# APPLICATION FOR THE GRANT OF A PREMISES LICENCE - 9 GOSPORT STREET, LYMINGTON, SO41 9BG

# 1. INTRODUCTION

1.1 The purpose of this hearing is to determine an application under section 17 of the Licensing Act 2003 for a premises licence in respect of 9 Gosport Street, Lymington made by VG Ventures Limited.

# 2. THE APPLICATION

2.1 On 1 November 2016 an application was received for a premises licence, the main details of which are shown below:

- # 2.2 The original application is attached as **Appendix 1**.
  - 2.3 The applicant has agreed to withdraw the request for Live & Recorded Music and to reduce the terminal hour for other licensable activities to 23:00 hours. A condition has also been added whereby alcohol will only be served to persons taking a table meal.

# 3. BACKGROUND INFORMATION

- **#** 3.1 These premises previously held a licence which was surrendered on 13 September 2016. A copy of this licence is attached as **Appendix 2**.
  - 3.2 The application process requires a public notice (on pale blue paper) to be posted on the premises for a period of 28 days starting on the day after the authority receives the application. A notice must also be published in a local newspaper within 10 working days of the start of the consultation period. During the consultation period representation may be made to Licensing Services.
  - 3.3 On Friday 4 November 2016 the notice at the premises was checked by the Licensing Enforcement Officer. It was found to be correctly displayed on site and contained the statutory information regarding the consultation period and the colour was pale blue. The last day for representations was shown as 29 November 2016.
  - 3.4 The notice was published in the Lymington Times on 11 November 2016.

# 4. **REQUIREMENTS FOR A HEARING**

- 4.1 The Licensing Authority must hold a hearing to determine the application where relevant representations addressing the licensing objectives are made. The licensable objectives are:
  - 1) The prevention of Crime and Disorder;

- 2) Public safety;
- 3) The prevention of public nuisance;
- 4) The protection of children from harm.
- **#** 4.2 Guidance about the licensing objectives issued by the Home Office under section 182 of the Licensing Act 2003 is attached as **Appendix 3**.
  - 4.3 In determining the application the Licensing Sub-Committee must give appropriate weight to:
    - 1) The steps that are appropriate to promote the licensing objectives;
    - 2) The relevant representations presented by all the parties;
    - 3) The Home Office guidance;
    - 4) The Council's own Statement of Licensing Policy.
- **#** 4.4 Additional Home Office guidance about determining actions that are appropriate for the promotion of the licensing objectives is attached as **Appendix 4**.

# 5. AGREED CHANGES TO THE APPLICATION

5.1 During the consultation period, Hampshire Police Licensing and the District Council's Environmental Health (Pollution) proposed additional conditions which were accepted by the applicant. These are summarised below:

Hampshire Police Licensing

- Amendment of licensable activities to end at 23:00 hours daily;
- Closing to the public at 23:30 hours daily;
- Conditions in relation to training, Challenge 25, refusals & incidents book, alcohol with food & off- sales of alcohol, and use of the garden area.

Environmental Health Pollution

- Appropriate signage to be displayed;
- Monitor and manage external areas.
- 5.2 There were no other representations or comments from any other responsible authority including New Forest District Council Development Control.
- # 5.3 The details of the agreed changes are attached as Appendix 5. As a consequence of these changes, a letter was sent to all parties on 7 December (Appendix 6) explaining these in detail. Particular reference was made to the fact that the ceasing of licensable activities at 23:00 meant that live and recorded music and late night refreshment was no longer licensable and therefore removed from the application. The Licensing Authority decided to defer the consideration of the application to allow all parties the opportunity to consider these changes.

# 6. REPRESENTATIONS RECEIVED

- 6.1 During the consultation period relevant representations were received, including two letters of support. However, following the amendments to the application, as referred to in paragraph 5.3 above, a number of representations were formally withdrawn. There are now 29 objections to and 2 representations in support of the application.
- 6.2 The objections to the application are made on the grounds of the following licensing objectives;
  - i) The Prevention of Crime and Disorder;
  - ii) The Prevention of Public Nuisance.
- # 6.3 The representations are all attached as **Appendix 7.**

# 7. LEGAL IMPLICATIONS

- 7.1 This hearing is governed by the Licensing Act 2003 (Hearings) Regulations. These provide that hearings should be held in public unless the Licensing Authority considers that the public interest in excluding the public outweighs the public interest in the hearing taking place in public.
- 7.2 The Applicant, the Responsible Authorities and all other persons who have made representations have been informed of the date, time and location of the hearing and of their right to attend and be represented.
- 7.3 The Applicant and those who have made relevant representations are entitled to address the Sub Committee and to ask questions of the other party, with the consent of the Sub Committee.

# 8. RIGHT OF APPEAL

- 8.1 It should be noted that the applicant and those who have made relevant representations may appeal the decision made by the Licensing Sub Committee to the Magistrates Court. The appeal must be lodged with the Magistrates Court within 21 days of the notification of the decision.
- 8.2 In the event of an appeal being lodged, the decision made by the Licensing Sub Committee remains valid until any appeal is heard and any decision made by the Magistrates Court.
- 8.3 A Responsible Authority or any person may apply to the Licensing Authority for a Review of a Premises Licence. Whether or not a Review Hearing takes place is in the discretion of the Licensing Authority, but, if requested by a person other than a Responsible Authority, will not normally be granted within the first 12 months except for the most compelling circumstances.

# 9. CONCLUSION

9.1 The Licensing Sub-Committee must, having regard to the application and any relevant representations, consider whether to: -

1) Grant the Licence - with the conditions proposed by the Police and Environmental Health (Pollution) and accepted by the applicant and all applicable mandatory conditions of the Licensing Act 2003;

2) Grant the Licence – but with modified conditions to restrict further the licensable activities or operating hours;

3) Reject the application.

# 10. RECOMMENDATION

10.1 That the Licensing Sub-Committee determines the application.





# Annex 1 - Mandatory conditions

### Where licence authorises door supervision:

(1) Each individual at the premises to carry out a security activity must:

Be authorised to carry out that activity by a licence granted under the Private Security Industry Act 2001;

or

Be entitled to carry out that activity by virtue of section 4 of that Act.

#### Where the licence authorises exhibition of films:

- (1) Where a premises licence authorises the exhibition of films, the licence must include a condition requiring the admission of children to the exhibition of any film to be restricted in accordance with this section.
- (2) Where the film classification body is specified in the licence, unless subsection (3)(b) applies, admission of children must be restricted in accordance with any recommendation made by that body.
- (3) Where:
  - (a) the film classification body is not specified in the licence, or
  - (b) the relevant licensing authority has notified the holder of the licence that this subsection applies to the film in question,

admission of children must be restricted in accordance with any recommendation made by that licensing authority.

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#### In this section:

"children" means persons aged under 18; and

"film classification body" means the person or persons designated as the authority under section 4 of the Video Recordings Act 1984 (c.39) (authority to determine suitability of video works for classification).

•,

#### Where licence authorises supply of alcohol:

- (1) No supply of alcohol may be made under the premises licence:
  - (a) at a time when there is no designated premises supervisor in respect of the premises licence, or
  - (b) at a time when the designated premises supervisor does not hold a personal licence or his personal licence is suspended.
- (2) Every supply of alcohol under the premises licence must be made or authorised by a person who holds a personal licence.

#### (Additional Conditions with effect from 6 April 2010)

1. (1) The responsible person shall take all reasonable steps to ensure that staff on relevant premises do not carry out, arrange or participate in any irresponsible promotions in relation to the premises.

(2) In this paragraph, an irresponsible promotion means any one or more of the following activities, or substantially similar activities, carried on for the purpose of encouraging the sale or supply of alcohol for consumption on the premises in a manner which carries a significant risk of leading or contributing to crime and disorder, prejudice to public safety, public nuisance, or harm to children-

(a) games or other activities which require or encourage, or are designed to require or encourage, individuals to-

(i) drink a quantity of alcohol within a time limit (other than to drink alcohol sold or supplied on the premises before the cessation of the period in which the responsible person is authorised to sell or supply alcohol), or

(ii) drink as much alcohol as possible (whether within a time limit or otherwise);

(b) provision of unlimited or unspecified quantities of alcohol free or for a fixed or discounted fee to the public or to a group defined by a particular characteristic (other than any promotion or discount available to an individual in respect of alcohol for consumption at a table meal, as defined in section 159 of the Act);

(c) provision of free or discounted alcohol or any other thing as a prize to encourage or reward the purchase and consumption of alcohol over a period of 24 hours or less;

(d) provision of free or discounted alcohol in relation to the viewing on the premises of a sporting event, where that provision is dependent on-

(i) the outcome of a race, competition or other event or process, or(ii) the likelihood of anything occurring or not occurring;

(e) selling or supplying alcohol in association with promotional posters or flyers on, or in the vicinity of,

the premises which can reasonably be considered to condone, encourage or glamorise anti-social behaviour or to refer to the effects of drunkenness in any favourable manner.

2. The responsible person shall ensure that no alcohol is dispensed directly by one person into the mouth of another (other than where that other person is unable to drink without assistance by reason of a disability).

3. The responsible person shall ensure that free tap water is provided on request to customers when is reasonably available.

(Additional Condition with effect from 1 October 2010)

4. (1) The premises licence holder or club premises certificate holder shall ensure that an age verification policy applies to the premises in relation to the sale or supply of alcohol.

(2) The policy must require individuals who appear to the responsible person to be under 18 years of age (or such older age as may be specified in the policy) to produce on request, before being served alcohol, identification bearing their photograph, date of birth and a holographic mark.

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5. The responsible person shall ensure that-

(a) where any of the following alcoholic drinks is sold or supplied for consumption on the premises (other than alcoholic drinks sold or supplied having been made up in advance ready for sale or supply in a securely closed container) it is available to customers in the following measures-

(i) beer or cider: ½ pint;

(ii) gin, rum, vodka or whisky: 25 ml or 35 ml; and

(iii) still wine in a glass: 125 ml; and

(b) customers are made aware of the availability of these measures.

# THE LICENSING OBJECTIVES

#### Crime & Disorder

- 2.1 Licensing authorities should look to the police as the main source of advice on crime and disorder. They should also seek to involve the local Community Safety Partnership (CSP).
- 2.2 In the exercise of their functions, licensing authorities should seek to co-operate with the Security Industry Authority ("SIA") as far as possible and consider adding relevant conditions to licences where appropriate. The SIA also plays an important role in preventing crime and disorder by ensuring that door supervisors are properly licensed and, in partnership with police and other agencies, that security companies are not being used as fronts for serious and organised criminal activity. This may include making specific enquiries or visiting premises through intelligence led operations in conjunction with the police, local authorities and other partner agencies. Similarly, the provision of requirements for door supervision may be appropriate to ensure that people who are drunk, drug dealers or people carrying firearms do not enter the premises and ensuring that the police are kept informed.
- 2.3 Conditions should be targeted on deterrence and preventing crime and disorder. For example, where there is good reason to suppose that disorder may take place, the presence of closed-circuit television (CCTV) cameras both inside and immediately outside the premises can actively deter disorder, nuisance, anti-social behaviour and crime generally. Some licence holders may wish to have cameras on their premises for the prevention of crime directed against the business itself, its staff, or its customers. But any condition may require a broader approach, and it may be appropriate to ensure that the precise location of cameras is set out on plans to ensure that certain areas are properly covered and there is no subsequent dispute over the terms of the condition.
- 2.4 The inclusion of radio links and ring-round phone systems should be considered an appropriate condition for public houses, bars and nightclubs operating in city and town centre leisure areas with a high density of licensed premises. These systems allow managers of licensed premises to communicate instantly with the police and facilitate a rapid response to any disorder which may be endangering the customers and staff on the premises.
- 2.5 Conditions relating to the management competency of designated premises supervisors should not normally be attached to premises licences. It will normally be the responsibility of the premises licence holder as an employer, and not the licensing authority, to ensure that the managers appointed at the premises are competent and appropriately trained. The designated premises supervisor is the key person who will usually be responsible for the day to day management of the premises by the premises licence holder, including the prevention of disorder. A condition of this kind may only be justified as appropriate in rare circumstances where it can be demonstrated that, in the circumstances associated with particular premises, poor management competency could give rise to issues of crime and disorder and public safety.

# Public safety

- 2.6 Licence holders have a responsibility to ensure the safety of those using their premises, as a part of their duties under the 2003 Act. This concerns the safety of people using the relevant premises rather than public health which is addressed in other legislation. Physical safety includes the prevention of accidents and injuries and other immediate harms that can result from alcohol consumption such as unconsciousness or alcohol poisoning. Conditions relating to public safety may also promote the crime and disorder objective as noted above. There will of course be occasions when a public safety condition could incidentally benefit a person's health more generally, but it should not be the purpose of the condition as this would be outside the licensing authority's powers (be ultra vires) under the 2003 Act. Conditions should not be imposed on a premises licence or club premises certificate which relate to cleanliness or hygiene.
- 2.7 A number of matters should be considered in relation to public safety. These may include:
  - Fire safety;
  - Ensuring appropriate access for emergency services such as ambulances;
  - Good communication with local authorities and emergency services, for example communications networks with the police and signing up for local incident alerts (see paragraph 2.4 above);
  - Ensuring the presence of trained first aiders on the premises and appropriate first aid kits;
  - Ensuring the safety of people when leaving the premises (for example, through the provision of information on late-night transportation);
  - Ensuring appropriate and frequent waste disposal, particularly of glass bottles;
  - Ensuring appropriate limits on the maximum capacity of the premises (see paragraphs 2.11-2.12, and Chapter 10; and
  - Considering the use of CCTV in and around the premises (as noted in paragraph 2.3 above, this may also assist with promoting the crime and disorder objective).
- 2.8 The measures that are appropriate to promote public safety will vary between premises and the matters listed above may not apply in all cases. As set out in Chapter 8 (8.33- 8.41), applicants should consider when making their application which steps it is appropriate to take to promote the public safety objective and demonstrate how they achieve that.

## Ensuring safe departure of those using the premises

- 2.9 Licence holders should make provision to ensure that premises users safely leave their premises. Measures that may assist include:
  - Providing information on the premises of local taxi companies who can provide safe transportation home; and
  - Ensuring adequate lighting outside the premises, particularly on paths leading to and from the premises and in car parks.

## Maintenance and repair

2.10 Where there is a requirement in other legislation for premises open to the public or for employers to possess certificates attesting to the safety or satisfactory nature of

certain equipment or fixtures on the premises, it would be inappropriate for a licensing condition to require possession of such a certificate. However, it would be permissible to require as a condition of a licence or certificate, if appropriate, checks on this equipment to be conducted at specified intervals and for evidence of these checks to be retained by the premises licence holder or club provided this does not duplicate or gold-plate a requirement in other legislation. Similarly, it would be permissible for licensing authorities, if they receive relevant representations from responsible authorities or any other persons, to attach conditions which require equipment of particular standards to be maintained on the premises. Responsible authorities – such as health and safety authorities – should therefore make their expectations clear in this respect to enable prospective licence holders or clubs to prepare effective operating schedules and club operating schedules.

#### Safe capacities

- 2.11 "Safe capacities" should only be imposed where appropriate for the promotion of public safety or the prevention of disorder on the relevant premises. For example, if a capacity has been imposed through other legislation, it would be inappropriate to reproduce it in a premises licence. Indeed, it would also be wrong to lay down conditions which conflict with other legal requirements. However, if no safe capacity has been imposed through other legislation, a responsible authority may consider it appropriate for a new capacity to be attached to the premises which would apply at any material time when the licensable activities are taking place and make representations to that effect. For example, in certain circumstances, capacity limits may be appropriate in preventing disorder, as overcrowded venues can increase the risks of crowds becoming frustrated and hostile.
- 2.12 The permitted capacity is a limit on the number of persons who may be on the premises at any time, following a recommendation by the relevant fire and rescue authority under the Regulatory Reform (Fire Safety) Order 2005. For any application for a premises licence or club premises certificate for premises without an existing permitted capacity where the applicant wishes to take advantage of the special provisions set out in section 177 of the 2003 Act1, the applicant should conduct their own risk assessment as to the appropriate capacity of the premises. They should send their recommendation to the fire and rescue authority which will consider it and decide what the "permitted capacity" of those premises should be.
- 2.13 Public safety may include the safety of performers appearing at any premises, but does not extend to the prevention of injury from participation in a boxing or wrestling entertainment.

## Public Nuisance

2.14 The 2003 Act enables licensing authorities and responsible authorities, through representations, to consider what constitutes public nuisance and what is appropriate to prevent it in terms of conditions attached to specific premises licences and club premises certificates. It is therefore important that in considering the promotion of this licensing objective, licensing authorities and responsible authorities focus on the effect of the licensable activities at the specific premises on persons living and working (including those carrying on business) in the area around the premises which may be disproportionate and unreasonable. The issues will mainly concern noise nuisance, light pollution, noxious smells and litter.

- 2.15 Public nuisance is given a statutory meaning in many pieces of legislation. It is however not narrowly defined in the 2003 Act and retains its broad common law meaning. It may include in appropriate circumstances the reduction of the living and working amenity and environment of other persons living and working in the area of the licensed premises. Public nuisance may also arise as a result of the adverse effects of artificial light, dust, odour and insects or where its effect is prejudicial to health.
- 2.16 Conditions relating to noise nuisance will usually concern steps appropriate to control the levels of noise emanating from premises. This might be achieved by a simple measure such as ensuring that doors and windows are kept closed after a particular time, or persons are not permitted in garden areas of the premises after a certain time. More sophisticated measures like the installation of acoustic curtains or rubber speaker mounts to mitigate sound escape from the premises may be appropriate. However, conditions in relation to live or recorded music may not be enforceable in circumstances where the entertainment activity itself is not licensable (see chapter 15). Any conditions appropriate to promote the prevention of public nuisance should be tailored to the type, nature and characteristics of the specific premises and its licensable activities. Licensing authorities should avoid inappropriate or disproportionate measures that could deter events that are valuable to the community, such as live music. Noise limiters, for example, are expensive to purchase and install and are likely to be a considerable burden for smaller venues.
- 2.17 As with all conditions, those relating to noise nuisance may not be appropriate in certain circumstances where provisions in other legislation adequately protect those living in the area of the premises. But as stated earlier in this Guidance, the approach of licensing authorities and responsible authorities should be one of prevention and when their powers are engaged, licensing authorities should be aware of the fact that other legislation may not adequately cover concerns raised in relevant representations and additional conditions may be appropriate.
- 2.18 Where applications have given rise to representations, any appropriate conditions should normally focus on the most sensitive periods. For example, the most sensitive period for people being disturbed by unreasonably loud music is at night and into the early morning when residents in adjacent properties may be attempting to go to sleep or are sleeping. This is why there is still a need for a licence for performances of live music between 11 pm and 8 am. In certain circumstances, conditions relating to noise emanating from the premises may also be appropriate to address any disturbance anticipated as customers enter and leave.
- 2.19 Measures to control light pollution will also require careful thought. Bright lighting outside premises which is considered appropriate to prevent crime and disorder may itself give rise to light pollution for some neighbours. Applicants, licensing authorities and responsible authorities will need to balance these issues.
- 2.20 Beyond the immediate area surrounding the premises, these are matters for the personal responsibility of individuals under the law. An individual who engages in anti-social behaviour is accountable in their own right. However, it would be perfectly reasonable for a licensing authority to impose a condition, following relevant representations, that requires the licence holder or club to place signs at the exits from the building encouraging patrons to be quiet until they leave the area, or that, if they wish to smoke, to do so at designated places on the premises instead of outside, and to respect the rights of people living nearby to a peaceful night.

#### Protection of Children from Harm

- 2.21 The protection of children from harm includes the protection of children from moral, psychological and physical harm. This includes not only protecting children from the harms associated directly with alcohol consumption but also wider harms such as exposure to strong language and sexual expletives (for example, in the context of exposure to certain films or adult entertainment). Licensing authorities must also consider the need to protect children from sexual exploitation when undertaking licensing functions.
- 2.22 The Government believes that it is completely unacceptable to sell alcohol to children. Conditions relating to the access of children where alcohol is sold and which are appropriate to protect them from harm should be carefully considered. Moreover, conditions restricting the access of children to premises should be strongly considered in circumstances where:
  - adult entertainment is provided;
  - a member or members of the current management have been convicted for serving alcohol to minors or with a reputation for allowing underage drinking (other than in the context of the exemption in the 2003 Act relating to 16 and 17 year olds consuming beer, wine and cider when accompanied by an adult during a table meal);
  - it is known that unaccompanied children have been allowed access;
  - there is a known association with drug taking or dealing; or
  - in some cases, the premises are used exclusively or primarily for the sale of alcohol for consumption on the premises.
- 2.23 It is also possible that activities, such as adult entertainment, may take place at certain times on premises but not at other times. For example, premises may operate as a café bar during the day providing meals for families but also provide entertainment with a sexual content after 8.00pm. It is not possible to give an exhaustive list of what amounts to entertainment or services of an adult or sexual nature. Applicants, responsible authorities and licensing authorities will need to consider this point carefully. This would broadly include topless bar staff, striptease, lap-, table- or pole-dancing, performances involving feigned violence or horrific incidents, feigned or actual sexual acts or fetishism, or entertainment involving strong and offensive language.
- 2.24 Applicants must be clear in their operating schedules about the activities and times at which the events would take place to help determine when it is not appropriate for children to enter the premises. Consideration should also be given to the proximity of premises to schools and youth clubs so that applicants take appropriate steps to ensure that advertising relating to their premises, or relating to events at their premises, is not displayed at a time when children are likely to be near the premises.
- 2.25 Licensing authorities and responsible authorities should expect applicants, when preparing an operating schedule or club operating schedule, to set out the steps to be taken to protect children from harm when on the premises.
- 2.26 Conditions, where they are appropriate, should reflect the licensable activities taking place on the premises. In addition to the mandatory condition regarding age verification, other conditions relating to the protection of children from harm can include:

- restrictions on the hours when children may be present;
- restrictions or exclusions on the presence of children under certain ages when particular specified activities are taking place;
- restrictions on the parts of the premises to which children may have access;
- age restrictions (below 18);
- restrictions or exclusions when certain activities are taking place;
- requirements for an accompanying adult (including for example, a combination of requirements which provide that children under a particular age must be accompanied by an adult); and
- full exclusion of people under 18 from the premises when any licensable activities are taking place.
- 2.27 Please see also Chapter 10 for details about the Licensing Act 2003 (Mandatory Licensing Conditions) Order 2010.
- 2.28 Licensing authorities should give considerable weight to representations about child protection matters. In addition to the responsible authority whose functions relate directly to child protection, the Director of Public Health may also have access to relevant evidence to inform such representations. These representations may include, amongst other things, the use of health data about the harms that alcohol can cause to underage drinkers. Where a responsible authority, or other person, presents evidence to the licensing authority linking specific premises with harms to children (such as ambulance data or emergency department attendances by persons under 18 years old with alcohol-related illnesses or injuries) this evidence should be considered, and the licensing authority should also consider what action is appropriate to ensure this licensing objective is effectively enforced. In relation to applications for the grant of a licence in areas where evidence is presented on high levels of alcohol-related harms in persons aged under 18, it is recommended that the licensing authority considers what conditions may be appropriate to ensure that this objective is promoted effectively.
- 2.29 The 2003 Act provides that, where a premises licence or club premises certificate authorises the exhibition of a film, it must include a condition requiring the admission of children to films to be restricted in accordance with recommendations given either by a body designated under section 4 of the Video Recordings Act 1984 specified in the licence (the British Board of Film Classification is currently the only body which has been so designated) or by the licensing authority itself. Further details are given in Chapter 10.
- 2.30 Theatres may present a range of diverse activities and entertainment including, for example, variety shows incorporating adult entertainment. It is appropriate in these cases for a licensing authority to consider restricting the admission of children in such circumstances. Entertainments may also be presented at theatres specifically for children. It will be appropriate to consider whether a condition should be attached to a premises licence or club premises certificate which requires the presence of a sufficient number of adult staff on the premises to ensure the wellbeing of the children during any emergency.

# Determining actions that are appropriate for the promotion of the licensing objectives

- 9.41 Licensing authorities are best placed to determine what actions are appropriate for the promotion of the licensing objectives in their areas. All licensing determinations should be considered on a case-by-case basis. They should take into account any representations or objections that have been received from responsible authorities or other persons, and representations made by the applicant or premises user as the case may be.
- 9.42 The authority's determination should be evidence-based, justified as being appropriate for the promotion of the licensing objectives and proportionate to what it is intended to achieve.
- 9.43 Determination of whether an action or step is appropriate for the promotion of the licensing objectives requires an assessment of what action or step would be suitable to achieve that end. While this does not therefore require a licensing authority to decide that no lesser step will achieve the aim, the authority should aim to consider the potential burden that the condition would impose on the premises licence holder (such as the financial burden due to restrictions on licensable activities) as well as the potential benefit in terms of the promotion of the licensing objectives. However, it is imperative that the authority ensures that the factors which form the basis of its determination are limited to consideration of the promotion of the objectives and nothing outside those parameters. As with the consideration of licence variations, the licensing authority should consider wider issues such as other conditions already in place to mitigate potential negative impact on the promotion of the licensing objectives and the track record of the business. Further advice on determining what is appropriate when imposing conditions on a licence or certificate is provided in Chapter 10. The licensing authority is expected to come to its determination based on an assessment of the evidence on both the risks and benefits either for or against making the determination.

We have reached agreement with the applicant as set out below. This agreement being:

- Amendment of licensable activities to 2300hrs each day
- Closing to the public at 2330hrs each day
- Conditions in relation to training, Challenge 25, refusals / incidents book, alcohol with food, off-sales of alcohol, use of garden area.

# <u>Training-</u>

Staff will be trained regarding appropriate precautions to prevent the sale of alcohol to persons under the age of 18, the signs and symptoms of drunk persons and the refusal of sale due to intoxication. Records will be kept of such training which must be signed and dated by the member of staff who has received that training.

All staff will receive refresher training every six months as a minimum and records are to be kept of this refresher training which should be signed and dated by the member of staff who received that training.

In addition to their training a written test related to the training given will be conducted before the staff member is permitted to sell or authorise alcohol. The test will consist of a minimum of ten questions of which the pass rate is 80%. Anyone who fails to reach the prescribed pass rate will be retrained and re-tested. Anyone not attaining the pass rate will not be permitted to sell or authorise the sale of alcohol until the pass rate is attained. There will be a minimum of two sets of questions to be used in the training which will be rotated upon each subsequent six month training session.

All training records will be made immediately available for inspection by Hampshire Constabulary and any responsible Authority upon request. Training records will be kept for a minimum period of two years. Training records will be kept on the licensed premises to which they relate to.

Any reference to Challenge 25 or Challenge 21 to be amended to:

# Challenge 25 age verification

There will be a Challenge 25 policy operating at the premises. Challenge 25 means that the holder of the premises licence shall ensure that every individual, who visually appears to be under 25 years of age and is seeking to purchase or be supplied with alcohol at the premises or from the premises, shall produce identification proving that individual to be 18 years of age or older.

Acceptable identification for the purposes of age verification will include a driving licence, passport or photographic identification bearing the "PASS" logo and the persons date of birth.

If the person seeking alcohol is unable to produce acceptable means of identification, no sale or supply of alcohol will be made to or for that person.

'Challenge 25' posters shall be displayed in prominent positions at the premises

# <u>Refusals book</u>

A written log shall be kept of all refusals including refusals to sell alcohol. The Premises Licence Holder shall ensure that the refusals log is checked, signed and dated on a weekly basis by the store manager/manageress.

The refusals log will be kept and maintained at the premises and will be available for inspection immediately upon request by Hampshire Constabulary and any responsible authority.

The record of refusals will be retained for 12 months.

# Incident book

An incident book will be provided and maintained at the premises. It will remain on the premises at all times and will be available to police for inspection upon request.

Any incidents that include physical altercation or disorder, physical ejection, injury, id seizure or drug misuse will be recorded in the incident book. The entry is to include an account of the incident and the identity of all person(s) involved (or descriptions of those involved if identity is not known). Should there be any physical interaction by members of staff and the public the entry will include what physical action occurred between each party. The entry shall be timed, dated and signed by the author.

If the member of staff creating the entry has difficulties reading or writing then the entry may be written by another staff member. This should however be read back to the person creating the entry and counter signed by the person who wrote the entry.

At the close of business on each day the incident book will be checked by the manager on duty where any entries will be reviewed and signed. If incidents have occurred the duty manager will de-brief staff at the close of business. Should there be no incidents then this will also be recorded at the close of business in the incident book.

This record will be retained for 12 months.

# Alcohol with Food

Alcohol shall not be sold or supplied on the premises otherwise that to persons taking table meals there and for consumption by such a person as an ancillary to his meal.

# Off, sales of alcohol

Off sales of alcohol shall only be permitted to customers who have dined in the premises. Alcohol for consumption off the premises will be sold / supplied in sealed containers.

No consumption of alcohol or other drinks will take place outside to the front of the premises (Gosport Street).

# <u>Garden area</u>

The garden area will be closed to patrons from 2300hrs each day, and locked.

Please can you confirm if CCTV will be in operation at the premises. If so, may I suggest the following to be added as a condition:

# <u>сстv</u>

The premises shall have sufficient cameras located within the premises to cover all public areas including outside of the premises covering the entrance and exit. The system will be able to cope with strobe lighting (where used) and all levels of illumination throughout the premises as well as outside areas.

CCTV warning signs to be fitted in public places.

The CCTV system must be operating at all times whilst the premises are open for licensable activity. All equipment shall have a constant and accurate time and date generation.

The recording system will be able to capture a minimum of 4 frames per second and all recorded footage must be securely retained for a minimum of 28 days.

Records must be made on a weekly basis and kept for inspection to show that the system is functioning correctly and that data is being securely retained.

The DPS or premises manager must be able to demonstrate that the CCTV system has measures to prevent recordings being tampered with, i.e. password protected.

There shall be sufficient members of trained staff at the premises during operating hours to be able to provide viewable copies immediately to police on request when investigating allegations of offences or criminal activity. Any images recovered must be in a viewable format disc. Footage supplied in a digital format on CD or DVD will also have a copy of the CCTV system software enabled on the disc to allow playback.

In the event of technical failure of the CCTV equipment the Premises Licence holder/DPS MUST report the failure to the Hampshire Western Police Licensing Unit within 24 hours.

# **OBJECTION TO No. 9 GOSPORT STREET**

I own and reside in the freehold property No. 7 Gosport Street which consists of a retail business on the ground floor and an apartment on the first and second floors. This Grade II Listed property was built in the 1790's. It has no modern soundproofing and sound passes easily through floors, walls and windows.

In recent years during the period when a bar was being operated in No.9 Gosport Street my life was made a misery with loud noise percolating throughout my home. This was so intrusive at times as to make the television inaudible.

I complained several times to the NFDC. They stopped the live music but seemed incapable of reducing the volume of recorded music and other sounds to an acceptable level. At some stage they insisted that the speakers were moved but that only moved the sound of music to another part of my home.

Even in the bedrooms of my home on the second floor the rhythmic thumping of the base notes was clearly heard and sleep was impossible.

After the garden was closed each evening the smokers moved into Gosport Street immediately outside the front door of the bar and adjacent to my front entrance door. Gosport Street is very narrow at this point, not 2 metres wide, with railings behind the curb stones so these people were hemmed in right outside my front door, drinking, smoking, using foul language and regularly fights broke out. This disgusting behaviour often continued after the bar closed sometimes into the early hours.

I could not open my front windows and the smell of cigarette smoke permeated my whole property. The front first floor bedroom became unusable.

My tenant runs his business between midday and late into the evening. We fear his business will be severely affected by youths crowded round in the street outside his windows. His customers are unlikely to welcome having to run the gauntlet of semi inebriated and sometimes very inebriated people as they enter or leave his shop. Similarly, you can imagine how unpleasant it is for a lady to return to her home in the evening to be faced by an intimidating mob milling about outside her front door.

Surely a resident can demand to live in peace in their property and businesses must have the right to carry on their lawful occupation as has been the case here for over two hundred years before the foolish and injudicious granting of licences which are completely inappropriate in a heavily populated residential area.


The proposed business and attendant licenses are not suitable in No.9 Gosport Street.

**Objection to the application at No. 9 Gosport Street-** Grateful if you could acknowledge receipt of this email.

I object very strongly to the granting of this proposed license.

My reasons are as follows:

- 1. My wife (88 years old) and I (90 years old) live at 8 Trafalgar Place. This is behind and very close to the applicant premises. Our rear garden is no more than a few yards from the rear garden / backyard of the applicant premises. There are many other homes which will be similarly affected by this application.
- 2. In past years, we have experienced very significant problems with noise from the previous occupants of the applicant premises when they were trading as the restaurant / bar 'Grazes' and subsequently as 'Whytes'. The problem had also been a live issue for the previous owners of our house. The noise has been particularly bad during the summer months due both to the premises being busier and with doors and windows being open. It has been so intolerable that I was unable to sit outside in my back garden on summer evenings, but had to retire inside the house. Even there it was necessary to keep the windows closed. On some nights, usually weekends, I had the choice of closing my bedroom window to suppress the noise

problem and endure sleeplessness due to a hot stuffy room or open the window and endure the same due to the noise. As far as I could tell, the music played in those days was recorded, but the raucous chatter and laughter was very much 'live'. And this was when the premises were trading as a restaurant bar and not as an amplified live music venue, as is proposed in the application.

- 3. I have no wish to be a NIMBY killjoy, but in my opinion, the premises are 'embedded' in an otherwise residential area to such a degree that it is simply unsuited for use as a bar / live music venue, as proposed, when it would be impossible to mitigate the impact of noise on residents in the vicinity.
- 4. In any event, music, and certainly not amplified music, should not be permitted to be played outside at any time. As for music being played inside the venue, this should always cease at 11.00p.m.
- 5. Even if music is only played inside the venue, if it is amplified there must be some control of the volume which is capable of enforcement.
- 6. The proposed sale of alcohol until midnight and 1.00am on Saturday will inevitably mean more antisocial behaviour outside the premises.
- 7. I had believed that these premises were licensed as a restaurant so I am unclear how they can reposition themselves as a bar and entertainment establishment.

Dear NFDC Licensing,

As residents of No. 12 Trafalgar Place we are writing to express our objection to the Premises Application on Gosport Street which we understand includes provision to serve alcohol and play live and recorded music <u>until midnight</u> 6 days per week and <u>until 1am</u> on Saturdays. We have been residents at Trafalgar place for 14 years and strongly believe that if this application were to be approved it would undoubtedly have serious implications for the residents, not only of Trafalgar Place, but also those of Gosport Street and Quay Hill. Our main concerns are as follows:

1. Increased levels of noise in such a densely populated area; something which has already been a problem with prior businesses operating in this premises. This is especially a problem for residents of Trafalgar Place due to the confined outside area which magnifies the noise coming from inside and out. Even if live music was limited <u>until 9pm</u> outside, undoubtedly the serving of alcohol <u>until 1.30am</u> would result in increased noise/shouting etc, coming from the garden area and on the street as patrons leave the premises.

2. Antisocial behaviour: with late night drinking and entertainment, of course will come an increase in antisocial behaviour, again a problem experienced previously, and one which will only be magnified by the extending of the premises licence. Even with restrictions on use of the outdoor area, the noise made by smokers and those on the street leaving the premises is a real problem for residents living around the area.

Overall we feel that a premises of this size, listed nature and location in the heart of Lymington is far better limited to that of a cafe/restaurant/wine bar (with sensible limits on licence timings and provision of music), rather than that of a late-night drinking establishment which will undoubtedly foster anti-social behaviour and cause unnecessary stress and disruption to the residents.

We must emphasise that we are in no-way anti-commerce, and by all means would appreciate and support a well-run establishment- cafe/restaurant- which is appropriate for the setting and building.

As your records will show, we have been in regular contact with yourselves, Sgt McWilliam the officer then in charge of Lymington Police Station and his colleagues in Hampshire Constabulary Licensing Department, Safer New Forest Targeting Crime and Anti Social Behaviour, NFDC Environmental Health and NFDC Planning regarding the non observance of the EXISTING licence and the adverse impact on our health and wellbeing from noise and anti social behaviour from the use of these premise including having to leave our home at weekends when the impacts become intolerable and unbearable. A sample of emails in 2014 and 2015 are attached, including a diary log (the premises have been closed for most of 2016). The proposed new premises licence application will intensify and greatly magnify those concerns relating to noise and anti social behaviour into the small hours which are not just the result of ineffective operator management but relate to the fundamental inappropriateness of this small Grade 2 listed building in Lymington's Conservation Area to accommodate a late night drinking and entertainment establishment. The building is closely surrounded by noise sensitive receptors with houses and flats on all sides and this confined area magnifies noise and disturbance as well as affecting a large number of people trying to sleep and carry on with their lives without major and intrusive disturbance. In particular, the proposal for live and recorded amplified music both outdoors and indoors demonstrates that the proposers have no thought for the effect on surrounding noise sensitive receptors which suggests they will have a similarly insensitive attitude in running their business. The existing building does not have double glazing and it has been repeatedly shown that operators do not abide by time conditions or conditions to close doors and windows (which do not in any event effectively attenuate noise nuisance) especially in warm weather. Indeed it just means that drunken customers congregate at the Gosport Street entrance to smoke, shout and scream into the small hours. An application for mechanical ventilation in 2007 was refused and dismissed on appeal because of its impact on the listed building and the conservation area (see NFDC 06/0882 & 07/89748).

2. It is clear from the application that the proposed operators will seek to run the premises as a drinking and entertainment establishment. As the attached correspondence with NFDC's Planning Enforcement Officer demonstrates, the lawful planning use is as an A3 restaurant/cafe (also confirmed in Savills last sales particulars) not an A4 drinking establishment or a sui generis entertainment establishment. The operators do not have planning permission for their proposed activities which are not characteristic of a genuine A3 restaurant/cafe and on this basis alone the application should be rejected in its entirety as well as the manifest and documented impacts in terms of noise, anti social behaviour and effect on the general amenity of the area and the peaceful enjoyment of one's home which is protected by the Human Rights Act.

3. As well as rejecting this application in its entirety, in the light of the past history of this establishment in terms of noise nuisance, anti social behaviour and unlawful planning use this opportunity should be taken to REVIEW the WHOLE EXISTING LICENCE to make it compatible with its lawful use as a genuine A3

restaturant/cafe in a sensitive location which has been the subject of ongoing and consistent complaints. This should include prohibiting the use of the garden after 21.00 hours, the restriction of opening hours to before 23.00 hours, prohibiting the playing of ALL amplified live and recorded music, the showing of films and the sale/supply of alcohol off the premises.

We are happy to attend any inquiry into this matter.

I refer to your email and our telephone conversation yesterday.

1. As I said in my email of 20th July I was awoken at 1.17am on the morning of Sunday 19th July by customers of Wytes standing outside Wytes on the east side of Gosport Street drunkenly screaming and shouting. I put on my dressing gown and shoes, walked out of my house and positioned myself directly opposite Wytes on the west side of Gosport Street. It was 1.24am by my watch. Wytes has a large window and was brightly lit so I had a clear view of the large number of customers clustered round the bar and I observed alcohol being passed over the bar by the bar person and money being paid. I also observed a male urinating in the street drain outside Loose Ends.

2. As they were busy serving alcohol no one was even available, or aware of the need, to manage the outside customers. The licence states:

"So as to minimise disturbance to local residents late at night, staff will be given appropriate instructions and training to encourage customers to leave the premises quietly and not loiter in the vicinity of the premises. At each exit point a prominent and clear notice will be displayed to the effect that customers should be considerate to local residents by leaving the premises and the area quietly".

The new young managers are not carrying out these duties and have taken down the notices required by the licence on both the garden door and the main Gosport Street door.

3. The licence states that noise from music and voices must be inaudible between 2300 and 0900 hours. Mrs White at 9 Trafalgar Place which lies immediately behind the garden of Wytes was disturbed on the night of Thursday 16th July by the use of the garden after 2300 hours. In addition the door to the garden was lodged open so that the noise from inside Wytes escaped. This is in breach of the condition in the licence which states:

"External doors will also be kept closed, except where necessary for access and egress, ie the doors will not be secured open and will be fitted with self closers if necessary".

Mrs White will be contacting you by email with further particulars which I am aware is a recurring problem.

We are grateful for your undertaking to raise these breaches with the licensee.

Following our discussions last year, Wytes is now "under new management" although we understand that the licensee is still Mr Robert Milton of Stanwell House Hotel.

We were awoken at 01.17am on Sunday 19th July by customers congregating and shouting in Gosport Street outside Wytes with one male urinating in the street drain outside Loose Ends.

The new management make no attempt to manage this situation and indeed have taken down the notices regarding quiet exit from the Gosport Street and garden doors in breach of the licence.

I confirmed this by putting on my dressing gown and shoes and going into the street. Mrs Pitt Brown of 5 Trafalgar Place also did this at 01.00am

I also confirmed that they were still selling alcohol at 01.24am in breach of their licence.

In addition on the night of Thursday 16th July Mrs Karen White of 9 Trafalgar Place was disturbed by the garden door being kept open and the garden being used after 11pm also in breach of the licence.

In my discussions with Mrs Barnes it is clear that Wytes is operating illegally as an A4 Drinking Establishment in an inappropriate small listed Grade 2 building where it's appropriate and lawful use is as an A3 restaurant. Thank you for your email.

I am disappointed to hear that there have been further disturbances from music at Wytes, especially having brought the issue of noise to their attention on several occasions. I would be grateful if you could forward your diary sheets to me after the weekend so that I can assess them with a view to arranging some noise monitoring from your property in the near future.

In terms of the live music advertised in relation to their premises licence (i.e. occasionally permitted), unfortunately, since the premises licence was issued live music has been deregulated by the Live Music Act 2012 between the hours of 08:00hrs and 23:00hrs for audiences up to 200 people. Therefore, any conditions attached to the licence in relation to live music between these hours are no longer enforceable- which may include this condition about accessional live music only being permitted at the premises. That said, they must still not cause a nuisance to neighbouring properties from any music or noise from the premises-which is the aspect we are currently investigating.

I have copied the planning enforcement officer into this email in relation to the vinyl advertising banner attached to the railings along Gosport Street as it may be of interest in the course of investigating other issues associated with the premises.

Further to our telephone conversation this morning we attach a log of the breaches of premises license 633/6 by the Wytes license holder. Specifically there are 4 issues:

1. The licence states that there could be "occasional live music for customers". Wytes are now holding live music and DJ sessions every Thursday, Friday and Saturday and as they are closed on

Mondays, live music is being played for 50% of their opening days. This is not "occasional".

2. Before 11pm it should not be possible to recognise distinct tunes and all external doors and windows must be kept shut. This is not being observed.

3. After 11pm noise will be "inaudible" when measured at the external boundary of our house number 6 Trafalgar Place. We are regularly woken by amplified noise heard within our double skinned

and double glazed house. We can never open our windows even in the hottest weather.

4. Customers congregate outside in Gosport Street to smoke, drunkenly shout and scream after 11pm. into the small hours.

Our amenity and sleep patterns are being seriously affected by these breaches of the licence. Wytes has effectively become an A4 drinking establishment whereas its existing established use is as an A3 restaurant previously known at Limpets. It is a small listed building entirely unsuitable for this use and we formally request that you review the fundamental appropriateness of this license.



We are writing to object to the granting of the licensing application by the proprietor of 9 Gosport Street on the following grounds:

- Currently, the premises has permission to operate as a restaurant/café not a drinking and entertaining establishment with extended hours and amplified music.
- The surrounding area, Trafalgar Place, Gosport Street, Mill Lane, Station Street, The Quay and Captain's Row, is predominantly residential, and much of it in the Conservation Area.
- The application is asking for permission to operate a drinking and entertainment business from 8.00 am to midnight/1.00 am, with an extension to 3.00 am on special occasions. Clearly this will have a huge impact on the noise levels of the neighbouring area, not to mention drinking crowds outside until the early hours of the morning with the liklihood of public disturbances and even police intervention.
- The building in question is a listed building and an extended hours drinking and entertaining establishment is not an appropriate use for it.
- Gosport Street is a busy access street for the town the granting of this licence will increase congestion due to delivery trucks having to stop outside the premises and, particularly if an off premises sales licence is also granted, the real possibility of inconsiderate/hazardous parking on the part of its clientele.

We therefore strenuously urge the New Forest District Council to deny this application.

I would like to make the strongest objection to the licence request by the new operator of this property (9 Gosport Street) on the grounds of the anti social behaviour and distress to local residents it will result in. Those in the immediate vicinity (Trafalgar Place, Mill Lane, The Quay, Captain's Row) have been through the nightmare of noise, drinking till all hours, vomiting on the pavements or over Trafalgar Place wall, urinating in the Trafalgar Place gardens, police being called because of 2am noise. However, I realise that the planning department are less interested in the emotional distress of the local community – albeit that several of us had to move out of our homes in order to get some sleep during the balmy summer nights when the noise was so bad. In my case I suffered stress and depression due to the lunch/evening noise levels and regular inconsiderate behaviour of those who frequented the establishment. I have no reason to suspect that the general public's behaviour will be any better under this new management – long hours of drinking encourages drunken (and usually bad) behaviour which spills out on to the street.

But, on a less emotional note, No: 9 Gosport Street only has permission for a restaurant/café NOT a drinking and entertainment establishment.

We are objecting to the proposed licence application at No.9 Gosport Street due to the likelihood of intrusive disturbance from live and recorded music (live music being amplified) being played potentially from 08:00hrs to midnight, Sunday to Friday inclusive and beyond on Saturdays, Christmas Eve and New Years Eve.

Together with the sale and consumption of alcohol on and off the premises during the same hours, this raises concern about unsupervised, unruly behaviour of customers local to the premises especially at closing times.







#### New Premises Licence Application: 9 Gosport Street, Lymington SO41 9BG

I write as Honorary Secretary of the Trafalgar Place (Lymington) Residents' Association to which all 24 households in Trafalgar Place belong. We wish to object to the above application in the following terms.

Mrs Barnes of NFDC Planning Enforcement has confirmed that the lawful use of 9 Gosport Street is as an A3 restaurant/cafe and she has confirmed, along with PC Conway of the Police Licensing Department, that the new owners invented to run this establishment as a restaurant. We have no objection to this.

However, the existing licence and the proposed new licence seek clauses which will allow them to operate as an A4 drinking and entertaining establishment which has caused immense nuisance and anti-social behaviour in the past, and which has involved your Department, Environmental Health, the Lymington Police and Planning Enforcement. A sample of these abuses since 2014 has been well documented in real time by Mr Capner of 6 Trafalgar Place in his objection as well as by others.

In order that the establishment operates as an A3 restaurant and not an unauthorised A4 drinking and entertaining establishment we request the following amendments:

- 1. In common with other restaurants in Lymington the establishment should close by 23.30.
- 2. There should be no live or recorded music (amplified or not) outside in the small patio garden which is closely surrounded by residential properties, or inside this small poorly sound-proofed listed building with no ventilation.
- 3. The garden should be closed at 21.00 to safeguard the amenities of adjoining properties following the precedent established in the planning permission (16/10559) and licence (1294/8) for the Shipyard Bar and Kitchen at Berthon.
- 4. Off licence sales of alcohol are not a usual occurrence at genuine restaurants and should be prohibited.

We shall be represented at the hearing on Tuesday, 20th December by Mr Peter Dolphin. a resident of Trafalgar Place and Director of the Residents's Association.

# Dear NFDC Licensing

Please record our strong objection to every topic in this new licence application - we have lived in Lymington for over 20 years and are well aware of the past problems concerning these premises.

1.

You will be aware of well-documented records of the involvement of both the local and county Police forces dealing with anti-social behaviour following incidents at the premises, and the Environmental Health Department have been heavily involved in noise and nuisance issues. These long-standing problems from the former Wytes and Graze concerned the CURRENT licence the range of which is far less intrusive than that of the new application.

2.

9 Gosport Street is situated in a mainly-residential Conservation Area. The garden (at the rear of the building) is in a largely residential area and is surrounded by private houses and flats with gardens and balconies. Many of the residents are elderly retirees. The nature of the buildings means the 'garden' of 9 Gosport Street is in a confined area which acts as a sound-box and any outside noise which is hugely intrusive to all residents.

### 3.

The premises are totally unsuitable for outside entertaining, let alone for the playing of music at all hours of the day until the middle of the night. Even music restricted to the inside is intolerable as windows and doors are continually opened and closed for access and ventilation - any sound 'escapes', and people gather outside in Gosport Street to drink and smoke. Even the existing permission for use of the garden without music until 9.30pm is unacceptable for neighbours.

4.

We understand that the premises currently hold a licence for a restaurant or cafe, but recently the premises have become a purely drinking establishment with all the associated problems of alcohol consumption. The requested extension to the opening hours (a 17 hour- day)

for selling alcohol and providing continual music does not seem consistent with a restaurant status and is entirely in-appropriate for its surroundings.

In conclusion, we feel that the Licensing authority should take the opportunity to review the existing licence and give no consideration to the new application. The use of the premises should be compatible with their residential, quiet, conservation-area surroundings and be respectful to those who live there and have the right to peace and quiet.
