 2 nights sleep and had sometimes to wear earplugs.

John Tomlinson of Wardow House spoke next. He expressed his concern about the noise element, drunken behaviour, sickness etc which seemed to happen within 100 yards of Jakes Lane and which had escalated over the past 6 months. He picked up empty vodka bottles from the street etc. There was a lack of police presence between 11pm and 2am.

Mrs Taylor stated that she was woken at 1.30am.

The Chairman clarified that there were issues with urinating and vomiting but also with the wider issues of drunkenness and disorderly behaviour.

Drew from Number 2 George Mews spoke next. He stated that the situation had developed over the last 18 months and was very unpleasant, especially if people were staying with him. It was not pleasant for them to come in at night and witness this behaviour and it was quite intimidating having drunken youths in groups urinating. This was not how it was and had definitely deteriorated.

Sgt Gallagher stated that a Street Meeting had been held on Friday and there had been an increase in disorderly behaviour at Pocket Park. On Friday there were 5 Police Officers there. Letters had been sent to parents.

Mr Tomlinson stated that there was a knock-on effect with the smoking ban as various people were setting up for people to have a smoke and this could be in the early hours of the morning. All had to live together but it was getting out of hand.

Sgt Gallagher stated that the turnout at Legends was a 1.30am and was a targeted patrol for the Police, although presence depended on what was going on elsewhere at the time. Nicky at Legends and her staff ushered people out. In the last 8 weeks there had been 12 incidents reported, urination, loud noise and people in the back smoking. There was 1 recorded incident of damage.

Doreen Summer from St George Mews stated that their wall was the car park wall, and not only did they get things thrown over, but car doors slammed and girls screamed etc.

X NNA
 Leena (No. 1) stated that there were 3 car parking spaces for the residents of George Mews and these spaces were used as a turning point for people getting takeaways. There was a beer garden at the back with picnic tables with umbrellas and there was a whole group of people out there making noise.

The Chairman stated that a sum up would be done at the end of the meeting and what redress they had on these issues.

An unidentified resident of George Mews asked whose responsibility it was to pick up all the rubbish every night. There was no bin. The response was given that Legends shut at 12pm and leave at 1am and clean outside. The Mews resident stated that the rubbish was left until the next morning.

The Chair had spoken to Nicky about 18 months ago and she now had a bouncer to move people away.

Nicky stated that she had a third member of staff on, so there were now 3 members of staff plus her to police the car park and the alleyway every Friday and Saturday night. She had personally been out there every Friday and Saturday night. Nicky had kept a log of incidents and the majority of offenders were people waiting in Keskins for taxis. This was an issue as there was no taxi rank, nor toilets.

Nicky explained that she had CCTV installed at the front of the club, down the alleyway and in the car park at the back.

Nicky went through her log of the incidents experienced.

The Chairman stated that the new Act of Parliament stated that there was more responsibility on licensees that people behaved responsibly and, as such he suggested that: Notices be placed on the walls of the alleyway to state that people should be quiet; People from the club were stationed on the alleyway, however, bouncers had no legal right to do that and were putting themselves at risk. People did make noise when they left and even talking could sound very loud when residents were in bed and licensees could put up notices for people out there. Outside of the alleyway, the wisdom was to get people away asap.

12/11/11
 Tony Heaveridge stated that he had attended a Pub Watch meeting and there was a consultation with regard to converting some car parking bays on the main road into part-time taxi bays, so as to allow taxis to park and pick up. This would provide a short-term temporary facility to whisk people away asap. This would not happen imminently, as it had to go through a committee.

A resident stated that Planning Permission had been given for a fire escape at the back and went on to say that having a greater number of people would escalate the problems. Nicky replied that

the exit would not be used unless there was an emergency, however, the resident said that that was not the point. The point was that more people would be in the club. Nicky confirmed that the potential number would be 200, which at present was 80.

The Chairman stated that Nicky provided staff but there was nothing on her license for providing staff outside of the premises, although the bouncer was at the bottom of the door and a total of four people were outside making sure people left in an orderly manner.

Residents were still concerned over people using their parking spaces to turn their cars in and to temporarily park in when visiting the takeaway. Nicky offered to put barriers up to discourage this. This was accepted by those present.

Mr Tomlinson stated that there was a knock-on effect 200 yards away. The antisocial behaviour was fuelled from alcohol and it emanated from all the places in Ringwood. Bouncers would do nothing and was left to the Police. He suggested that a contribution be made to the constabulary to get extra police on Friday and Saturday nights. Sgt Gallagher stated that dispersal from the club was due to the Police. The only way was to target the areas that may be a problem. There was no way that anyone could fund a Police Officer. The juvenile drinking was to be targeted. The Police would organise a street meeting for anyone to come along and this would be publicised.

The Chairman urged both licensees (Legends and Keskins) to clear away the litter from the alleyway.

The Chairman stated that residents affected by the public nuisance from the premises, disorderly behaviour, crime, the safety of children, could ask for the license to be reviewed. The license would be reviewed by a Licensing Panel (3 Ringwood Councillors). That usually was the last resort. There was also a Right of Appeal for either party after the decision had been made.

Drew stated that the commercial advantage was costing people quality of life. People were attracted to the premises because it opened later.

The Chairman stated that may be a solution could be found. On one hand there was the business and the other the residents. With regard to a license review, there were such reasons as "vexatious" and "frivolous" representations, where by the Licensing Panel could disregard any complaints / representations made either attacking Nicky personally or for numerous complaints over trivial matters.

The representative from Keskins stated that it was difficult to control those people who were drunk and Police presence was required from 11pm to 1am.

3. Conclusion

The meeting got rather heated at this stage and The Chair went through the points that Nicky had agreed to, i.e. the barriers, notices and escorting customers out of the premises and out of the alleyway at closing time. He went on to suggest that another meeting be held in two months' time. This was agreed.

Telephone Call from Nina Ironsides, 1 The George Mews, Ringwood.

Nina rang me just before lunchtime on Tuesday, 29 January 2008. She told me that she was not able to attend the meeting tonight because of commitments at Southampton University. But she did feel that it was important that her views were heard at the meeting. Particularly as her property is the most vulnerable of those properties in the Mews, to noise, people urinating and vomiting in the passageway.

She wanted it clearly understood by everyone at the meeting that she was not taking sides nor supporting particular people. Rather she wanted to report it as it had happened to ensure fair play all round.

Nina went on to say that she had been impressed by the fact that Ms Binden (Nicky), the licensee of Legends Snooker Club had been true to her word. At the previous meeting she had promised to erect barriers on Friday and Saturday evenings, man the barrier herself whenever possible and erect notices asking people to be quiet and not to use the passageway as a toilet.

Ms Ironside told me that the effect of this was that her quality of life was immediately increased and continues to be at an acceptable level. The two or three times a week clean-up of vomit and urine from her front patio is no longer necessary. Likewise the noise from people passing in the passageway has reduced considerably and is not currently a problem. She had also spoken on a number of occasions with the licensee regarding the problems and had been received in a professional manner and felt able to discuss any issues.

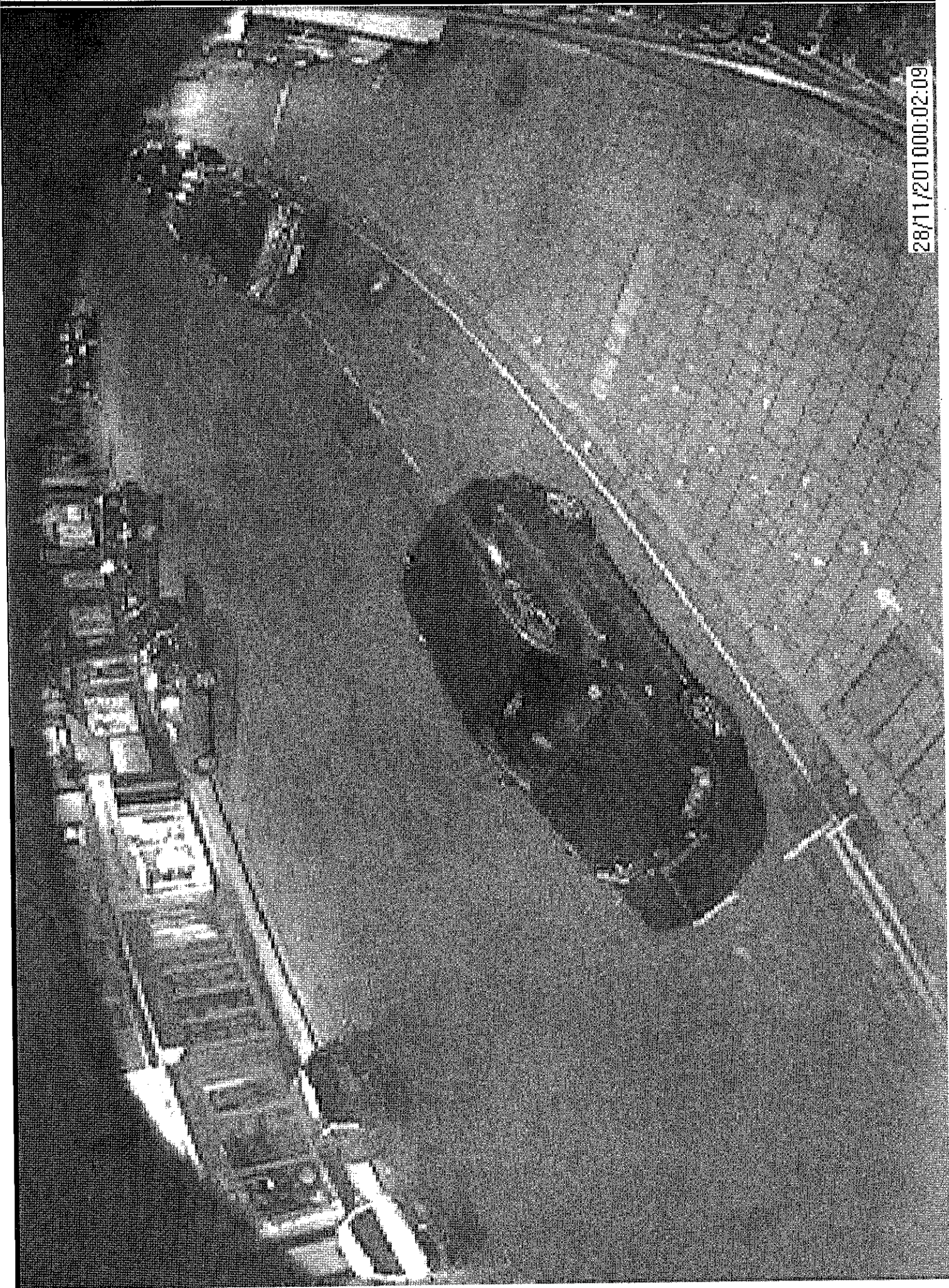
The downside was that the urinating had moved away from the barrier to the beginning of the passageway, nearer the Market Place. Also a certain amount of noise continued to be heard but this was not music noise from the club. Some of it was in fact music from a pub the other side of the Mews, Fynn McCols. Having said that she felt that for the most part it was general background noise that would be expected in any town centre.

There are still issues with the number of Keskins vehicles using the passageway. They only used to have one vehicle but now up to five service the business and are constantly using the ally way until late at night.

She felt that the problems she was now experiencing were now not specific to Legends, rather they were of a more general nature and should be dealt with by the appropriate bodies. Furthermore, she feels that a good solution to stop people urinating full stop in the ally way would be to have a gate at the top that would be manned on a Friday and Saturday night. This seemed to Nina to be the only solution to stop people entering down the ally way to urinate and 'hang out'. She felt that it would mean the people then going down the alley would only do so if they had a purpose and this should stop people hanging out in the ally way.

Over the last few months I have taken a variety of measures in a concentrated effort to reduce the people noise levels in our smoking area, car park, and shared driveway.

I hope you have seen and experienced some beneficial results.

I have sited a licensed Door Supervisor and a barrier at the Market Place entrance to Old George Mews from 11.45pm on Friday and Saturday nights. The aim of this is to turn away any rowdy people before they venture down our shared driveway, rather than at the entrance to Legends. The Door Supervisor is going to be up there from 11pm as from next week.

Legends is currently closing at 12.30am. To keep noise down to a minimum the smoking shelter in the car park is closing at 12 midnight and at closing customers are being monitored down the alley in small groups into the market place.

The purpose of this letter is to seek your thoughts and establish if this action has caused you any unnecessary inconvenience.

I personally believe that the benefit would outweigh any inconvenience caused, and certainly would not want you to feel that you cannot get in and out of your homes.

Legends Club Rules, Terms and Conditions (at 31/03/11)

NAME

1. The club is called Legends.

OBJECTS

2. The objects of the club shall be to provide sporting and social facilities for its members and their guests and for enjoying general entertainment and the supply of intoxicating liquor at the club premises.

CONSTITUTION

3. The club is a proprietary club, the proprietor being Bindle Ltd t/a Legends.
4. The club premises is located at First Floor, 17 Market Place, Ringwood, Hampshire, BH24 1AN.
5. For the purpose of these rules and the management of the club the expression "the proprietor or the proprietors" wherever used in these rules, shall mean the Director(s) of Legends or and other persons as the company may from time to time appoint to act on its behalf with the delegated authority.

MEMBERSHIP

6. There shall be the following categories of membership:-
 - a. Full Membership – over 18 years.
 - b. Joint Membership – husband and wife or boyfriend/girlfriend living at same address both over 18.
 - c. Junior Membership – 14-17 years.
7. Free Membership is offered to Members who represent the club or at the discretion of the Proprietor.
8. Applications for membership must be proposed by the proprietor, a member of staff or another member of the club who shall vouch for the applicants fitness for membership. Proposals for membership must be on the forms provided for that purpose and must be completed in full and signed by the applicant for membership.
9. Subscriptions are set and published by the Proprietors at such level as they think fit and their decision in this respect shall be final.
10. Subscriptions shall be due and payable on acceptance as a member and thereafter annually or on such date(s) as the proprietors may decide from time to time.
11. When an accepted applicant has paid their first annual subscription, they shall be a member of the club and be entitled to all the privileges of membership and shall be deemed to have agreed to be bound by these rules.
12. Every member shall be issued with a Membership Card and a copy of the Club Rules.
13. Entry to the Club may be refused to any person not having their Membership Card in their possession.
14. Membership is not transferable.
15. The Proprietor may terminate the Membership of any Member whose subscription is more than one month in arrears. His/her name shall be removed from the list of registered Members and he shall immediately cease to be a Member and forfeit all rights of Membership.
16. The appointment and dismissal of all Club servants shall be vested solely in the Proprietor. Any Member who shall interfere with such appointment or who shall incite any Club servant to leave the employment of the Club shall at the discretion of the Proprietors be expelled.

17. Each Member shall inform the Management or Proprietors of his/her address and promptly of any changes thereto. Notices may be given to Members either by prepaid letter addressed to the relevant Member at the last address he/she furnished to the Proprietor or by prominently displaying such notice to Members on a notice board within the Club.

MEMBERSHIP RIGHTS AND LIABILITIES

18. Every member of the club shall be subject to the rules in force and are entitled to use and enjoy (in common with other members of the club) the club premises and things therein, provided by the club or the use of the club, except when the equipment is required for special events and competitions and shall not by reason of his or her membership be under any financial liability.

GUESTS

19. Members may introduce bona fide guests but no person shall be permitted as a guest at the club on more than six occasions in any one year, if so they must then apply to become a member of the club.
20. If a member introduces a guest (Up to 6 Guests at any one time), the name and address of the guest shall be written in the visitors Book kept for that purpose.
21. On application to the proprietor a member may introduce to the club on a special occasion, which has previously been pre-booked, an unrestricted number of guests, providing that the names and addresses of these guests are available for inspection at the club premises 48 hours before the special occasion takes place.
22. Members must accompany their bona fide guests introduced by them during the period of their stay in the club and it shall be the members responsibility for their good conduct whilst they are on the club premises and that they comply with the rules of the club.
23. Members must not leave the club premises before their guests.
24. The following shall not be admitted as guests:-
- a. former members who have been expelled
 - b. persons who, having applied for membership, have been rejected
 - c. members who are under suspension
25. Guests shall pay an admission charge as directed – this can be changed at the discretion of the proprietor.

VISITORS

26. Persons, other than members and their guests, may be admitted to the premises and intoxicating liquor may be sold or supplied to them, providing these persons are sportsmen and sportswomen connected with any sporting activity facilitated, provided, conducted or supervised by the club.

BYE-LAWS

27. The Proprietor from time to time can make, vary and revoke bye-laws (not inconsistent with these Rules) for the regulation of the internal affairs of the Club and the conduct of Members. Until revoked all bye-laws shall be binding on the Members.

CONDUCT OF MEMBERS

28. A member may resign his/her Membership at any time by letter delivered to the Management or Proprietor.

29. The Proprietor may terminate or suspend the membership of any member whose conduct whether inside or outside the club premises is in the opinion of the proprietor contrary to the interests of the club or is harmful to its reputation, without giving any reason for so doing.
30. A Member expelled shall forfeit all the privileges or Membership without claim for any refund of subscription.
31. No illegal gambling or betting shall be allowed in the club and any member who is found to have broken this rule shall be suspended forthwith.
32. No drunkenness, bad language or disorderly behaviour shall be permitted on the premises.
33. The Management or the Proprietors shall have the power to refuse admission to or require to leave any Member or guest if in their sole opinion it is in the interests of the Club.
34. Any member or guest whose conduct whether inside or outside the club premises is in the opinion of the proprietor contrary to the interests of the club or is harmful to its reputation, will be excluded from the club for a minimum of 3 months, for serious mis-conduct the offenders will be nominated for Pubwatch.
35. If at any time it should become necessary to close the club premises for any reasons whatsoever or to cease the club's activities, members shall have no claim of any kind whatsoever against the club or against the Proprietors and members shall acquire no Proprietary rights in the Club premises or any property of the club.

INTOXICATING LIQUOR

36. The sale or supply of intoxicating liquor in the Club shall be permitted within the general licensing hours in force within the licensing district in which the Club premises are situated (subject to any extension from time to time permitted to the Club) and the bar opening hours shall be fixed by the Proprietor.
37. Intoxicating liquor shall be sold to Members and their guests and to visitors in accordance with the terms and conditions imposed by the licences granted in respect of the Club's premises. Only intoxicating liquor sold by the club bar may be consumed on the premises.
38. No person under the age of 18 years may purchase nor consume liquor on the premises.
39. There shall be no Off Sales except to members of the club in person.
40. A Visitors Book will be kept at the club. Each guest will sign and have both his name and address printed in the book and then this entry signed by the member of whom he is the bona fide guest. This book will be produced on demand to any police officer visiting the club, whilst on duty, for his inspection.

HOURS OF OPENING

41. The Club opening hours will be displayed on the Club premises and can be lengthened or shortened at the discretion of the Proprietor.

RESPONSIBILITY

42. The Club and the Proprietor cannot in any circumstances be responsible to Members or their guests for:
 - a. Loss or damage to any property of any kind while it is in or about the Club, or
 - b. Loss or damage to vehicles parked, collected or driven by staff or agents of the Club, or to the contents or accessories of any such vehicles.

CAPACITY

43. Capacity is the figure deemed to be full in accordance with local authority guidelines, in particular those laid down by the Fire Authority.
44. Where capacity is reached the Management will be required by the Proprietor to refuse admission, regardless of Membership status.

RULE CHANGES

45. These Rules may be changed, varied or revoked by the Proprietor and any such change, variation or revocation shall be deemed to have been brought to the notice of Members provided a copy thereof is prominently displayed to Members within the Club.

DAMAGE AND BREAKAGE

46. Any damage to the premises, equipment, furniture or fittings must be reported immediately to a member of staff or the Proprietor. The Club must be reimbursed for any damage caused by members or their guests.

FIRST AID/ACCIDENTS

47. There is a First Aid box in the bar area for the treatment of minor injuries. All injuries should be reported in the Club Accident Book, normally kept behind the bar. All such reports should be made within 24 hours of the accident.

ANIMALS

48. Animals are not admitted in the Club without prior permission of the Proprietor (except those trained or under training for the task of guide dogs for the blind or deaf).

CAR PARKING

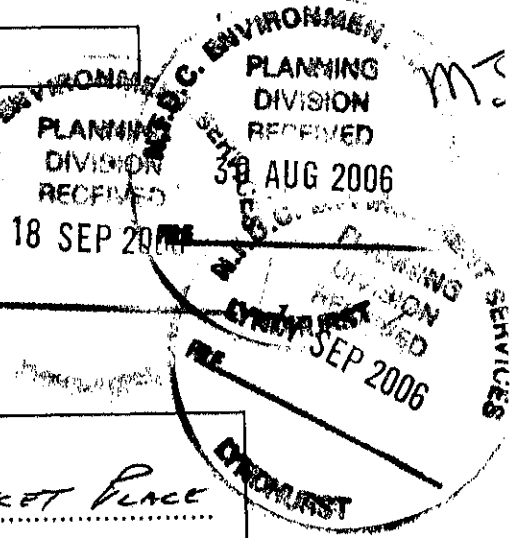

1) Purpose of application.

The premises are situated on the first floor above shops, which front the Market Place. There is a single access and staircase only at the rear of the premises. The numbers of persons using the club are limited and to satisfy the Fire Department they require a secondary access. Attached is a separate statement by the owner giving details of the club and importance of the additional access. Also enclosed are photographs of the site.

2) Disabled access.

The existing building has a straight flight of stairs, Any disabled person using the club relies on staff assistance. The proposed escape stairs would similarly rely on staff or other member for help, steps so designed to take in requirements under Part M of the Building Regulations.

3) Conservation Area.

The building adds no major contribution to the area, being a modern one but nevertheless so designed to blend in with the other buildings facing into the Market Place, with parapet and small tiled pitched roof section at the front. The rear of the building is plain and become cluttered with functional pipes, extractor ducts and condenser units. Waste bins, barrels etc only add to the clutter and do little to help the area visually. It is suggested conditions could be added to any approval, to provide screening or other improvements generally considered being beneficial. The car park too is in a poor state of repair being loose gravel with potholes, and some broken concrete.

4) Proposal.

The staircase is suggested to be an open one with concrete steps and face brick balustrade, detailing subject to approval brick on edge capping etc. Some wrought iron screening is suggested both as a safety factor at first floor level to the landing area, which will have an extension to the existing flat roof to form open porch. Similarly at ground level a wrought iron grill will break up the brick mass and provide screening for the bin enclosure formed.

4) Proposal etc.

Subject to obtaining approval, additional revenue from the club would enable the owner to resurface the car park to an agreed finish. This could be conditional with completion this would contribute greatly in improving the area visually. Similarly repositioning condensers (on the wall at present) in agreed positions with screening to approval will be another improvement visually to the area in general.

5) Policies.

Policy DW -E23 (covering alterations & extensions) including a and d are considered to be complied with by the proposal and comments made above. Similarly points made in C2.25 to C2.31 have been taken into consideration and as suggested any additional matter can be conditional if considered necessary. Taking F20 Ringwood & Policies RW-1 to RW-8 covering the Town Centre, generally it is considered the proposal can be beneficial, (F20.11). Community Life - (F20.22) covers need for the area. As illustrated in applicants statements and the need to increase the numbers using this club. RW-7 (C) states improvements will be encouraged. Similarly RW-8 (although the site is not mentioned) states the appearance of rear service yards and parking areas will be encouraged.

Summary.

This proposal is necessary under safety requirements, if number of users is to be increased, and this increase of number both on commercial grounds and public needs as indicated F20.22. By giving consent it is considered other visual improvements can be made to the area with conditions where considered necessary if beneficial. The proposal has been amended following conversation with the Conservation Officer but changes can be made to the design if necessary or further detailing required.

1. BKS Security Services was formed in November 2003. We are the only Security Industry Authority Approved Contractor (SIA ACS) in the region to be accredited in:
 - a. Supply of Licensed Door Supervisors
 - b. Key Holding and Alarm response Services
 - c. Supply of Static Licensed Security Officers

We are also accredited in ISO 9001:2008.

We currently have 3 offices. The main in Verwood Dorset, with additional offices in Exmouth Devon and one in Cowes on the Isle of Wight.

2. As part of our services we are the only company in the south to have the following assets which are deployed to assist our clients:
 - a. Home Office trained Passive drugs dogs as trained by Surrey Police
 - b. 2 Mobile CCTV Surveillance vehicles
3. We currently employ in excess of 160 Security Industry Authority Licensed Staff. All staff are fully vetted to British Standards, CRB Checked, First Aid and Fire Marshalled trained. We also have a team trained in arrest and restraint including the use of Hyatt speed cuffs. All staff undergo refresher training every 6 - 8 Months.
4. On the 16th October 2010 we were appointed the Security provider for Legends Cue and sports club situated in the Market place Ringwood, Hants. We were appointed by Miss Nicky Binden the Owner and Licensee of the premises. Prior to being appointed we were informed that the previous company (Guard force) were not undertaking their duties correctly and that there procedures were well below the standard required.

5. On starting the contract we produce Security Assignment instruction in conjunction with Miss Binden, We introduced a Duty Log Book, implemented a search procedure and admissions and refusal policy. And assisted with Miss Binden in the implementation of the clubs conditions of entry policy.
6. This company attended a multi agency meeting in December 2010, during that meeting we were informed the since our arrival there had been a modest improvement in the running of the venue, and that since our arrival the venue had been removed from the "RED LIST". We admitted at the meeting that there were areas that needed to be improved further and as a company we were addressing them and would continue to do so. I would point out that during this meeting the undersigned made a joke statement that because of the improvement we "the Club" should apply for an extension to the licensing hours" all parties attending laughed at this, and the matter dropped.
7. On the 14th February 2011 I was given a copy of the application for a review of a license as submitted by Hampshire Constabulary in relation to the venue. I have read the said document and as the security service provider to the premises feel it right that we be allowed to comment. However I am not prepared to challenge the review but feel that some of the contents in it are in fact wrong. I am fully aware that I can only comment on matters raised after the 16th October 2010. My points are as follows:
 - a. Impact statement: I am concerned that the stabbing incident on New Years Eve as referred to has been linked to the venue. The stabbing did in fact take place some 2 miles from the premises at around 0200hours. Having checked the venues CCTV for the night in question it can be seen that although the persons involved had been in the venue they had left at 0100hours in a sober manner. They can be seen walking up the high street believed to be making their way home. It is our understanding and that of the press that the incident was as a result of a domestic. Why is this being linked to the venue?
 - b. Impact Statement: Male ejected through drunkenness. My staff monitor all patrons anybody found in the premises under the influence of alcohol are asked to leave. We agree that we have a duty of care to patrons but once the patrons have left they are free to make their own way home. We can't be accountable for their actions and behaviour when there are away from the premises perimeter.
 - c. Litter and Criminal Damage: there are numerous license premises in the market place, coupled with the fact there is a late night take away. The state of the rubbish in the street and the damage caused cannot be all the fault of Legends. I agree that some of the patrons who frequent the venue may abuse the facilities outside of the premises but should this evidence be used against legends then it has to be used against all premises operating within the market place.
 - d. PC Waller Statement: Deployment of Drugs Dogs. This company deployed the drugs dogs after a request by the owner to do so. More deployments are planned. The owner fully supports the deployment as she believes it sends out a strong message

Those drugs will not be tolerated on her premises. Admittedly the attendance was down. It should be pointed out that this company at previous meetings with the police stated we were happy to deploy the dog to any premises in Ringwood they wished during that night AT NO COST. PC Waller did make such a request at about 2100hrs on the night in question, the dog was deployed to the White Hart. The dog had a positive indication and PC Waller dealt with the person concerned, PC Waller States that having spoken to the owner of Finns who stated they were "heaving", knew that the people within the premises normally visited legends but didn't due to the dog. Why was the dog team not tasked to Finns? Or why were swabs not used in that premises. The police knew in advance of our deployment why was there not a drugs operation in place?

- e. PC Skinners Statement: A members list is held and produced to my door team nightly. The club has started issuing membership cards to all members and this will help my staff.
 - f. PC skinners Statement: Lack of Refusals. The Christmas and New Year period was quite compared to other venues in and around the area. The refusals log is completed every night if needed. My staff have been told to tighten up on this procedure. We have noticed by deploying our barrier man that people are not even getting to the door hence low refusals numbers.
8. My Staff work very closely with the Owner. We rotate our door staff every 4 months to stop complacency, it might seem that we are running the premises but I can assure all concerned that every action taken is after consultation with the owner and with her consent. All staff have a duty of care and carry out their duties in a professional manner. Our duty log books are completed daily and we are able to offer other services to the client to help her keep her venue as safe as possible. The Log Books are reviewed by all police officers or any other agency undertaking compliance checks.
9. Incidents do happen in all licensed premises and action is carried out by the persons on duty at that time. We as people all do things differently, no person is right, Managers can't be at every incident as and when they occur. However they are there as soon as possible after the incident and all incidents are recorded. Any mistakes in policy or procedures are rectified and should not be repeated.
10. We as a company and in conjunction with the owner have made a few changes in our team. The new team have been briefed about the extra vigilance needed and the extra standards required. I note that the police has requested on numerous occasions that the inside door team need to be more visible, so with immediate effect all BKS staff deployed within the venue will be issue Yellow Hi Viz vests to wear.
11. It is my own opinion that Legends was a late night drinking venue on Fridays and Saturdays. The owner to her credit and at a loss to her revenue has changed the closing times to try and alleviate the noise issues. My only concern for this now is who are going to be blamed for any incidents caused in the town or within the Ringwood area if all venues kick out at the same time

thus increasing the numbers in the market place and who is going to police this now that Hampshire police has announced police cut backs.

12. With Miss Bindens help we as a company have suggested and are fully prepared to work with all agencies in supplying additional services to all venues in and around the Ringwood area such as:

- a. Passive drug dogs deployment
- b. Street security marshals
- c. Mobile door supervisors teams

However nobody in either licensing, the police or other venues are willing to meet and discuss our proposals or to endorse such measures to assist in keeping Ringwood safe and trouble free.

13. This company has attended Pub watch meeting and it seems strange that the procedures are slightly different to that of other areas. Again there seems to be no control.

14. The undersigned is available to discuss this report and attend any meeting necessary to help keep Ringwood a safe town.

The types of regulated entertainments proposed re-instate and then enhance the normal pub entertainments that were previously unregulated benefit to enhance the local facilities for social entertainment and reduce the focus on alcohol. No new steps have been identified by risk assessment in relation to the four licensing objectives, except as below. Consideration has been given to the terms of the Local Licensing Policy in preparing application.

Providing a 30 minute extension of opening hours after the end of the sale of alcohol will promote this objective as the last drink will be consumed quickly, with access to the pubs toilet facilities. The Personal Licence holders and the Designated Premises Supervisor will not knowingly allow disorderly conduct on the licensed premises. The Personal Licence holders and the Designated Premises Supervisor will operate the Portman Group Code of Practice on the naming, packaging and promotion of alcoholic drinks to ensure that drinks are packaged in a socially responsible manner and only to those who are aged 18 years old and above. Proof of age cards will be requested at all times when the premises are open. The Personal Licence holders, Designated Premises Supervisor or other members of staff suspects that a person attempting to purchase alcohol is under the age of 21.

- i) The supply of alcohol for consumption on the premises to any private friends of a person residing there who are bona fide entertained by him at his own expense, or the consumption of alcohol by persons so supplied; or

Additional Conditions previously agreed with New Forest District Council Environmental Protection Service

The use by non-residents of the Courtyard shall cease no later than 23:00hrs.

Where licence authorises supply of alcohol:

- (1) No supply of alcohol may be made under the premises licence:
- (a) at a time when there is no designated premises supervisor in respect of the premises licence, or
- (b) at a time when the designated premises supervisor does not hold a personal licence or his personal licence is suspended.
- (2) Every supply of alcohol under the premises licence must be made or authorised by a person who holds a personal licence.

Not Restricted

Where licence authorises door supervision:

- (1) Each individual at the premises to carry out a security activity must be licensed by the Security Industry Authority.
- (2) But nothing in subsection (1) requires this condition to be imposed:
 - (a) in respect of premises within paragraph 8(3)(a) of Schedule 2 to the Private Security Industry Act 2001 (c.12) (premises with premises licences authorising plays or films), or
 - (b) in respect of premises in relation to-
 - (i) any occasion mentioned in paragraph 8(3)(b) or (c) of that Schedule (premises being used exclusively by club with club premises certificate, under a temporary event notice authorising plays or films or under a gaming licence), or
 - (ii) any occasion within paragraph 8(3)(d) of that Schedule (occasions prescribed by regulations under that Act).
- (3) For the purposes of this section:
 - (a) "security activity" means an activity to which paragraph 2(1)(a) of that Schedule applies, and
 - (b) paragraph 8(5) of that Schedule (interpretation of references to an occasion) applies as it applies in relation to paragraph 8 of that Schedule.

authority would prefer to receive applications at least one month before the proposed event whenever possible. This preferred time frame is not stipulated by the legislation and is only an expectation of the authority.

11. Cumulative Impact and Special Policies

See paragraphs 13.23 to 13.39 of the SoS Guidance for further details.

- 11.1 The Council will not take 'need' into account when considering an application, as this is a matter for planning development control and the market. Currently this council does not have a special policy relating to the cumulative impact of licensed premises. However, it recognises that the cumulative impact of the number, type and density of licensed premises in a given area, may lead to serious problems of nuisance and disorder both in the vicinity of and at some distance from the premises.

12. Licensing Hours

See paragraphs 13.40 to 13.42 of the SoS Guidance for further details.

- 12.1 Consideration will be given to the individual merits of an application but the presumption will be to grant the hours requested unless there are specific objections to those hours raised by responsible authorities or interested parties on the basis of the licensing objectives.
- 12.2 This policy recognises that, in some circumstances, flexible licensing hours for the sale of alcohol can help to ensure that concentrations of customers leaving premises simultaneously are avoided.
- 12.3 With regard to shops, stores and supermarkets the normal scenario will be for such premises to provide sales of alcohol for consumption off the premises at any time when the retail outlet is open for shopping unless representations raise good reasons, based on the licensing objectives, for restricting those hours.

13. Children

See paragraphs 13.43 to 13.53 of the SoS Guidance for further details.

- 13.1 The authority will not seek to limit the access of children to any premises unless it is necessary for the prevention of physical, moral or psychological harm. In all other cases it will be left to the discretion of the licensee within the constraints of legislation.
- 13.2 This licensing authority recognises the county Safeguarding Unit as being competent to give advice on matters relating to the protection of children from harm.
- 13.3 This policy commends the Portman Group Code of Practice on the Naming, Packaging and Promotion of Alcoholic Drinks.
- 13.4 This policy cannot attempt to anticipate every issue that could arise in respect of children; general rules are therefore avoided and each application will be considered on its merits.

AMENDED GUIDANCE ISSUED UNDER SECTION 182 OF THE LICENSING ACT 2003

1.26 Licensing law is not the primary mechanism for the general control of individuals once they are away from a licensed premises and therefore beyond the direct control of individual licensees or certificate holders.

However, licensees and certificate holders should take reasonable steps to prevent the occurrence of crime and disorder and public nuisance immediately outside their premises, for example on the pavement, in a beer garden, or in a smoking shelter, where and to the extent that these matters are within their control.

- Having reviewed the opportunities for her members and the need to ensure the club could continue to provide entertainment Nicky utilised the services of a solicitor to apply for a variation prior to the 2005 introduction of the new 2003 Act of Parliament.
- This application followed due process, thus all parties received notice and had opportunity to make representations or raise objections.

Despite three of them having later licences they all tend to close earlier.
