a) General – all four licensing objectives (b,c,d,e) (please read guidance note 9)
The premises is a small beach café providing food and refreshments to local people and holiday makers. The number of people we can cater for is limited due to the size of the premises
b) The prevention of crime and disorder
The licence holders will ensure that all staff are conversant with the licensing objectives, premises licence conditions and operating schedule. They will be fully trained to ensure that no underage drinking, drunkenness, use of drugs or anti-social behaviour takes place on the premises. Individual training records will be kept for all members of staff.
Security – we have sought advice from Hampshire Police Crime Prevention Design Advisor and implemented the recommendations she has made. Only small quantities of alcohol will be stored on site.
Any CCTV should be installed and maintained at the premises to the satisfaction of the Licensing Authority and Police. As a minimum it shall enable surveillance of both internal and external areas of the premises including all entrances and exits. Recordings from the system shall be to a standard acceptable as evidence in a court of law and shall be securely retained for a minimum of 30 days. The recording shall be surrendered in a playable format to Hampshire Constabulary or the Licensing Authority immediately on request.
c) Public safety
All electrical/gas appliances are regularly tested and serviced in accordance with manufacturers standards. Fire safety - We will have regard to Regulatory Reform (Fire Safety) Order 2005 to ensure the
safety of everyone who uses the premises. In order to prevent the risk of broken glass on the beach no glassware will be permitted to be taken off the premises and such drinks will be decanted into a polycarbonate/plastic "glass"

The holder of the premises licence will ensure that all staff are trained to challenge every individual attempting to purchase alcohol who appears to be under 21 years of age and to refuse service where those individuals cannot produce acceptable means of identification. Such training shall be provided not less than every six months, and written records shall be kept of all training and refresher training and the training will require that every individual who appears to be under 21 years of age seeking to purchase or be supplied with alcohol at or from the premises shall produce means of identification acceptable to the licensing authority passport, photo driving licence or PASS accredited photo ID - proving that individual to be 18 years of age or older. If the person seeking alcohol is unable to produce acceptable means of identification, no sale or supply of alcohol will be made to or for that person.

A written log shall be kept of all refusals including refusals to serve alcohol, refusals of entry to the premises and ejections from the premises. The holder of the premises licence shall ensure that the refusals log is properly maintained and this shall involve, but is not limited to, nominating in writing a responsible person to check and sign it on a weekly basis.





CCTV

The premises shall have sufficient cameras located within the premises to cover all public areas including outside of the premises covering the entrance and exit. The system should be able to cope with strobe lighting and all levels of illumination throughout the premises as well as outside areas.

CCTV warning signs to be fitted in public places.

The CCTV system must be operating at all times whilst the premises are open for licensable activity. All equipment shall have a constant and accurate time and date generation.

The recording system will be able to capture a minimum of 4 frames per second and all recorded footage must be securely retained for a minimum of 28 days.

Records must be made on a weekly basis and kept for inspection to show that the system is functioning correctly and that data is being securely retained.

The DPS or premises manager must be able to demonstrate that the CCTV system has measures to prevent recordings being tampered with, i.e. password protected.

There shall be sufficient members of trained staff at the premises during operating hours to be able to provide viewable copies to police on request when investigating allegations of offences or criminal activity. Any images recovered must be in a viewable format on either disc or VHS. Footage supplied in a digital format on CD or DVD will also have a copy of the CCTV system software enabled on the disc to allow playback.

In the event of technical failure of the CCTV equipment the Premises Licence holder/DPS MUST report the failure to the Southampton Police Licensing Unit. Incident book

Incident book

An incident book will be provided and maintained at the premises. It will remain on the premises at all times and will be available to police for inspection upon request.

Any incidents that include physical altercation or disorder, physical ejection, injury, id seizure or drug misuse will be recorded in the incident book. The entry is to include an account of the incident and the identity of all person(s) involved (or descriptions of those involved if identity is not known). Should there be any physical interaction by members of staff and the public the entry will include what physical action occurred between each party. If the person seeking alcohol is unable to produce acceptable means of identification, no sale or supply of alcohol will be made to or for that person.

Staff training

Staff will be trained regarding appropriate precautions to prevent the sale of alcohol to persons under the age of 18, the signs and symptoms of drunk persons and the refusal of sale due to intoxication. Records will be kept of such training which must be signed and dated by the member of staff who has received that training.

All staff will receive refresher training every six months as a minimum and that records are to be kept of this refresher training which should be signed and dated by the member of staff who received that training.

All training records will be available for inspection by Hampshire Constabulary and the licensing Authority. Training records will be kept for a minimum period of two years.

Environmental Health (Pollution) Comments Relating to the Prevention of Public Nuisance

Thank you for consulting Environmental Protection.

I have the following comments to make.

The premises appear to have an internal area of 11.8 square metres excluding the floor area under the 'tabletop' as shown on the premises plan.

Live music, dancing, recorded music, dancing, supply of alcohol and late night refreshment etc. has been applied for inside the premises.

A noise complaint was received in August 2011 following a live music event held at the Bluebird Cafe on the external patio. This was held under a TEN which I am led to believe should have ceased at 23:30 hours but music allegedly continued until 00:15 hours as the proprietor advised to one of my colleagues that 'they got carried away'.

The premises appear to be of a lightweight wooden construction which will have minimal acoustic attenuation.

The applicant is applying for Live Music for a maximum of 8 occasions per annum, recorded music with no frequency limitations, dancing with no limitations, supply of alcohol and also late night refreshment during Cowes Week.

If granted, it is possible that Live Music could take place once per weekend for 8 weeks or twice over a weekend for 4 weeks. Recorded music could take place on an unlimited basis. The premises are very small-and residential premises and beach huts are in very close proximity.

If Live Music, recorded music and dancing were to take place, as the premises are very small, it is likely that the doors will be left open or at least open for customer access/egress. The occupiers of the beach huts and residential premises will more than likely be caused a public nuisance. With the doors closed, it is still highly likely that music will still be audible to occupiers of beach huts and residential accommodation due to the light weight construction of the premises.

During Cowes Week the applicant proposes a closing time of 00:30 hours with alcohol being served until 00:00 hours. Noise from customers are likely to cause disturbance to residential and beach hut accommodation nearby.

On other occasions, customer noise on the patio area is also likely to cause disturbance to occupiers of beach huts and residential accommodation due to their close proximity.

There appears to be no customer toilets within the premises, with the only toilets being behind the staff area (including a bar prep area) and therefore presumably for staff only. The nearest toilets are approximately 50 metres away in the Council car park. It is highly likely that customers (particularly male) will take advantage of the seclusion of several beach huts in close proximity and urinate in and around them to save them walking the 50m to the toilet block.

During the application process, the applicant is invited to include details on how they will promote the four licensing objectives and the only comment in relation to The Prevention of Public Nuisance objective is 'Refer to NFDC Environmental Health Dept.'

Summary

It is my opinion that the premises are not suitable for regulated entertainment, nor the premises being open for the sale of alcohol until 00:30 hours. The applicant has also not stated how they will promote the public nuisance objective.

There is high likelihood that a public nuisance will occur and on that basis I object to this application.

On such occasions as Cowes Night the additional visitors cause disruption, create litter, and have no regard for the young children and elderly that use the beach.

I have had a beach hut long enough to experience the effects of alcohol being sold in close proximity to the beach. On many weekends we have had to contend with people leaving the Flying Boat intoxicated and being attracted to the beach.



We are writing to express our concern about the potential public nuisance that such a blanket entertainment and alcohol sales license may give rise to in this very quite hamlet. Our property is within very close proximity to the café and we have children. We had expected the Bluebird to apply for a limited/occasional license for both entertainment and alcohol sales, and would have no objection to this as part of their business, but we were surprised by the application for a full time entertainments and alcohol license (including off-sales).

The premises at the Bluebird are very small and we would therefore expect any music or dancing to spill outside the premises. The prevailing south westerly wind would carry this noise to the local homes. On an occasional basis this would be not be a problem but we are concerned by the potential of a 7 day full time license. What safeguards are in place to ensure that the music is contained within the premises?

We would have no objection to the Bluebird selling beer or wine in a responsible manner for consumption on their premises. However, a full 7 day license with off sales means that the Café loses control of the consumption of the alcohol that it sells (where consumed and by whom). We fear that this may lead to additional public nuisance and safety issues from noise, litter, especially broken bottles on the beach and potential localised crime and drunken disorder.

We trust you will take the views of the local residents into account when considering this license, and ensure that the relevant safeguards for the local community are in place.

I write to object to the application for Premises Licence relating to Bluebird Café, Calshot, SO45 1BS.

The basis for the objection is the immediate adjacency of the premises to a B highway. I use this road regularly. It is the only way to drive out from my property (Calshot House, SO45 1BR) to go anywhere. This road is also used by a public bus service.

At present, it is very common for patrons of the Bluebird Café to stand on the side of the road, or even in the road, while they consume their purchases. They treat the road as if it was a leisure facility, wandering around on it and causing hazard to traffic because the premises of the café are often too small for the number of customers. On several occasions, people obstructing the highway in this way have rudely replied as I tried to pass and sounded my horn to clear the road. People under the influence of alcohol are likely to worsen the situation and increase the obstruction of the highway.



I am opposed to the granting of a premises licence at the Bluebird Café and would like to raise the following concerns;

- 1. I live less than 100m from the café and my property is on slightly higher ground therefore noise from the site of the café is very audible at my house. I am concerned that additional opening times, music, the sale of alcohol and the additional traffic are factors that would result in causing me and my family (including three young children) increased noise disturbance and public nuisance.
- 2. The café is a very small premises and is in my view unsuitable for a music venue. Although the application refers to the music being "indoors" I am concerned there will still be increased disturbance as due to the small scale of the premises the doors are unlikely to be kept shut. It is likely that the outside area of the café would become a socialising point and this could cause noise disturbance. There is an alternative live music venue and bar at the Spinnakers Bar at Calshot Activities Centre approximately 1 mile away.
- 3. There is no evening bus transport or other public transport provision in this area. Therefore it could lead to increase traffic and parking issues.
- 4. It is possible that the supply of alcohol at this site could lead to an increase in anti-social behaviour and crime. Calshot is unfortunately already a target for petty vandalism and littering.
- During the "Cowes" evening August 2011 we were disturbed by very loud music, audience applause and shouting emanating from the Bluebird Café area until 3.30am.

Music and Alcohol License Application by Mr and Mrs Pusey for The Bluebird Cafe

We wish to object to the granting of a license to the Bluebird Cafe.

Firstly, the access to the beach is permissive, as it is on private land. To get onto the beach access is provided by a cut way between two huts next to the position of the café. One of these huts is mine (hut 22), and I will detail the problems we have experienced in the past. These problems have not only been suffered by beach hut owners, but by local residents and the Police, and allowing this licence will give the potential, (being music and alcohol), for these issues to start recurring again, which will be a drain on Police service who are needed for more important crime fighting.

Secondly, I would like to know if the landlord (Cadland Estates) has been consulted by the owner, and if so what are their views on this proposal, as being a hut owner we have a responsibility to ask for permission for any changes required, and causing any problems to others is looked on very dimly. I understand that the café is a business, but it requires to surve the market that is required on the beach at Calshot.

Thirdly, should this licence be granted I can only imagine more visitors coming to the beach in the dark hours of the day, which means they may not see the need to use bins provided, and as the there are no toilet facilities in the café, and the toilets in the car park are 150mtrs away, I am pretty sure I will have the cliental of the café using the side and back of my hut and the hut adjacent as the nearest and most convenient place to go. This will cause tension for me and the café owner.

This reminds me of sometime ago when the Flying Boat was open. There would be quite a few occasions when people that had been drinking think it was a good idea to visit the beach. This was very upsetting for the elderly owners on the beach, and very disturbing for the hut owners that had their grandchildren with them for the night. I myself am now a grandfather and will be very anxious if this were to go forward.

The beach is what it says it is, a place for people to come and enjoy themselves, in a beach environment, not a place where there is a bar, and loud music, people that want that sort of entertainment go to Spain or Italy not Calshot. This will really affect not only the beach hut owners; it will be very disruptive for the local residents.

I feel that the café is not in the right market place for this type of business being suggested, and I feel that the owner should be looking at a more suitable USP (unique selling point) and one that suits the environment that the property is situated in. Previous owners of the café have been very successful when running the buiness as it should be providing a service for beach visitors and but owners.

<u>Safety</u>

The property itself is very small, and I believe that the drinking and dancing will over spill onto the verander area of the café, as the area inside the café will not support any type of dancing. This will make the noise travel much further, and the potential for a customer to be hurt by passing traffic will become much greater, as there has allegedly been permission given for a disabled access that has been installed straight on to the main road. I cannot believe this is acceptable and is an accident waiting to happen.

Alcohol bought at the café will be taken on to the beach, and will then become the worry of the beach hut owners, and genuine beach visitors to be wary of broken glass, cans, and possible people in high spirits causing a hazard to young children trying to enjoy a day on the beach.

As you may be aware we as beach hut owners have had our problems when disposing of waste, and can only feel that this is going add to the problem, and reflect on us, and not the casual visitors to the café. This will only happen if the council do not look at the problems that granting this licence will cause.

It is not the case that I wish to spoil peoples fun, but have seen what happens when alcohol has been consumed at near by pubs, and sold in the café before, the clearing up the next day, the shouting and arguments it causes, it can become a very volatile place to be, not only a physical threat, but damage caused to beach huts, when people cant get home and will try and find a place to sleep.

The area has become so much better of late, since the local Police force have got a grip on the troubles from the past. A pleasant environment has been created for visitors to come too, and a café should be what it says on the tin, not a Bistro.

Environment

We as hut owners, do not own the beach, but have the greatest respect for the environment that the beach deserves. We wish to keep it that way, and don't even disregard that there are times that people and parties take place, such as Cowes night, but do we what this twenty four seven, NO.

As I have said before there have been issues in the past with regards to litter and litter collection but the Council and hut owners have got together and resolved this. The litter bins are emptied and the cafes commercial waste collected in the evening when the business has closed. If it is open late into the evening rubbish will be left out overnight and rats and foxes will spread the waste over the verge and road. This will not only be very unpleasant for hut owners, residents and visitors to the beach but will increase the workload of the council employees who will have to clear it all up

The license seems to suggest that alcohol will be sold for consumption on and off the premises, and as I have already stated the hut owners have had to clear up cans and broken bottles from the beach after a busy weekend of visitors, this will only add to the problem.

Again as I have already stated there are no toilet facilities on the premises and we feel the back of the huts and hedges will be used as a latrine, is this good thing that young children may, and should be exposed to.

The beach has many visitors that may only be casual, but are perhaps visiting the area, is this type of thing they want on a little quite beach in England. They want ice creams, ice lollies, cakes, snacks, and cold drinks, and do they want to stand at a bar, or in a queue with their children to make a purchase amongst people drinking alcohol, I think not.

If the decision to allow this licence to be granted, and alcohol, and music are to be apart of the beach, I feel you will be a part of destroying what is now a peaceful, pleasant place to be and to be visited by others.

As we have previously said this is no place for this type of establishment and we strongly object to you even considering this application.

I refer to the above application for grant of a Premises Licence and wish to object on the following grounds:-

Calshot is a rural village and the Bluebird Café is situated within a particularly quiet area of that village. The provision of live or recorded music will disrupt the peace currently enjoyed by residents and beach hut owners to the overall detriment of the area.

Mr Pusey, the applicant, has provided live music at the venue in the past under the provisions of a Temporary Events Notice and, on 12 August 2011 (Cowes Night), I was forced to complain to the Public Health and Community Safety Department of the Council because of the resultant disturbance caused to my household. The music comprised amplified guitar and saxophone coupled with multiple singers and was allowed to continue beyond 1am. Ms Verity Potter, the Environmental Health Officer who responded to my complaint, interviewed a representative of the Café and suggested that in future years such an event should be held further up the beach, away from residential properties. I would add that this was not the first time I have had to report Mr Pusey for contravention of the Environmental Protection Act 1990 as a consequence of nuisance caused by live music on his premises. Regrettably Mr Pusey continually shows a disregard for rules and regulations.

Mr Pusey's tendency to disregard the law is further evidenced by the fact that both he and his wife regularly parked their vehicles on the double yellow lines outside the café. One of these vehicles was a mobile home which Mr Pusey not only parked on the yellow lines but actually connected to the electric power within the café both during the day and overnight. The width of the already narrow road was considerably reduced by these thoughtless actions but, despite the obvious inconvenience to other road users, Mr Pusey continued to capitalise on the absence of parking wardens in the area until the matter was reported to the Council. (See attached Photograph).

I have also attached a photograph which shows the debris scattered about the road as a result of foxes attacking the plastic bags full of rubbish left by Mr Pusey outside the café on numerous occasions last year. Whether this irresponsible practice will continue this year remains to be seen.

The application for the Premises Licence indicates that live music and dancing will take place indoors but it is difficult to envisage how such a small building could comfortably accommodate these activities whilst customers are present. I would suggest that, even if the source of the entertainment is indoors, the music will be loud enough to be heard by patrons in the outdoor patio area which forms part of the café. No doubt this would be facilitated by leaving the café doors open! It must also be borne in mind that the café is primarily of wooden construction and the walls cannot provide the degree of sound insulation which might be expected of more substantial structures.

You will, therefore, appreciate why I cannot foresee any circumstances where live music can be provided within the café without me and other neighbours experiencing disruption of the peace and quiet to which we have a right.

It should be noted that the summary on the Premises Licence Application indicates that permission is sought for the provision of live entertainment or recorded music until 22.30hrs at the latest but the detailed part of the application actually requests a later termination point of 23.00hrs on Fridays and Saturdays. Permission is also sought for the provision of alcohol until 01.00hrs during Cowes Week. Should the District Council decide to grant the Premises Licence, I would urge it to limit the time when regulated entertainment is permitted and would suggest that the cut-off point should be 8pm on every day of the week.


Since there are no licensed premises within 1500m of the café, the provision of alcohol on the premises on a regular basis is likely to attract an undesirable element to the area and public nuisance can be anticipated. I am not convinced that Mr Pusey is a fit and proper person to manage the regular sale of alcohol since, in addition to his flagrant disregard for rules and regulations already highlighted, I have seen him in a state of intoxication on the premises on more than one occasion when alcohol was on sale there.

In relation to public safety, I would point out that the Bluebird Café has an entrance/egress which leads <u>directly</u> on to Calshot Road, a B road and bus route. Since there is no street lighting in the vicinity, persons leaving the premises under the influence of alcohol might wander into the path of oncoming traffic with tragic results. The provision of live entertainment has, in the past, resulted in audiences standing in the roadway due to the limited capacity within the premises and this constitutes a hazard to both themselves and other road users.

In conclusion, may I plead with the Council to protect the interests of residents and to preserve the peace in this area by refusing to grant the Premises Licence.

I understand that you have received an application for a License for "Regulated Entertainment (Music, Dancing, similar) including the sale of alcohol from Mr & Mrs Pusey. As the owner of beach chalet No. 27 situated just to the front right (facing sea from the road) of this Café. I would like to register my objections on the following grounds.

Unlike the majority of beach huts, those on Cadland Estate are used as holiday homes and as such their owners are entitled to stay overnight and do so regularly over the summer months. At present this Café is only open during the day and is usually closed by 7 pm (according to the weather). With the extension of opening hours late into the evenings and the sale of alcohol, I think it is inevitable that noise levels will be unacceptable for residents both of the beach chalets and the houses opposite.

This Café is very small with an equally small outside area bordering the main Calshot Road on one side and the rear of beach chalets on the other, and I feel it is quite unsuitable to house a crowd of customers, possibly youngsters, with access to alcohol. In the past when there was a Public House at Calshot residents put up with many alcohol related incidents on the beach. Since the Flying Boat closed there have been far fewer problems for all concerned. (I am sure the local Police will confirm this.)

In addition there is no electricity on the beach at Calshot and power is mainly obtained from a number of Calor Gas cylinders in each hut. We have already had one devastating fire which destroyed 13 chalets and I feel there could be a fire hazard from discarded cigarette ends outside the premises.

When considering this matter I hope you will consider the close proximity of the road and the beach chalets and the inevitable noise generated when trying to use a small Beach Café as an alternative to the local pub or bistro.

We wish to object to the granting of a license to the Bluebird Cafe.

The site where the cafe stands is on private land and access to the beach is permissive and down a narrow cutway between two huts. The landlord, beach hut owners, local residents and Police have enough trouble with visitors to the area during the summer months without the addition of music and alcohol supplied by the Cafe.

Initially we fail to see how an application can be submitted to you, or you accept an application, without the consent of the landlord, in this case Cadland Estates. The cafe, as well as the beach huts, have restrictive covenants and we are concerned that these are being ignored for financial gain.

The granting of the licence will cause many additional visitors to the area who, we feel, will no doubt cause littering, damage to vehicles, noise and disruption until the small hours, as well as using the back of the beach huts and hedges as a latrine. There are no toilet facilities at the Cafe, the nearest being in the car park some 100 metres away, and we cannot see that patrons of the cafe will bother to walk that far.

We remember the bad old days when the Flying Boat was open and beach hut owners were faced with drunks coming down onto the beach late at night. As well as disrupting lives on the beach it was very upsetting for young children and the elderly, who were staying overnight. The cafe is right behind many huts which will have young children in them and I am sure late at night the patrons will have no regard for them.

Many visitors and hut owners come to the beach for its peace and quiet and this will be shattered by the license being allowed. We also consider that this will have an effect on the surrounding properties.

This is no place for the type of business that the Bluebird cafe proposes. It is a beach cafe and requires the owner to cater for that. When previous owners had the business it was at its most successful when it provided for beach visitors and hut owners.

There are two main areas that are of concern.

Environment

The hut owners do not own the site but have the highest regard for the landlord and the environment. They take time clearing up after visitors and look after the beach and surrounding area.

There have been issues in the past with regards to litter and litter collection but the Council and hut owners have got together and resolved this. The litter bins are emptied and the cafes commercial waste collected in the evening when the business has closed. If it is open late into the evening rubbish will be left out overnight and rats and foxes will spread the waste over the verge and road. This will not only be very unpleasant for hut owners, residents and visitors to the beach but will increase the workload of the council employees who will have to clear it all up.

The license seems to imply that alcohol will be sold for consumption on and off the premises. The hut owners have had to clear up cans and broken bottles from the beach after a busy weekend of visitors.

The site is open and raised above the beach level so any music or noise produced by the cafe will travel a distance and not just affect the immediate area.

As we have already stated there are no toilet facilities on the premises and we feel the back of the huts and hedges will be used as a latrine.

The beach attracts many young children and the granting of this license will mean that they will have to walk through an alcohol filled environment to buy and ice cream! Many older people will also feel threatened by this environment if they visit the cafe for a cup of tea.

By becoming a venue for music and alcohol the cafe the owner and patrons will not have the same regard and this has the potential to ruin a lovely area. The peace and tranquillity that visitors look forward to will be completely shattered.

<u>Safety</u>

The site itself is very small and will become overcrowded which, when mixed with alcohol and music, has the potential to cause problems. Part of the terrace opens directly onto the road and car and bus drivers will have to contend with intoxicated people walking out in front of them. The other exit is down concrete steps which has the potential to cause very serious injuries.

Selling alcohol from the cafe to take away will imply to many people that they have a right of access to the beach, which is not the case. They will take their bottles and cans onto the beach causing a hazard to any young children.

As it is a private beach the council has no responsibility to clean the area and in these times of austerity we do not see this changing despite the council being a major cause of the problem by granting the license.

The revenue that the Council will generate by the granting of the license will be greatly outweighed by the additional costs of policing that license and clearing up.

This is not a case of a whingeing hut owner unable to accept change. We have seen the results of alcohol being sold at or near the beach. We have had to clear up after visitors have left. We have had to put up with the damage to huts and cars they cause. We have had to put up with the noise and disruption. We have had to deal with cuts caused by broken glass.

The area has developed into a lovely area with hut owners and visitors combining to make a pleasant environment. With a decent cafe supplying decent food the picture would be complete.

As we have previously said this is no place for this type of establishment and we strongly object to you even considering this application.

We would like to advise our full support for the granting of a Premises Licence to Mr and Mrs Pusey to provide Regulated Entertainment and Alcohol at the Bluebird Café, Calshot

We own our house outright and are the nearest dwelling to the Café (our ground floor lounge and our main bedroom being only 15 meters from the Café, significantly closer than all other dwellings). This is our permanent home where we live throughout the year (as opposed to the very limited time that the Cadland Estate beach hut leaseholders are allowed to overnight in their huts).

We have been impressed by the considerable improvements made to the Café by Mr and Mrs Pusey in recent years and by the professional manner in which the establishment is run. The food is high quality and includes much local produce. The pictures and cards on sale in the café are of local scenes (current and historic) and are of great interest to visitors. There are original pictures on sale by local artists. The general ambiance is excellent and very much in keeping with the National Park values. We see the extension to the service which this licence would provide as very much continuing the development of a local amenity.

The Café is becoming a well known attraction as part of the famous and delightful Calshot Beach (one of the very few beaches in the Park to which the public has access) and is well served by the immediately adjacent Public Car park and Public Toilets. Today's visitor expects to be able to have a glass of wine or beer with their meal and their expectations should be met at Calshot Beach.

We have been at home for two "Cowes Nights", when under the existing licence the Café has served alcohol and provided live music. This letter is to notify you that there has been a total of 25 representations made, the majority of the representations have objected to the application, however, 2 have supported the application, but also a Responsible Authority, namely Environmental Protection have objected to the proposals for the Grant of a Premises Licence. Brief details of the representations are as follows:

Patrons from the premises already frequently stand on the side of the road, or even in the road while they consume their purchases. They treat the road as if it was a leisure facility, wandering around on it and causing a hazard to traffic as the premises are often too small for the number of customers. People under the influence of alcohol are likely to worsen the situation and increase the obstruction of the highway.

The provision of live and recorded music will disrupt the peace currently enjoyed by residents and beach hut owners to the overall detriment of the area.

The objector has in the past had cause for complain because of the resultant disturbance caused following the provisions of Temporary Event Notices during Cowes night. The music comprised of amplified guitar and saxophone coupled with multiple singers and was allowed to continue beyond 1am. It is felt that regrettably the applicant in the past has continually showed a disregard for rules and regulations.

As there is no licensed premises within 1500m of the cafe, the provision of alcohol on the premises on a regular basis is likely to attract an undesirable element in the area and public nuisance can be anticipated. Concerns that this wouldn't be managed correctly and there would be a flagrant disregard for rules and regulations.

There is no street lighting in the vicinity, persons leaving the premises under the influence of alcohol might wander into the path of incoming traffic with tragic results. The provision of live entertainment has, in the past, resulted in audiences standing in the road way due to the limited capacity within the premises and this constitutes a hazard to both themselves and other road users.

The use of the cafe for music, dancing and sale of alcohol during the day and night is totally inappropriate for the area and would lead to excessive night time noise when children and others are trying to sleep and could lead to anti-social behaviour and damage to property.

Increase in littering, damage to vehicles, noise and disruption until the small hours, using the back of the beach huts and hedges as a latrine. There are no toilet facilities at the cafe, the nearest being in the car park some 100 metres away and cannot see patrons of the cafe will bother to walk that far.

The cafe is situated right behind many beach huts which may have people staying in overnight, including young children, who would not want to be faced with drunks coming down on to the beach late at night.

Concerns of broken glass and cans being strewn on the beach.

As it is a private beach the council has no responsibility to clean the area and in these times of austerity, we do not see this changing despite the council being a major cause of the problem by granting the licence.

The sale of alcohol will cause problems with people urinating on the beach and around the beach huts as there are no toilets in the premises.

As issue of anti-social behaviour which gives rise to much concern. It is obvious that families and young children are going to be affected by the results of the aforementioned behaviour.

The small cafe is not suitable to provide regulated entertainment and will create a problem with congestion, noise and possible rowdy behaviour which will spill out onto the beach.

Selling alcohol would attract drunkenness and anti-social behaviour that goes with urinating on the beach and up against the beach huts, which has already happens on occasions.

Overcrowding, fire risk due to smokers discarding cigarette butts behind and adjacent to wooden beach huts.

Concerns of noise also disturbing residents of huts or otherwise within the area.

The thought of this peaceful stretch of coastline attracting people who like to drink and party into the evening, which could threaten the tranquility of the area is very distressing.

The sale of alcohol particularly for consumption off the premises will increase the number of beach parties which have led to considerable levels of disturbance to beach hut owners in the past.

It is felt that by granting this licence, it could inevitably lead to an increase in public order offences.

Beach hut owners already have problems with disposing of waste and it is felt that this could only add to the problem.

The Cafe produces commercial waste and at the moment it is collected in the evening so that it does not build up. If he is allowed to stay open later, rubbish will be left overnight for foxes and rates to rummage through.

The premises is totally unsuited to music, dancing and the sale of alcohol.

The premises is unsuitable for a music venue as it is small and the doors are unlikely to be kept shut during entertainment.

During Cowes evening in August 2011, the objector was disturbed by very loud music, audience applause and shouting emanating from the premises until 03:30hrs.

History of alcohol related problems regarding youths coming to Calshot and creating unnecessary behaviour and damage. It is believed that this will only now be encouraged still further by the premises providing the facilities for these youths. It is feared that once they know about it, it will increase once again disorder, public nuisance, damage to property. The proposed music will be disruptive and only benefit a small amount of people, who otherwise enjoy the quiet relaxing area. Concerns that the beach huts could be set on fire, rubbish and broken bottles.

The objector has experienced the effects of alcohol being sold in close proximity to the beach, following people leaving a former premises, The Flying Boat, which is no longer operational. The hut owners were left to clear up after them as it is a private beach and not the responsibility of the Council.

If the business continues to run as a cafe as well, it will mean that young children will have to walk into an alcohol licensed environment to buy an ice cream. Even elderly or infirm people may feel threatened.

There have been difficulties with underage drinking on the beach and with people lighting fires in contravention of the beach conditions, which some years ago resulted in a number of beach huts being burnt down. This has been a major problem and local police have been involved in trying to stem the problem. By granting this licence it causes some concerns.

Many of the beach huts particularly adjoining the cafe are able to be occupied over night and certainly the granting of a music licence and possibly alcohol could be construed as creating a public nuisance.

Environmental Health, Protection have lodged an objection based on the following:

A noise complaint has been received in the past, in August 2011, following a live music event held at the premises on the external patio area. The Temporary Event Notice should have ceased at 23:30hrs but music allegedly continued until 00:15hrs.

. The premises has minimal acoustic attenuation.

The premises are very small and residential premises and beach huts are in very close proximity.

Given the size of the premises, it is likely that the doors will be left open or at least open for customer access/egress. The occupiers of the beach huts and residential premises will more than likely be caused a public nuisance. With the doors closed, it is still highly likely that music will still be audible to occupiers of beach huts and residential accommodation due to the light weight construction of the premises.

Noise from the customers are likely to cause disturbance to residential and beach hut accommodation nearby.

Customer noise on the patio area is also likely to cause disturbance to occupiers of beach huts and residential accommodation due to their close proximity.

There does not appear to be any customer toilets within the premises, with the only toilets being behind the staff area (including a bar prep area) and therefore presumably for staff only. The nearest toilets are approximately 50 metres away in the Council car park. It is highly likely that customers will take advantage of the seclusion of several beach huts in close proximity and urinate in and around them to save them walking the 50 metres to the toilet block.

A kitchen ventilation extract fan is located on a noise sensitive facade and this will be in operation until 00:00hrs during Cowes Week and could cause a nuisance.

The applicant has been invited to include details on how they will promote the four licensing objectives and the only comment in relation to the prevention of public nuisance is 'refer to NFDC Environmental Health department'.

However, two letters have supported the application stating that the licence will be an asset to the area providing a venue for an evening meal.

The premises have provided a professional manner in which the Cowes Nights evenings have been managed and the controls put in place to ensure the complete lack of nuisance or bad behaviour.
